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Youth Services, has been officially recognized as the Fifth Avenue of Service by Rotary International. This formal action was taken in Chicago during the April 2010 meeting of the Council on Legislation, the legislative arm of Rotary International which meets every three years.

District 7150 has a long tradition of outstanding service around youth services with great support and forward thinking from District leaders.

Rotary International's Structured Programs for Youth Services are;

Rotaract: This is a Rotary sponsored club for ages 18-30. Rotaract focuses on the development of young adults as leaders in their communities and work places. Clubs around the world take part in international service projects, in a global effort to bring peace and international understanding to the world. They are also good partners in service with their sponsoring clubs. Today, Rotaractors can become members of their sponsoring club.

Interact: This is a Rotary sponsored club for ages 12-18. They are typically at a high school or a middle school, although it is not limited to a single school or community. These Youth take part in service projects in local and global communities.

Rotary Youth Exchange: This is the leading international student exchange program in the world. District 7150 sends about 20-30 students out to foreign countries each year and hosts as many students from around the world who spend a year of high school in our communities.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards: In our District, students spend the first weekend of July learning about leadership and leadership skills. Every club in the District is encouraged to send at least one high school student from their local community to benefit from the "life changing experience" offered at RYLA.

Youth service recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities, involvement in community and international service projects and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.

Each year, Rotary connects thousands of young people to a global network of friendship, service and action. As Rotaractors and Interactors, they make a difference in communities at home and abroad. Through Rotary Exchange, they explore new cultures. With Global Leadership Initiative, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Next Generation programs, participants learn skills that will help them succeed as community leaders.

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END POLIO UPDATE

We have had 8 reported cases of wild polio virus so far in 2018 - seven were in Afghanistan and one in Pakistan. At this point in 2017 we had only five cases, so this speaks to the importance of sprinting to the finish line of truly eliminating all cases from the world.

What does it take to vaccinate every child in Afghanistan?

In March, the Afghanistan polio eradication initiative conducted its first nation-wide immunization campaign for polio eradication in 2018. In just under a week, around 70 000 workers knocked on doors and stopped families in health centres, city streets and at border crossings to vaccinate almost ten million children. What an incredible achievement! But what does a huge campaign like this take?
