A MESSAGE FROM DG DANA

The official club visit season is wrapping up, and I feel so privileged to have met with 33 clubs in-person and two clubs via Zoom, to date. What has been striking to me is the extent to which clubs are working to stay connected to their communities, to understand the additional needs created by the pandemic, and to be creative in providing help amidst new regulations, recommendations and mandates. I think Vince Lombardi got it right; adversity reveals character, and I have never been more proud to call myself a Rotarian.

Throughout District 7150, clubs are laser focused on meeting the needs of their local communities. In this time of challenge, this is as it should be. However, I see a great benefit in strengthening the connections between clubs here in central NY, learning about what others are doing just a few miles away, and supporting each other as we Serve to Change Lives. To open the conference, our breakfast speaker will be a person making history in the Rotary world. Jennifer Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, will become the president of Rotary International on July 1, 2022. She will be the first woman to hold that position in the 115-year history of our organization. She will speak to us on the future of Rotary, a topic on the minds of many these days. Jennifer is a dynamic speaker, and I guarantee that you will leave breakfast energized. ♦

CLUBS EARN 20-21 ROTARY CITATION

Congratulations to the Rotary Clubs of Hamilton, New Hartford, and Oriskany Falls. Rotary International announced recently that these three clubs each earned a Rotary Citation for 2020-21. This is the most significant award a Rotary club can receive. Kudos to Lorna Wilson of Hamilton, Ed Gallacher of New Hartford, and Linda Keever of Oriskany Falls who each served as the president of their club during 2020-21 Rotary year. They showed true leadership despite the obstacles they faced during the pandemic.

Achieving this honor was a remarkable accomplishment during a year when Rotarians around the world were challenged. The three clubs were the only ones out of the 41 clubs in District 7150 to earn this distinction, demonstrating their commitment to achieving their goals. Despite a pandemic, each of these clubs kept its focus on continuous connection between their members, and most importantly, serving their communities. This ultimately helps strengthen Rotary and shapes our future. Thank you to each member of Hamilton, New Hartford, and Oriskany Falls Rotary clubs for "service above self" during a very difficult time.

The Rotary Citation, sometimes referred to as the Presidential Citation, is awarded to clubs that meet certain goals or criteria established each year by the incoming Rotary International President. The 2020-21 theme was "Rotary Opens Opportunities", established by past RI President Holger Knaack when he was incoming president. To be eligible for the Rotary Citation, clubs need to begin the year as active clubs in good standing. Leaders from applying clubs select at least 13 out of 25 established goals they wish to apply toward citation achievement through Rotary Club Central. This flexibility allows clubs to choose the goals that are most relevant and achievable. In addition, many goals will be self-reported by marking "achieved" in Rotary Club Central.

The 21-22 presidential theme, "Serve to Change Lives" was announced by RI President Shekhar Mehta when he was incoming president. He urged members to become more involved in service projects, saying that caring for and serving others is the best way to live because it changes not only other people's lives, but also our own. ♦

The Rotary Club of Sauquoit donated \$2,520.00 of locally raised funds and received a matching Rotary Foundation District Grant of \$2,500.00 to purchase 192 ChromeBook covers to help protect laptops that Sauquoit Valley High School students borrow from the school.

It is important to have covers for the Chromebooks that are being utilized by the students in order to reduce damage to the equipment and reduce costs related to damage, repair, or replacement. High School principal, Brian Read is shown in the picture below, along with Rotary Club members and guests, receiving the ChromeBook Covers. Each Chromebook cover was labeled with "Donated by the Rotary Club Of Sauquoit" and the Rotary Brand logo.

The School District was very thankful for the matching contribution of Rotary Foundation Grant funds which doubled the funds donated by the Rotary Club of Sauquoit! ♦



CHITTENANGO HELPS HAITIANS SURVIVE QUAKE

A devastating, 7.2 magnitude earthquake struck Haiti in August. Still struggling from an earthquake in 2010 that damaged or destroyed 800,000 homes, the latest quake severely crippled the country's water systems, leaving a shortage of safe drinking water. The Chittenango Rotary Club stepped up again, as they did in 2010, and partnered with Shelterbox, a global, nonprofit, non-governmental organization that works to provide shelter in areas devastated by natural disasters or conflict. Chittenango's board voted to match their member's donations and raised a total of \$1270, enough to purchase a complete Shelterbox (\$1000), providing a family with a tent and/or materials to repair a home, plus an additional cooking kit (\$250). ♦

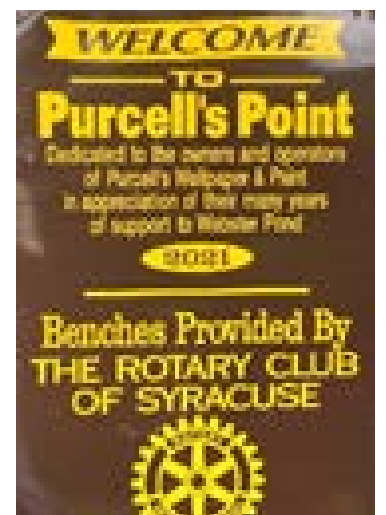

Frequently Asked Questions

What is the cost to attend and what does the cost include?

Plan to follow the current guidelines established by local government and our hosts at the hotel. Since things can change, we will confirm more specifics in the days leading up to the event.



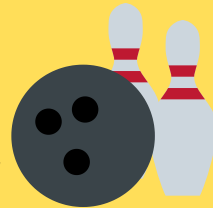

OFFICIAL UPDATE ON POLIO ERADICATION IN AFGHANISTAN

As the sun rose on 1 January 2021, we all worried about what this new year would bring. For those of us who closely follow polio eradication progress, it was an especially worrisome time. 2020 and 2019 had seen an uptick in wild polio virus cases and in circulating vaccine derived cases. Polio vaccinations had had to be suspended for a while in 2020 due to the coronavirus and vaccines for Covid-19 were just starting to receive early use approvals.

The polio news was especially bad in Afghanistan. On the very first day of 2021, a wild polio virus case was reported. In the next week, the national health

minister was fired due to hints of corruption on non-polio matters. Before month's end, the government of Afghanistan ordered the UNICEF polio lead to leave the country relating to a verbal spat that had occurred in the President's office. Then in March and June there were coordinated attacks on polio workers and their security teams leaving eight families having lost loved ones. The Taliban denied responsibility for the attacks, and it appeared the attacks were tied to elements who supported ISIS or ISIL as they are also known. We also noted that some areas of the country had been subject to over 30 months of a ban on house-to-house polio vaccinations.

in Doha, Qatar to discuss polio vaccinations and covid response in the areas controlled by the Taliban. While house to house polio vaccinations were not agreed to, the seven senior members of Taliban leadership indicated support for other measures to provide vaccination activities. In all areas of the country, health screenings continued unabated which showed no new wild polio cases and no positive identification of polio viruses in the environment. In a zoom call of polio partnership leaders the week of 17 August, Aidan O'Leary, the global WHO polio director, noted that Afghanistan has one of the best programs for polio surveillance in the world and it was not finding polio anywhere.

After the fall of the Afghanistan government in mid-August, the new leadership has agreed to keep on the acting health minister who has been effective in righting the program since February. Taliban leaders have visited the national and regional polio offices and pledged their support for the polio eradication program. On 23 August, a Rotary sponsored roadside vaccination hut provided vaccinations to children under five with local Taliban providing the needed security. For security reasons, I will not share the photos I received but it was good to see the Rotary logo doing good in the world.

Rotary has just 35 members in Afghanistan. They inspire me daily with their courage and perseverance. The polio program has always been politically neutral in every country. Rotary and our partners work with the leaders who are in charge. We now work with new leaders in Afghanistan. Rotary funds WHO and UNICEF. We do not send any funds to the governments nor to groups other than WHO and UNICEF. We monitor the spending they do on our behalf very closely. We have never been closer to eradicating polio in Afghanistan. We will continue to work with the Afghani people and our partners to finish what we began 35 years ago. ♦
