*using our professional skills to serve our club and community

*practicing our profession with integrity, and inspiring others to behave ethically through our words and actions

*helping young people achieve their career aspirations

*guiding and encouraging others in their professional development

*networking with associates to help serve others



If you, as Rotarians act on these ideals, you are performing vocational service. If you are motivated and energized by vocational service, then you have chosen the right service organization, because vocational service is the very essence of Rotary. It sets this organization apart from other service organizations.
