Rotary started with the vision of one man – Paul Harris.

Paul was born on 19th April 1868 in Racine, Wisconsin, USA. At the age of 3 he moved to Vermont where he grew up in the care of his paternal grandparents. He attended the University of Vermont and then Princeton University where he received his law degree from the University of Iowa in 1891.

In 1896, Paul settled in Chicago and opened a law practice and four years later, he met fellow attorney Bob Frank where they walked around the area. Paul was impressed that Bob was friendly with the many shopkeepers, noticing a sense of camaraderie among businessmen considering there must be many other young man who had moved from rural areas to the big city that needed fellowship too.

Paul eventually persuaded several business associates to discuss the idea of forming an organisation for local professions. On 23rd February 1905 the first meeting of what would become Rotary began. Whilst they first met to network and offer fellowship, they soon realised they had the opportunity to help others. When Paul became president in 1907 he initiated their first service project, creating a public toilet in downtown Chicago.


At the end of 1907 Paul wanted to expand Rotary beyond the city and in 1910 Rotary had expanded to several other major US cities. They soon formed a national association with an executive board of directors and in 1910 they held their first Rotary convention where the 16 existing clubs unified under a national organisation – Rotary International.

In the mid 1920's Paul started becoming the public face of Rotary International promoting membership and service where he attended conventions and visited clubs throughout the world, accompanied by his wife, Jean.

Harris died on 27th January 1947 at the age of 78 after a prolonged illness. Before his death, he made it known that he preferred contributions to The Rotary Foundation in lieu of flowers. Just before he passed away Rotary leaders had committed to a major fundraising effort and in the 18months since he passed the Paul Harris Memorial Fund raised over \$1.3 million, helping to support The Rotary Foundation's first programme – scholarships for graduate study abroad, a legacy programme that continues to exist today!

Stephanie A. Urchick has been an RI director and Rotary Foundation trustee and has served Rotary in numerous capacities, including as training leader, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and RI president's representative. In addition, Urchick was a representative and member-atlarge at three sessions of the Council on Legislation.

Urchick has also served as chair of the Strategic Planning Committee and The Rotary Foundation's Centennial Celebration Committee, as well as a member of various Rotary committees, including the Election Review Committee and Operational Review Committee.

A Rotary member since 1991, Urchick has participated in a variety of international service projects, including National Immunization Days in India and Nigeria. In Vietnam, she worked with clubs to help build a primary school and travelled to the Dominican Republic to install water filters. A student of several Slavic languages, she has mentored new Rotary members in Ukraine and coordinated a Rotary Foundation grant for mammography equipment and a biopsy unit for a hospital in Poland. In its commemorative book, the Rotary Club of Krakow, Poland, noted Urchick as a key figure for helping the rebirth of Rotary in post-Communist Poland. Urchick has also helped to pair clubs and districts in the U.S. with Rotary clubs in Albania, Kosovo, and Ukraine for humanitarian and educational services.

Urchick's professional background is in the higher education, consulting, and entertainment industries. She received her doctorate degree in Leadership Studies from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and has been recognized by The Rotary Foundation and numerous community and international organizations.

Urchick asks members to champion Rotary's Action Plan so they can improve their clubs and keep Rotary strong, find a balance between continuity and change, and work for peace. She also emphasizes the continuing importance of the effort to eradicate Polio. She urges members to join or initiate PolioPlus Societies in their districts and do all they can to help end the disease. Urchick will lead the 2025 Rotary Presidential Peace Conference in Istanbul, Turkey, 20-22 February 2025, with the theme Healing in a divided world.

There are several ways to give to our Rotary Foundation.

Club Giving:

Annual Club Giving: It is recommended that each Club raise and donate \$125NZD per member to the Rotary Foundation.

Polio Club Giving: This is funds directly for Polio and for 2024 – 2025 each Club is asked to donate \$500 towards this important work. This is on top of Annual Club Giving.

Personal Giving:

Centurion Programme: This is a personal donation of \$100NZD or more directly to the Rotary Foundation. This donation is tax deductible and each dollar earns you Foundation recognition points. Once you receive 1,000 points or \$1,000USD you can be recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow which you can choose to keep or recognise someone who goes above and beyond in our community.

Polio Plus Society: This is our new initiative where members pledge \$100NZD directly to the EndPolio campaign. <u>Learn more here</u>. This also earns you Foundation recognition points.



Global grants support large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus. By working together to respond to real community needs, clubs and districts strengthen their global partnerships.

What global grants support:

Global grants can fund:

• Humanitarian projects

Scholarships for graduate-level academic studies

• Vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about their field or to learn more about it themselves

How they're funded:

Global grants have a minimum budget of \$30,000USD and a maximum World Fund award of \$400,000USD. Grant sponsors can use a combination of District Designated Funds (DDF), cash, and/or <u>directed gift and endowed fund program</u> <u>award spendable amounts</u> to fund a global grant. The Foundation will provide an 80 percent World Fund match for all DDF contributions. There is no minimum World Fund match.

GLOBAL GRANTS

District Grants are small-scale, short-term activities that address the needs in your community (and abroad.) Each club has the option to choose how they would like to help their community. District Grants are valued at \$2,000NZD

District Grant funds come directly from the District's Club and Personal giving to the Rotary Foundation. The more we donate the more District Grants we can do.


To qualify for a District Grant, Clubs must have completed Rotary Foundation training and signed an MOU by 1st August 2024.

District Grant applications are due by 30th September 2024 with final report (and photos) due by 1st August 2025

END POLIO

END POLIO



Polio is a crippling disease that mainly affects children under 5 years old. It can be deadly and there is no bias by race, culture, socio-economic situation or country.

Luckily for the children of the world, a group of committed Rotarians had a dream to eradicate this terrible disease. There is no cure for Polio but there is a vaccine.

Rotarians in the 1979 took on what was deemed an impossible task to immunise children against Polio. The World Health Organisation wasn't sure it could be done, but Rotarians quickly proved we were not only up for the job, but we could lead the campaign and in 1979 Rotarians kicked off a multi-year immunisation programme to immunise over 6million children in the Philippines.

Since then, Rotarians have not only led the way in fundraising, but have advocated to Governments, formed relationships with donors of all levels specifically the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation who match all Rotary donations 2:1 to the value of \$100million USD per year.

There are a handful of cases left in just two countries – Afghanistan and Pakistan.

<u>**Clubs**</u> are encouraged to continue to donate to the EndPolio campaign with a goal of each club contributing a minimum \$500NZD this year. This will help us continue the fight and to eradicate this disease for the children of tomorrow.

POLIOPLUS SOCIETY



One of Rotary's great legacies will be eradicating the world of the crippling disease that is Polio.

Rotary has been at the forefront of all aspects of the Polio campaign and whilst there were 350,000 cases worldwide in the late 1970's, there have just been 17 cases in 2024. Rotary has led this campaign and has led the immunisation of over 2.5 billion children worldwide.

We truly are "this close" to Ending Polio but the fight isn't over yet. We need to continue to support the End Polio campaign to finish the job.

Therefore, we are launching the PolioPlus Society which is an annual **personal** pledge of \$100NZD per year until we eradicate this deadly disease. It costs \$3USD (\$5NZD) to immunise a child against Polio.

It is expected to declare the world Polio-Free within the next 5 – 7 years (fingers crossed!)

You can join this new initiative through contacting our Polio Plus Coordinator, Peter Garnett. MEET THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR Jenn Wong is a second generation Rotarian. Her father, Ian McKenzie has served over 50 years in both Rotaract and the Rotary Club of Henderson. Rotary is in Jenn's blood!

When studying at the University of Otago, Jenn wanted to give back to her local community and joined Dunedin Rotaract and it was here that her first formal Rotary experiences were made.

Since then, she has been a RYLA participant and involved in Pupuke Rotaract. In 2013, Jenn was selected as District 9910's representative to the Rotary Global Peace Forum in Hiroshima, Japan. This ignited Jenn's passion for international service and networking.

In 2014 after attending Rotary International Convention in Sydney, Jenn formally joined Takapuna Rotary (now North Shore Rotary). She has served as President in 2017 – 2018 and served on many District Committees including; RYLA, Foundation and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Jenn is passionate about empowering Clubs to achieve and is here to support all Rotarians. She encourages all Rotarians to find their moment of magic within Rotary. It is this lifechanging moment that will not only transform the lives of others but also our own as Rotarians.

Jenn is energetic and keen to promote Rotary in different and fun ways. A new Mum to Baby Ethan, she is passionate about Maternal and Child Health.

CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARD (PREVIOUSLY ROTARY CITATION)

The Club Excellence Award (previously Club Citation) recognises the hard work clubs do throughout the year. Taking action toward achieving the required number of goals help clubs engage their members, stay relevant in our communities, and run more efficiently. A welcoming and engaging club also reflects the values of Rotary. When clubs work to achieve these goals, they also contribute to the overall health and culture of Rotary for generations to come.

To be eligible, clubs need to be active in good standing and having no outstanding Rotary International dues.

Goals:

Clubs can choose their goals but they should relate to the District Governor's action plan (which relates to Rotary's action plan) and should achieve over 50% of these goals. The goals must be entered in Rotary Club Central and should choose goals that are relevant and achievable to their club. Clubs should choose a minimum of four goals per priority.

It is advised that Club's provide feedback/commentary of their goals each quarter. Final feedback/ratings must be updated by 30th June 2025.



LOCAL ROTARY PROGRAMMES

ROTARY NZ WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE

RNZWCS was established to recognise the need to take a New Zealand wide view of World Community Service and each of the five NZ Districts are represented on the board.

RNZWCS is registered with the Charities Commission (CC26860).

Of particular importance is the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade requirement to have a single New Zealand interface when accessing funds. RNZWCS is recognised by the New Zealand Government as a Non-Government Organisation (NGO).

Clubs seeking funding must work through RNZWCS which maintains a register of potential projects and provide opportunities for clubs to participate in larger world community service projects.

Details of the criteria and the procedure for applying for grants and other information can be found on the <u>RNZWCS website</u>.

RNZWCS also operates a Donations in Kind scheme which advises on needs, provides storage and coordinates the distribution of goods, including emergency response kits (ERKs), particularly to the Pacific Islands.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE KITS (ERKS)

When disaster such as a tsunami or cyclone strikes in the Pacific, families can lose everything. They need help immediately. In a few short minutes, an earthquake, tsunami, flood or cyclone can take away whole villages - loved ones, homes, belongings, crops and animals, livelihoods. Rotary assists with Emergency Response Kits (ERKs) which are housed throughout the Pacific Islands.

In an emergency, the most pressing need is for basic supplies to help a family survive the first few days. They need shelter, food, clothing, drinking water, bedding, tools, and medical supplies. People can be difficult to reach therefore kits must be light enough to be airlifted and carried by two people.

Each kit holds over 60 items packed in a 78-litre container which can be used to treat drinking water – there are purifying tablets for this purpose. With a little ingenuity, families can create a shelter from tarpaulins using the hammer and nails provided. There's a folding shovel for digging trenches. Food is key so there's fishing gear, a hunting knife, and cooking equipment. As well as basic clothing, there are bed covers for warmth. Maintaining hygiene and treating minor injuries is important too; a medical pack with items such as soap, painkillers and antiseptic cream provides the basics.

A complete ERK costs \$600 but every dollar helps towards assembling the Kits with their life-saving contents and having them airfreighted.

ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity that provides emergency shelter and lifesaving supplies to families around the world who are affected by disasters.

ShelterBox responds to earthquakes, floods, tsunamis, hurricanes, landslides, typhoons and conflict, delivering lifesaving aid to families across the globe at a time when they need it the most.

The ShelterBox solution is to provide a large box, tailored to each type of disaster but typically containing a disaster relief tent for an extended family, blankets, water purification and storage 40 equipment, cooking utensils, a stove, a basic tool kit, a children's activity pack and other essential items.

ShelterBox relies entirely on public donations and could not operate without the generosity of Rotarians and people the world over. A ShelterBox can be sponsored for NZ\$1,500 – which takes into account the cost of all materials, packing, storage, transport worldwide and delivery to families in need at a time of disaster by a team of ShelterBox volunteers.

Highly trained ShelterBox Response Team volunteers or SRT's, distribute boxes on the ground, working closely with local government organizations, international aid agencies and Rotary clubs worldwide. Every ShelterBox bears its own unique number so that as a donor you can track your box all the way to its recipient country, via the ShelterBox website.

To date more than I million people have been provided with shelter, warmth and dignity following more than 170 disasters, in over 75 countries.

SHELTERBOX

ROMAC is a humanitarian Rotary programme which has been in operation since 1988. Their mission is to provide medical treatment for children 15 years and under, who are from developing countries of the South Pacific region, for life-saving and/or dignity restoring surgery not accessible to them in their home country.

Objectives:

- Give hope and restore dignity to transform a child's life
- Provide the best possible surgical and medical expertise
- Engage Rotary and the community at all levels to fund and support surgery for children
- Maintain and improve the quality of the management process and ensure high quality governance of the ROMAC program

Rotarians volunteer their time and expertise to run this Rotary programme which encompasses and is endorsed by all Australian and New Zealand Rotary Districts.

ROMAC has no employees, no buildings, and no vehicles and consequently almost 100% of donations and grants received by ROMAC is spent on the children.

Wherever possible eminent Australian and New Zealand surgeons donate their time for the treatment of our patients and these surgeons get unique opportunities to develop their specialist skills. During their recovery after surgery, the children and care-giver are looked after by New Zealand families, fostering international learning and understanding in the process.

Two parts to the exchange – inbound, students from overseas that come to NZ and Outbound, students from NZ that go overseas. We cannot send out students without accepting students into NZ.

We encourage all clubs to be involved in RYE. Your hosting and financial support is always appreciated.

- Outbound financial support is approx. \$800

Interact is a high school based Rotary Club where young people (Yr 10 - 13) have the opportunity to do local community service whilst learning governance skills.

There are over 13,151 Interact clubs around the world and 9 clubs in D9910.

Each club is encouraged to undertake at least two major service projects of their choice. One to benefit the local community and the other to promote international understanding.

Rotaract is a Rotary sponsored service club for young adults who are dedicated to Rotary service ideals. Rotaractors are partners in service to their Sponsor Rotary Club. They organise local and international service projects and often go on to become Rotarians.

INTERACT AND Rotaract

RYDA is more than a programme, it's a partnership which supports teachers on the journey as they provide their students with the tools and understanding they need to see themselves as active, responsible road citizens.

RYDA provides students with the tools, habits and motivation to take action and stay safe on our roads as both drivers and passengers throughout their lives.

Long term change will only be realised where educational materials support each-other and key messages are repeated over time. RYDA, a program professionally developed by leading learning organisation, Road Safety Education Limited (RSE), is designed to complement the high school curriculum.

RYDA features a highly engaging and memorable one-day workshop which front-loads students' understanding of road safety. The workshop sessions are designed to be held in small classroom sized groups (approximately 25 students) and are led by a team of trained facilitators including Police, driving instructors and other community sector specialists.

RYDA is delivered to over 660 high schools throughout Australia and New Zealand, with an average of 40,000 students participating in the RYDA Programme every year.

ROTARY YOUTH DRIVER AWARENESS (RYDA) ALSO KNOWN AS ROAD SAFETY EDUCATION (RSE)

Extraordinary event for young adults (20 – 28 years) promoting and teaching hands-on leadership skills.

We encourage clubs to reach out to local businesses to identify young leaders and seek co-sponsorship. Limited to 40 participants this is a life-changing week long event where delegates learn leadership, communication and team building skills.

Applications close 31 January and costs are approx. \$1,200



Model United Nations Assembly is a joint event with D9910 and D9920 and is an incredible opportunity for Year 12 & 13 students to develop their awareness of the UN, international situations whilst debating and improving their public speaking skills.

It encourages students to make informed comments on world problems whilst sharing their opinions and developing new friendships.

This annual event is usually held in May 2025 and costs approx. \$275 per team (of three students.) The cost is usually split between the Sponsor Club and the School.

J R MCKENZIE TRUST

The late Sir John McKenzie founded the Trust in 1940 to mark the centennial of New Zealand.

This Trust funds a wide range of charitable organizations working in the areas of health, social services and community development.

There are six J.R .McKenzie metropolitan committees comprising mostly Rotarians.

Priority is given to disadvantaged families and children and also Māori development.

J R MCKENZIE YOUTH TRUST

To assist the betterment, education, advancement, and physical welfare of youth in New Zealand, particularly in cases where bereavement, sickness or family disturbances leave the children in need of assistance with their education.

- Secondary School Fees (excluding school donations)
- Tertiary Fees in some special cases, School uniforms and clothing
- Special Tuition Fees and assessments
- Textbooks and stationery.

HAROLD THOMAS ROTARY TRUST

Harold Thomas was NZ's first Rotary International President and in 1983 the Harold Thomas Trust was formed. In 1985, Past District Governor, Bernie Ross and his wife gave a significant gift to the Trust.

The Trust now has available approximately \$100,000 for distribution each year and considers applications for grants as soon as received.

Assistance to Rotary clubs is usually limited to 50% of the cost of the project up to a maximum of \$10,000 for each project.

The objects of the trust are to:

- Assist financially any child Resident in the Pacific Islands who is in need of medical treatment or care in NZ, including fares and related costs.
- Provide medical assistance for children in NZ or elsewhere.
- For medical research (related to children)
- For charitable purposes as defined in the Charitable Trusts Act.

The Trustees encourage Clubs to make use of this fund by searching out deserving projects requiring assistance, then making application through the Chairperson - Graeme Emerson District 9920.

CHENERY MEMORIAL TRUST, LOIS DALLEY AND JUNE GRAY TRUST To assist individual Rotary Club projects with subsidy payments which are available only for projects in New Zealand and not for any costs relating to travel.

The three trusts may be able to assist individual Rotary Club projects on a \$1 for \$1 basis.

The total amount available from the Trusts for any one project is usually limited to \$3,000.

Please note the Chenery Memorial Trust and the June Gray Charitable Trust meet early in the months of March, June, September and December.

The Lois Dalley Charitable Trust meets early in March and September each year.

The subsidy is available only for projects in New Zealand and not for any costs relating to travel.

VIKI CHEVOLOT YOUTH EXCHANGE TRUST

The late Viki and Robert Chevolot of New Caledonia founded this Trust in 1995, because of the love they shared for the Rotary International Youth Exchange Programme and youth in general.

The Trustees for the fund will include the current District Governor and the current District Chairperson of the Rotary Youth Exchange Committee.

Any club that believes they have a suitable applicant may apply for funding. Clubs are encouraged to donate to the Trust.

AUCKLAND ROTARY JUBILEE TRUST

Auckland Rotary Jubilee Trust exists to provide a once-in-alifetime opportunity for young self-starters to achieve a level of study in areas such as, but not limited to, the arts, that would not be possible without financial support.

The study should have the potential to make a profound impact on their lives.

Applications should be made in the name of individuals and not organizations and should be from young people living in the area from Wellsford to Tuakau, the original boundary of the Rotary Auckland, who may be nominated by Rotary Clubs in this area.

The amount available each year is normally about \$12,000.

The closing date is 30th April each year and interviews are undertaken in May with awards being approved in May of each year.
