#### MARK DIBIASE APPROVED AS DISTRICT GOVERNOR NOMINEE

Mark DiBiase was approved at the District 6820 Business Meeting in mid-June as the new District Governor Nominee. He will follow DG Elect Mark Anderson, who will succeed DG Ed Thurmond.

Mark DiBiase graduated Magna Cum Laude from Grove City College with a B.S. in Electrical Engineering and Computer Systems. He has over 31 years of project, production, engineering and computer experience, holding a variety of management positions with



Milwaukee Electric Tool, James Hardie, U.S. Gypsum, and Armstrong. In 2003, he became President and Owner of Infinite Concepts, a computer network and administration firm located in Greenville. His company received the "Greenville Honors It's Own" award in 2009 for its support of the arts and was honored as a "Top in Tech 2019" recipient by the *Mississippi Business Journal*.

A Rotarian for 15 years, Mark has served as Assistant Governor for District 6820 for the past two years. He also serves on the 6820 International Service Committee and has participated in both the 2019 and 2020 International Service Trips to Guadalajara, Mexico. He previous served on the Board of Directors for the Rotary Club of Greenville from 2011–2019. As President in 2017-2018, he helped guide his club to the District 6820 Large Club of the Year Award. Mark is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow and a Paul Harris Society member.

Mark has served on and has been President of multiple community Boards of Directors in Greenville including The Greenville Arts Council, Delta Center Stage, and The United Way of Washington County. He lives outside Leland with his wife Rhonda, also a Rotarian a Paul Harris Fellow, and has two grown children, Courtney and Anthony.
