January is Rotary's Vocational Service Month

Who are you? If you are an active, engaged Rotarian, your identity lies in your callings (i.e. your vocations). Your passions give your life fulfillment and satisfaction and determine your callings. Rotarians pursue Vocational Service when their passions become evident through their Service Above Self. This concept of vocational service is rooted in the Object of Rotary, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster integrity and high ethical standards in all vocations. The worthiness and dignity of each Rotarian's vocation is an opportunity to serve society. Promoting integrity and ethical behavior is an essential part of what it means to be a Rotarian and demonstrated in our Four-Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct. These provide a road map for Rotary's Vocational Service.

As a Rotarian, you have many ways you can put your unique gifts, talents and Rotary's ideals into action through vocational service. You can: learn about the vocations of other Rotarians; give service to others using your professional skills; practice conspicuous integrity in business and personal dealings; inspire others to behave ethically through your words and actions; help youth (in Interact and Rotaract) define their own callings and achieve their aspirations; and guide and encourage others in their professional development. When these actions motivate and energize you, you are performing Rotary Vocational Service. This "action based on integrity" is the very essence of Rotary and is what defines Rotary as a service organization.

Another way Rotarians engage in vocational service is to connect with fellow Rotarians who share a common calling. Rotarians apply their expertise and experience to bond with those with common interests from different professional and cultural backgrounds through Rotary Fellowships. Rotary Fellowships are independent groups of Rotarians, family members, program participants, and alumni who share a common passion. Rotary Fellowships allow Rotarians to apply their unique skill sets to serve their community and further their professional development while building lasting friendships. There are currently more than 60 Rotary Fellowships covering vocations such as lawyers, doctors, law enforcement; and unique interests such as writing, medicine, viticulture, cricket or jazz.

Through vocational service, Rotarians demonstrate their callings and provide vocational service to humanity while growing and developing their callings and helping others reach their full potential.

In 2003 George Wladis saw that many kids attending Syracuse City Schools did not have hats and gloves to endure the harsh winters. So, on his own time and with his own money, George went out



and bought 200 pair of hats and gloves and delivered them to the Seymour Elementary School. Since then this program has increased to thousands of hats and gloves. After George passed away in 2015 his sons continued the tradition. Dozens of volunteers, from several organizations and businesses, distributed over 11,000 pair of hats and gloves along with warm jackets. It all began on Wednesday, December 7th, when the Wladis Law Firm hosted a breakfast for the volunteers, including a group from the Rotary Club of Dewitt. Mark Wladis gave each volunteer an assignment sheet indicating which school they would go to, to help distribute the items to the kids. Mel Rubenstein, a DeWitt Rotarian, said, "I was at the Edward Smith School along with two other Dewitt Rotarians, and it went very smoothly. It was very rewarding hearing the 'thank you's' from these 2nd graders. I am looking forward to doing this

STEP UP WITH SHORT TERM EXCHANGE

The Short Term Exchange Program (STEP) is a family to family summer exchange program covering a two month period in the summer, July and August, each year. Students will each spend 3-4 weeks together in each others homes in each others countries.

-Family to family: Each family must be willing to host & provide room, board and activities

-Families arrange their own transportation – buy their own airline tickets

-Families must agree to Criminal and Abuse Background check

-Students must purchase medical and liability insurance & cover costs outside the US

Student Selection & Eligibility

-Age 15 to 18 (not graduated high school) at departure. -Average to above grades with interest in foreign language and cultures

-Active in school & community activities

-Rotary Club Youth Exchange Officer must interview students & their parents
