In many ways, The Rotary Foundation is an invisible presence in our clubs. Most of what we do in our clubs and our districts, on a weekly basis, we do without the active involvement of the Foundation. But our Foundation is invisible in our clubs in the same way the foundation of a building is invisible when you're in it: Just because you don't see it doesn't mean it's not holding you up.

The Foundation that enabled Rotary to take on polio is, in many ways, the foundation upon which our Rotary service is built. For 100 years, since it came into existence with a first donation of \$26.50, the Foundation has supported and strengthened our service, enabled our ambitions, and allowed us to be the organization that we are. Because of the Foundation, Rotarians know that if we have the ambition and put in the work, very little is truly beyond us.

It is an incredibly effective model that we have here in Rotary, one that no other organization can match. We are completely local and completely global: We have local skills, connections, and knowledge in over 35,000 clubs, in nearly every country of the world. We have a deserved reputation for transparency, effectiveness, and good business practices, and because we are highly skilled professionals as well as volunteers, we achieve a level of efficiency that very few other organizations can approach.

To put it simply, a dollar given to The Rotary Foundation has a great deal more muscle than a dollar given to most charities. If you want to spend a dollar on Doing Good in the World, you can't do better than to spend it with the Foundation. That is not just

me speaking out of pride; it is verifiably true and is reflected in our rankings by independent organizations.

In the Foundation's centennial year, Rotarians surpassed our goal of raising \$300 million. If you were part of that achievement, you have been part of something tremendous. Somewhere in the world, some place you have probably never been, people you may never meet will lead better lives because of you. Ultimately, it is our Foundation that lets us make good on our core beliefs: that we can make a difference, that we have an obligation to do so, and that working together, as well and as efficiently as we can, is the only way to effect real and lasting change.

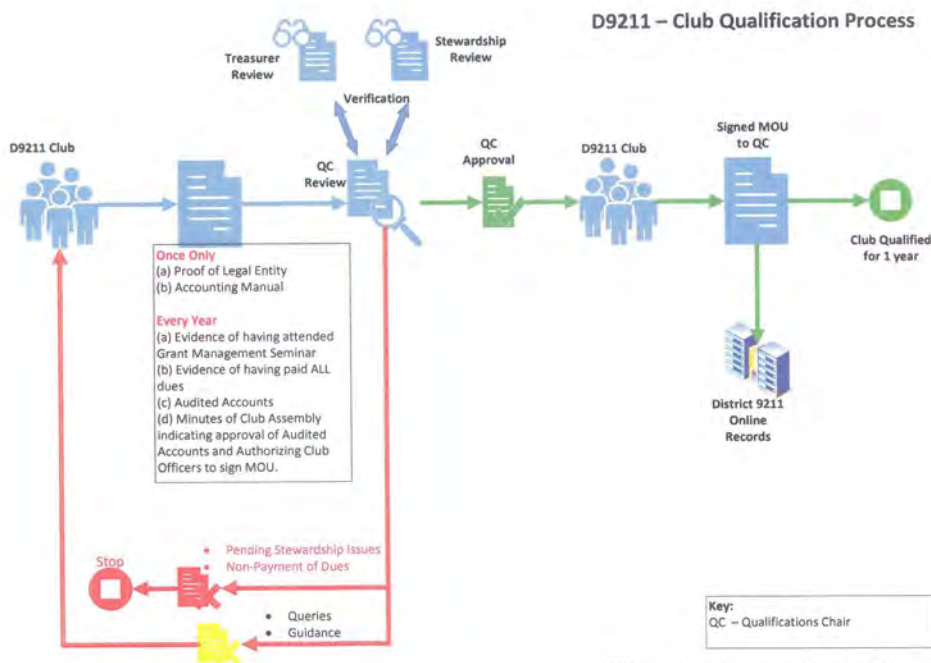

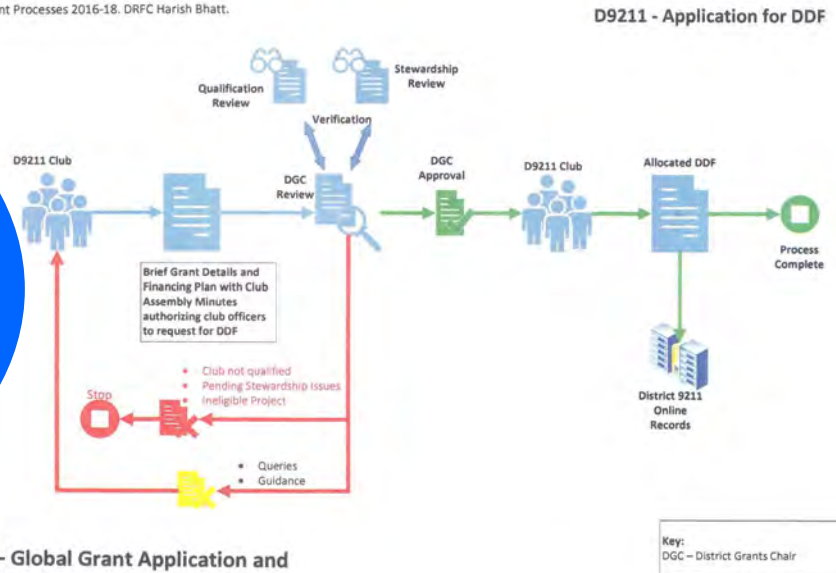

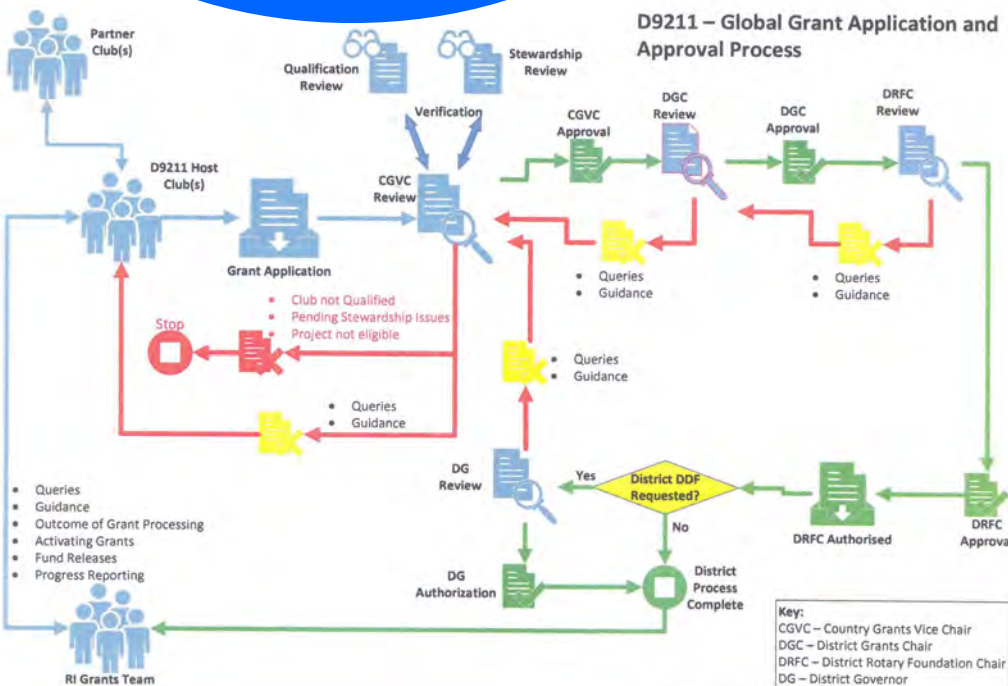

WHAT PARTICIPANTS SAY!

I have recently graduated from the Rotary Leadership Institute graduate class after completing Part 1, 2 and 3 of the undergraduate course. Two things have struck me about the class. The first is the fact that in spite of their heavy schedules, our facilitators not only make the time to teach us or better still lead the discussions in the classes over a period of two months but they also pay to do so just as we their students do. This is in humility for me. A clear example of what it means to offer **"Service Above Self"**. More critically however, the class is an in-depth reflection of why I am a Rotarian in the first place. Apart from an opportunity to make new friends and acquaintances the class was a period of self reflection or more specifically self analysis regarding who I am, what my strengths and weaknesses are and how to use them or channel them towards improving not only myself but also my Rotary Club. My eyes were opened to the fact that I am the change that my Rotary club is waiting for. That I should be able to apply my faculties, my vantage points, my contacts, my energies to improve the performance of my club from where it currently is to where I want it to be. My experience of the graduate class was therefore worthwhile. Anyone who is interested in becoming a leader of their club should attend this training for it helps almost literally dig out the leader in you. It also challenges one to realize that they need not be a leader with a title in order to effect change within and outside their clubs. Like PDG Tusu cautioned we need to prioritize leadership in our homes first, our businesses second and then in our Rotary clubs, We should not get the priorities wrong.

Being new to Rotary and being hopelessly curious, I jumped at the opportunity to learn more through the Rotary Leadership Institute. The institute seeks to improve leadership skills and Rotary knowledge amongst Rotarians, or even aspiring Rotarians. It has been a worthwhile experience.

The first part, the undergraduate, was more about learning the mechanics of things like how the Rotary Foundation works, how to create vibrant clubs. Then came the graduate class. It focused on not just building lively clubs, but perfect clubs by challenging us to see possibilities over the horizon without being hobbled by past experience. It also dealt with how to live as a Rotarian. We know that listening is important. Just how was demonstrated through a simple exercise. Each person in a pair was given different instructions outside the hearing of the other. Mine was to tell my partner the values I live by. The moment I started to speak, she picked up her phone and kept herself busy. I said some more, thinking I was talking gibberish. Nothing changed. I seethed. It was the same across the room, as we found out in plenary. The point was that to listen is to look your interlocutor in the eye, to set aside your phone and computer. It is to give that person full attention so that you not only listen, but actually hear. This is partly how we create meaningful relationships, meaningful clubs where everyone is valued. Hearing each other makes for a kinder world. As it turns out, the things we learned in all of the five classes are not just good in making one a great Rotarian. The lessons apply in the home, at work, and in the Rotary club. To live as a Rotarian is to live as a decent human being. This is a challenge well worth pursuing. And I will start by going easy on that smartphone.

Every individual's experience of Rotary is unique. When I joined the Rotaract Club of Kampala Ssesse Islands, in July 2015, I was not sure what to expect because unlike most clubs whose primary focus is the guarantee of some financial benefit, Rotary and its functions are premised on service beyond self. The challenge here is to find purpose in an environment that does not promise any immediate gain other than to contribute to a collective effort that will benefit others. I joined the Undergraduate Class at the Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) in August 2016 in an attempt to understand why Rotary was the exceptional association it is. The first course was about identifying, harnessing and improving your leadership skills. I was amazed by the volume and quality of information and resources that the RLI faculty had prepared for the Programme. On the back of my RLI experience the previous year, I was greatly honored to be invited again to attend the Graduate Class this year in September. I was the only Rotaractor in the Classroom and this realization filled me with a great sense of pride. In fact the Rotarians in attendance, on noticing that my nametag read **"RCT KLA SSESE"** must have thought that I was in the wrong place. The training as a whole, however, addresses the challenge involved in identifying the purpose of Rotary; What is Rotary?; What does it stand for?; What are the administrative challenges involved and, Are they universal or unique to a few Rotary clubs?. However, the nature of the training also poses some vital questions on a personal level - it creates a reality check in your life. As we pondered challenges and solutions involved in the environment of Rotary, it soon became clear communication and leadership were the most important common factor in all that we discussed. The solutions we identified to the challenges our clubs faced all involved improving our communication and leadership

skills.

The reality is that the governance and administrative challenges many clubs face can only be solved by competence in leadership; being purposeful and intentional at your leadership. A good leader should not allow themselves to be stuck in the past. The world is always evolving and sometimes it is best to look out for the possibility in new things as opposed to the old way of doing things.

Listening (patient and inclusive gathering of information) to the people you lead is paramount. You cannot solve problems that you are not even aware exist; issues affecting the people you are leading. This is closely followed by integrity and accountability as well as honesty (being true to your word). These, for me, are some of the vital and most admirable qualities of a leader. The most important thing that I learnt is that you cannot be a leader in selective circumstances. You have to practice responsibility and responsible conduct at all times. The qualities that identify an individual as a leader should be evident across all aspects of their life. The best way to improve yourself as a leader is to exercise your leadership skills right from your home/family, the work place, then within your clubs and finally to the rest of the world. My journey as an RLI student has been a life changing experience. I would advise every guest of Rotary to explore this opportunity as a way of transforming themselves as leaders, but even better, as extra ordinary Rotarians.
