We want every club to complete a service project for our military and veterans this year! Some already have firm plans, but if yours doesn't, here are a few ideas:

Care packages to deployed troops. We'll get you a packing list and contact info.

Food pantries and clothing closets are in Senatobia, Jackson, Corinth, Starkville, and Camp Shelby. All need dry goods, soap, deodorant, razors, and shaving cream.

May is Military Appreciation Month. Coordinate something special with Memorial Day. Also, May 7, 2021 is Military Spouse Day. Gifts for the spouses, maybe?



Think about a Veterans Day program as close to November 11 as possible.

Contact your local armory (there's one in every county) to present something to them at drill. Most have a Christmas event in December for soldiers and their families. Google the National Guard or your county or city to find the local armory info (they would need to be contacted between 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.).

Let us know by August 15, in an email, what your club will be doing. Alert your local media when you roll out your project, as the coverage will help others know the wonderful things you are doing in your community—and make sure we at District have a copy of the newspaper feature, radio interview, or television interview. We will keep all of them on file. For that matter, let me know of the service projects of all kinds that your club will be doing this year! We want to keep those great ideas on file here at the District, too!

The Kay Steed Award

A tribute to District 6820's First Female Governor

Since spring 2016, The Kay Steed Award has been presented each year to the female Rotarian judged as having provided exceptional contribution, personal commitment, and service to District 6820. The award is unique in that it is a traveling display of decorative Rotary lapel pins collected from across the country and the world by one of Mississippi's first and foremost female Rotarians.



Kay Steed was an early member of the Madison-Ridgeland Rotary Club and set the bar for women in leadership roles. Active in business and community, she quickly rose through the club and district officer ranks to become the 2003-2004 District Governor. Kay remains the gold standard for women in Rotary.

Past District Governor Bob Graves highlights the history behind the award. He says that "Kay's daughter worked at a bank in Winona. The VP was a Rotarian. She told

me at Rotary that Kay's daughter had all the Rotary pins Kay had collected over the years, and she wanted to give them to someone that was a Rotarian. Kay loved Rotary so much and had been such a trailblazer for Women in Rotary. I suggested that an outstanding female Rotarian should be honored, and Kay's pins would make a nice award."



PDG Bob also fondly recalls that

"I proposed Kay for membership to the Madison-Ridgeland Club. In about the fastest time you could do it, Kay became DG. I love Kay. I am proud that the District recognizes her with this award."
