JOIN THE GREAT LAKES WATERSHED CLEANUP

Clean up in your area or come to Oswego to help the clubs in our District that sit right on Lake Ontario!

Your Rotary Club is invited to celebrate Earth Day in April by participating in our Great Lakes Watershed Cleanup. The Rotary Districts that border the Great Lakes in the US and Canada are partnering with each other to clean up the shores and public areas of our waterways that flow into the Great Lakes. In our District 7150, this includes the Finger Lakes, Oneida Lake, the Erie Canal and other streams and rivers that eventually empty into the Great Lakes. Your club can pick a river, lake or any water source or public area that connects to the Great Lakes Watershed and plan your own Earth Day event on Saturday April 24 or some other date or time convenient to you. All efforts will still count towards this huge international effort.

We're encouraging clubs to collaborate with other local groups, such as scouts, municipalities, and other volunteer organizations for this. In many areas, you can ask municipalities for safety guidelines, bags, and trash collection after the event. It will also be a public image opportunity, so be sure your members wear their Rotary apparel, take lots of photos, and spread the news. We also have project logos available for any club that wants to use them for shirts, publicity or posters.

If your club prefers to join the Oswego Rotary clubs, they have made arrangements with the City of Oswego, Oswego County, and the State Parks of Selkirk and Sandy Island Beach. The parks are easily accessible and your Rotarians can sign-up for a spot. Time slots are available April 17 to 24 to be sure no one comes out and finds the place already cleaned up.

In addition, Oswego County has submitted an article to I Love NY about the clean-up and NYS will be giving this project more publicity. What a great way to bring focus to the good work of Rotary!
