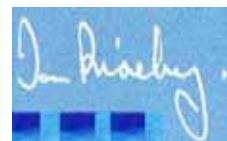
in our communities, and the world.

I joined Rotary in 1978, and I will remain forever grateful to two people. First is my friend, Doctor, and Mentor, Professor Charles Olweny, who invited me and made it his duty to persuade a reluctant and suspicious me to attend a Rotary Club meeting. I finally went out of respect and was pleasantly surprised to discover that the club was full of people I already knew. This is the power of invitation and persistence.

Charles brought me into Rotary. But what made me want to remain a Rotarian were two successful Rotary projects, starting with a young Karimojong girl, Margaret Rose Illukol, from a remote northeastern part of Uganda. Margaret's entire face had been chewed up by a hyena when she was left sleeping alone in the thatched hut of her nomadic parents. The Rotary Club of Kampala took up the case, and after wide press publicity, Australian Rotarians came ahead of American Rotarians and collected Margaret from Kampala and took her to Newcastle, Australia, where it took more than 20 complicated surgeries over several years for her face to be reconstructed. Margaret Rose not only survived, but went on ahead to become a registered nurse at the same hospital where she had been treated. The second project, which the American Rotarians started after they arrived too

late for Margaret, was that today is globally known as the Gift of Life.

This started with successful open-heart surgeries for three children: Grace Agwaru, John Ego and Robinah Nakabuye from Kampala. Thanks to Rotarian generosity, they are all well and alive. This is the power of Rotary projects and for me it was impossible to remain indifferent after learning of these cases.

The second person I am grateful to is PDG Juli Adelusi-Adeluyi of Lagos, Nigeria, who gave me confidence that I could become something. He came to me after I made a small presentation at Hiroji Mukasa's Presidential Conference in 1983 in Nairobi, looked straight at me and said, "Young man, you will one day be a district governor". Juli crossed my Rotary path again twice as an IA trainer in 1987, and as a substitute RI president's personal representative at my district conference in 1988.

Today, 39 years later, because someone invited me, and another one gave me confidence, I stand before you with great joy and utmost humility to accept the nomination as president of Rotary International for 2018-2019.

Friends, I know that many Rotarians would qualify to lead this organization. But only one person can do so at a time, and I am glad and humbled that I was selected to be that person 2018-2019. I was at the bus stop at the right time, and what you see here today is about opportunity. This honor is shared by my family, country and continent, knowing that I am only the second person ever to reach here from that old continent of 55 countries and 1 billion people. Africa has benefited in so many ways from this organization, and it is a continent of great

Rotary potential for membership projects, as well as contributions.

I pledge to look forward and backward to embrace changes, and flexibility to reinforce, rather than lose sight of, the fundamentals of our cherished value propositions. I will continue the culture of collaboration by the troika at the top echelon of our organisation, and draw on the knowledge and experience of the past presidents who have done so much for Rotary. In addition, adherence to strategic planning will be entrenched for smooth annual successions and consistent direction. I look forward to strengthening growth, retention and extension as well as good governance, including evaluations.

Our organisation has made landmark strides globally in polio eradication, health, water, literacy and other concerns, and today we stand tall at the threshold of great possibilities. As a result, we should acknowledge and exploit Rotary's capacity and power to change the world, and I invite you all to join me to propel our Rotary ship into the orbit of relevance, visibility, and sustainability.

Rotary affords us an incredible potential to serve humanity. But the truth must be told. In the process of doing good, we are the biggest beneficiaries, because our lives change. We become better people and enjoy that intrinsic satisfaction to which we cannot put price. It is true that One Profits Most Who Serves Best. Accordingly, let us fold our sleeves and get ready to have fun in Rotary Serving Humanity and Rotary: Making a Difference.

Long live Rotary! May it grow in stature and scope to do even more good in the world, our nations and our world.

“Rotary is defined not by who we are, but by what we do” by the potential that Rotary gives us, and the ways we realize that potential in meaningful and lasting service.

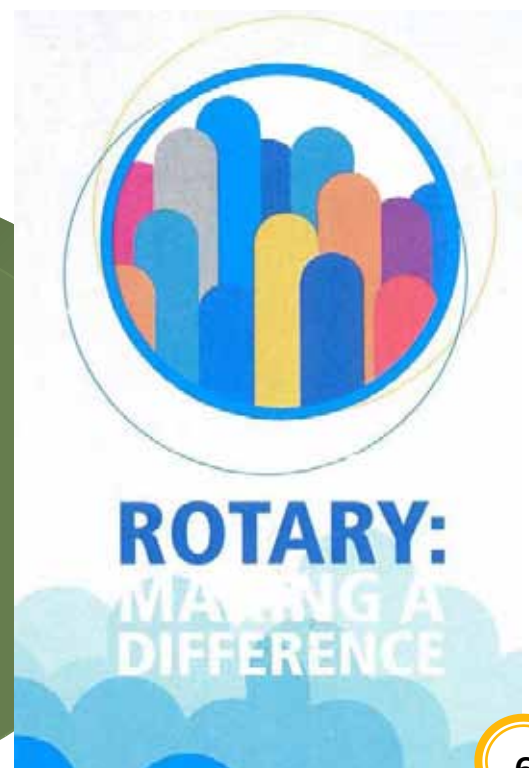
THINK GREEN

MISSION GREEN AT A GLANCE!

As Rotarians, we come together, discuss the challenges facing our communities, get solutions and take action. This year's priority challenge is Environment degradation which has been spearheaded by Governor Ken in what he termed as "Rotary Mission Green". This is a five year plan with two main focus areas:

1. Afforestation: We plan to plant 2.5 million trees during 2017-2018 through highways, schools and farmlands.

2. Energy Savers: We are introducing energy efficient technologies to reduce the use of bio-mass in large institutions.

The Rotary Mission Green team has already engaged both the public and private sectors for technical and financial support. We call upon every Rotarian through your respective clubs to mobilize your communities in which you work to plant trees to sustain our environment by following these six steps below:

ROTARY MISSION GREEN EXPECTATIONS FROM CLUBS

Step	Tick
1. Appoint a Rotary Mission Green Officer	
2. Launch Rotary Mission Green 2017	
3. Identify local partners for funding, land and labour	
4. Complete the Rotary Green Mission project form and submit to info@rotarymissiongreen.org indicating the nature of the project	
5. Liaise with Mission Green team to sign off MoU's with agreed partners through info@rotarymissiongreen.org	
6. Actual Tree Planting	

District Goals 2017-2018

Youth Service:

1. 80% of clubs sponsoring at least one Interact club or one Rotaract club.
2. At least one RYLA event (in each of the two countries) with at least 400 participants per event

Membership:

1. At least 10 new clubs initiated or chartered in Uganda and at least 5 in Tanzania
2. Increase membership retention from the current 50% to 80%
3. Growth in membership increased to 1000 in absolute terms (625 from existing clubs & 375 from new clubs)

The Rotary Foundation:

4. Leadership development at all levels

1. Each club to have at least one significant project
2. More than 50% of the clubs to have at least one global grant project
3. Each club to take on at least one impactful health project

Looking back to that Sunday evening when I got a call from my friend and brother to join him for a meeting with some friends, I must say I do not regret giving him an affirmative answer and going further to show up for the meeting. Having been tasked by Rotarian Mike Sebalu, to spearhead the formation of the **Rotaract Club of Bukoto** are the moments that will forever be a Rotary Moment in my life. I had my first official meeting at then Steak-out Bar and Lounge, little did I know that this meeting will be a life changing one.

The prevalence of HIV infection is at 7% as per 2015 study in Uganda. With introduction of Anti-retroviral treatment, there is better prognosis. However patients can still fail to respond to this treatment. This means that the patients continue to succumb to AIDS.

According to Malaria Control Program Bulletin of 2016, malaria is the leading cause of death among Ugandan claiming over 27% lives of Ugandans. The situation might not be very different for Tanzania. Both of the above diseases are preventable and it is our role as Rotarians to join in the fight to prevent these two diseases from claiming lives of our people.

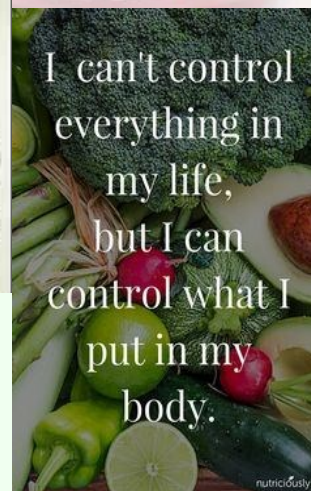

Rotary Cancer Run advancing cancer treatment in Uganda

had never imagined. The participants totaled 20,000. The real outcome of the Rotary Cancer Run now in its sixth year has been the cancer centre at Nsambya Hospital.

"We managed together with our partners to build a 36-bed Rotary Centenary Bank Cancer Centre at Nsambya Hospital,"

PDG Stephen Mwanje, Chair of the Uganda Rotary Cancer Program says.

"It is operational today with some basic equipment and furniture. However, there is a still long way to go to make it truly a center of excellence in the treatment of cancer," he adds.

"This year, our focus is to raise money needed to build a bunker for the linear accelerator at Nsambya Hospital," explains Rotarian Patrick Kunobwa, the chair for the Rotary Cancer Run this year.

With the bunker built and the linear accelerator installed, the first phase of this previously mindboggling task would have been completed. "It is not an easy job as we need raise over a million dollars to achieve this," Rotarian Kunobwa adds.

However, even if the bunker was built and inaugurated today, the need for more cancer centres in the country will remain. At least each of the other four major regions in the country will too need this technology.

Six years ago, Rotarians in Uganda embarked on what many thought was an ambitious project to build a cancer centre that would provide specialist treatment and early detection for cancer patients. Their vision was a centre of excellence that would provide the vital early detection and cure of cancer, pre and post treatment care and most importantly save many lives that were being lost needlessly.

With support of Corporates led by Centenary Bank, and a big push from St. Francis Hospital, Nsambya who gave us free land on which to build the center, construction work started in April 2011.

In August 2012, the Cancer Run was launched as the flag bearing fundraising vehicle. The results have been very humbling. We were able to complete the building to house the center and handed it over to Nsambya hospital in July 2015.

The run has proved to be popular with thousands of people turning up to run in what is one of the biggest Rotary events anywhere in the world.

In 2016, we introduced upcountry runs in most of the major towns in Uganda and we had the event in 16 towns on the same day drawing in thousands of people in races that the country
