Dana Jerrard has been a Utica Rotarian since 1986, and in that time has held most of the offices available to a member. Board service in 1989 led to the first of three "sentences" as club Sergeant-at-Arms. From there he moved through the natural progression to club VP, PE, and, in 1994-95, club president under the leadership of PDG Joe McCarthy. Immediately following his year as club president, Dana accepted the role editor of the club's weekly newsletter, an assignment that he held for more than 20 years. This period also included 12 years as club secretary. On the district level, Dana has been newsletter editor, conference House of Friendship coordinator, directory publisher, master of

ceremonies, and, most recently, Assistant Governor for Area 3 clubs. He is a Paul Harris Fellow +2, and a Rotary Foundation Benefactor.

Professionally, Dana spent 30 years at Vicks Lithograph in Yorkville before retiring in 2016. He currently works on a part-time basis at JAY-K Lumber in New Hartford and is also part of the local music community in groups as diverse as Classified, The Clef Dwellers, and the Utica Symphony. Outside of Rotary, Dana was president of the Mohawk Valley Community College Foundation for 13 years, Founder and President of Senior Services of Utica, Pacesetter Campaign Chair for United Way, and President of Family Services of Utica. Currently, he is Alumni Class President for his graduating class at Cornell University.

WORLD POLIO DAY IN DISTRICT 7150

Clubs took on DG Marv's challenge to do more on World Polio Day, October 24th, to bring attention to the importance of eradication and Rotary's role in getting us there!

FIRST EVER WORLD POLIO DAY SYRACUSE

The afternoon of October 24, 2018 in downtown Syracuse was the first time District 7150 has done a World Polio Day event, and it was a great one! Thanks to the work of Rotarian Blessed Sikhosana, the City of Syracuse supported our event, providing the space and an official proclamation from Mayor Ben Walsh. Baldwinsville Rotary provided the refreshments and several clubs participated and attended. The event started with the personal stories of two polio survivors who are currently here studying at Syracuse University. Then many questions were answered with a panel discussion, attendees could get their pinkies painted purple, and then the mayor made the proclamation and we raised the Rotary International flag at Syracuse's City Hall. POLIO STOPPERS TOP OUT AT \$23,000

The Polio Stopper project has now raised \$23,000 for the eradication of Polio. Past RI President John Germ (2016-17) contacted PDG Ward to order 30 PolioStoppers for which he is making a \$3,000 contribution to PolioPlus.

POLIO TRIVIA ANSWERS

Here are the answers to last month's End Polio Now trivia questions:

- 1. Rotary committed to the eradication of polio in 1988, even though some polio vaccine projects were started almost a decade earlier.
- 2. The three countries still considered polio endemic are Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria.
- 3. It is true that children need to be immunized multiple times to be truly protected against polio.
- 4. In order for a country to be declared polio-free, they have to have no new cases of wild polio virus in three years.
- 5. in 2017, 430 million children were immunized against polio (a correct guess could be between 405 and 455 million!)

As World Polio Day was approaching the 16 classes at Hamilton Central Elementary School took on a huge task by participating in a "Pennies for Polio" contest. Mrs. Barbara Albrecht, Hamilton Rotary past president, delivered collection jars for the classrooms to decorate and set up for the collections. The HCS elementary teachers were instrumental in explaining to the students what polio is, the effect on people and how we can help the children of the world. The K-5 classes banded together to take on the challenge to see which class will collect the most pennies during the month long event. Mrs. Albrecht visited the school again on October 9 to meet with some of the students to discuss what they have learned about the disease and the importance of their commitment in raising funds in helping many children worldwide. The kids collectively raised over \$450.00 for this worthy cause. Mr. Poznar's fifth grade class (pictured here) had collected the most pennies during the month long event and was treated to an ice cream social held at the Colgate Inn on October 25 for their dedication and hard work.



DISTRICT SUPPORT AT TOUR DE CURE SUBMITTED BY

The American Diabetes Association CNY Tour de Cure event was held on Sunday, July 29th, 2018 at Oneida Shores Park in Brewerton. The event is the ADA's main fundraising event. Diabetes effects over 30 million people and 84 million aged 20 and over have pre-diabetes! Diabetes is the leading cause kidney failure, non-traumatic lower limb amputations, and new cases of blindness in adults. It is also a major cause of heart disease and strokes and the SEVENTH leading cause of death in the U.S.. A new case of Diabetes is diagnosed every 23 seconds. Tour de Cure events are held throughout the year at over 80 locations nationwide. Participants can ride or walk to raise money in the Fight Against Diabetes. The CNY Tour de Cure event had four different bicycle routes or participants could choose the 5K run/walk. The event started and ended at Oneida Shores Park and along the routes participants were supported by volunteers who set up rest stops with snacks and beverages. There were over 420 participants supported by 100 plus volunteers, resulting in \$169,995 raised!

I've been involved with the CNY Tour de Cure as both a rider and volunteer for many years and each year I see more and more District 7150 Rotary Clubs and Rotarians sign-on to volunteer, sponsor rest stops or ride to raise money. This year was the best ever! Rotarians from Oneida, Sherrill, Fayetteville-Dewitt, Canastota, Chittenango, and Marcellus were out in force. Four Clubs, Oneida, Fayetteville-Dewitt, Canastota, and Chittenango sponsored rest stops! That's a 100% increase from last year. And all four clubs plan to volunteer to support a rest stop in 2019!! As a token of appreciation to District 7150 for the outstanding support to the 2018 CNY Tour de Cure the American Diabetes Association presented a plaque to the District at the recent 2018 Tour de Cure Celebration event. Sherrill Rotarian, Clark Speicher, accepted the plague on behalf of DG Marv Joslyn.
