March is Rotary's Clean Water & Sanitation Month

In 1907, the Rotary Club of Chicago launched a community movement to build public toilets in Chicago. Almost 110 years later, those facilities, though primitive by today's standards, would still be considered progress in some parts of the world. More than 660 million people worldwide live without safe access to clean water, and almost 40 percent have no sanitary toilet facilities. Today Rotary now stands in a strong position to work with global partners to find meaningful, sustainable solutions to the single largest threat to humankind. The Rotary Foundation recognizes the need for clean water and sanitation as one of its six focus areas. Approximately 10,000 Rotary Clubs supported 302 Rotary Global Grants totaling \$20 million in 2014-15. Rotarians participate in water-related projects that are bringing clean water and sanitation to remote areas and greatly reducing the incidence of disease. We are working to improve sanitation and have built wastewater treatment plants, developed water treatment and safe storage systems, funded water and sanitation experts who and train local residents in developing areas.

I am proud to be your Rotary District 7150 Governor and member of the Tully Rotary Club. In this month's Rotarian magazine, RI President, John Germ, reminds us that forty years ago the Rotary Club of Duarte, CA admitted 3 women to their Rotary Club. This action was followed on May 4, 1987 by the US Supreme Court stating that US Rotary Clubs could no longer exclude women from membership. On August 11, 1989, Rotary District 715 District Governor, Herbert S. Brown, wrote to Rotary International that "... Rotary International is a organization of business and professional men and women united worldwide to provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build good will and peace in the world. Twenty nine men and women have joined the Tully Provisional Rotary Club and qualified for a Rotary International Club Charter." Proud to be part of that watershed moment in the history of Rotary, 7 women from Tully were recognized as charter members of Tully Rotary when RI President, Hugh M. Archer, signed the original Tully Rotary Charter on October 11, 1989. In 1989, Rotary International Council on Legislation voted to admit women into Rotary clubs worldwide. Frank J. Devlyn, who would go on to become RI president in 2000-01, told the council "My fellow delegates, I would like to remind you that the world of 1989 is very different to the world of 1905. I sincerely believe that Rotary has to adapt itself to a changing world," This vote followed the decades-long efforts of men and women from all over the Rotary world to provide for the admission of women into Rotary clubs. The response to the decision was overwhelming: By 2010, the number of female Rotarians had skyrocketed and was approaching 200,000. Today Rotary District 7150 has been steadily growing in its percentage of female membership, now to represent 35% of our members. We can do better for Rotary Serving Humanity.

NOMINATE A PEACE SCHOLAR TODAY!

Do you know a budding peacemaker? Nominate them for the Rotary World Peace Fellowships and help build peace in the world.

Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers program develops leaders who become catalysts for peace and conflict prevention and resolution. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and fieldstudy expenses.

There are two types of fellowships, a Master's degree fellowship which lasts up to two years and a professional development certificate program which lasts for three months. There is no cost to the scholar, no cost to the club and no cost to the district for Peace Fellows.

In your community, Peace Fellow candidates might be mediators, social workers, law enforcement, and many more. Candidates must have a minimum of three years experience for the Master's program and ten year's for the professional certificate.

Recent changes:

-District Grants can be used to support the following programs of RI: Rotary -Youth Exchange, RYLA, Rotaract, and Interact. NOT GLOBAL GRANTS

-Global Grants- For three years beginning 1 January, clubs and districts will be able to use global grants for the construction of low-cost shelters and simple schools, under a change approved by Foundation Trustees in September. However, the construction must be a part of a comprehensive project related to an area of focus. Construction by itself will not be eligible for global grants. NOT DISTRICT GRANTS.


