



The Vanuatu Experience

My club visits to the Rotary Clubs of Vila and Santo were always going to be novel for me. I had heard numerous stories from our D9910 Rotarians, many of whom have spent a lot of time over many years completing water and sanitation projects, building and rebuilding schools, hospitals, installing water tanks, equipping libraries, training the local communities, and doing humanitarian work. But I had not been there myself until now.


Originally it was planned that our D9910 group-Vanuatu Project lead PDG Lindsay Ford (and Alison), Foundation Chair PDG Grant Smith, Foundation Steward Keith Day-and maybe immediate past RI Board Director Jessie Harman-along with Santo Rotarians, President Heinrich Seosse (AG) and Ruffino Pineda would travel to Pentecost Island for the opening of the Enkul Water Catchment Project, an RI global grant project in partnership with the Vanuatu Government. But nature, in the form of Cyclone Lola, put paid to that. Most of the local Enkul village was devastated.

My visit to the Port Vila Club was attended by Dr. Elizabeth Webb, a specialist dentist who is working with the Ministry of Health on a free dental programme for children with is attached to a denture clinic for adults. Liz has great support from the club. I also caught up with the NZ Deputy High Commissioner and spoke about our contribution to training and education. On Luganville the Santo club has been working very hard. Once I got over the kava ceremony, I visited the hospital (where the Rotary built kitchen had been destroyed by a cyclone), two schools, including an interesting language based school run by VSA volunteers, and a kindergarten which was built with funding from the NZ Government and Rotary. 


The roofs of these classrooms were lifted off in a cyclone. Rotarians with grant funding refurbished them

A sign in the little International School put up by the children reminded me of Cat Levene. It says "I know to behave in different situations to make my friends feel happy. I respect that other people have thoughts and feelings"



The purpose of the school and kindergarten trips was to hand out water purifiers. The purifiers are guaranteed to remove 99.99% of impurities and last for 10 years. At the schools we were always surrounded by beautiful smiling and laughing children who gravitated to you naturally and wanted to hold your hand. They jumped in the cab of the truck or the tray just to go for a joy ride. It becomes easy to want to help such people who show the world their constant resilience in the face of hardship.

> The water purifiers have been donated and sent from Darwin Rotary clubs. They are imported from the U.S at a cost of around \$60.00 each . They fit onto a tap or a hose and filter 20 gallons an hour, removing 99.99% of bacteria, salmonella and e-coli. I hope clubs can raise \$500-\$600 each to buy these.

Hot off the Press

The Vanuatu Project team Led by PDG Lindsay Ford has just applied for and had approved a Disaster Relief Grant of US\$25,000.00 from Rotary International. The grant is for Pentecost Island, which was hit the hardest by Cyclone Lola, but which for various reasons seems to have received the least help. To give you an idea of the aid being given by our District, here is a preliminary breakdown of where the recovery funds are being spent -

WHAT IS POLIOPLUS?

Ending polio is Rotary's main humanitarian goal, and PolioPlus is the program that supports these efforts.

It was launched in 1985 with help from Dr. Albert Sabin, the developer of the oral polio vaccine, as a worldwide program to protect children from the paralysing consequences of polio. Rotary later became a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

Since then, the incidence of wild polio cases has decreased by 99.9% and the wild poliovirus remains endemic in just two countries, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

The processes Rotary helped build to fight polio have also been used to protect communities from COVID19 and other diseases. This illustrates the Plus in PolioPlus.

But polio anywhere is a threat to children everywhere. Only global eradication will ensure that no child suffers its devastating effects ever again.

Disaster Relief

When it comes to disaster relief I am at a bit of a loss for words. The trauma of the Anniversary Day floods and slips around Muriwai and Sunnynook where lives were lost, and the destruction caused by Cyclone Gabrielle in the Hawkes Bay continue to affect all of us. When thinking of New Zealand's, Rotary's, and our own reaction to these disasters various words, phrases and questions spring to mind: What can I do? How can I help? People are overwhelmed. Show compassion. Show understanding. Give.

What a small number of Rotarians from D9910 have done over the last 8 or 9 months in the Hawkes Bay has been well documented. But rather than explain I thought the words and actions of those who have helped, given so much and led the way for us, should speak for themselves. In spearheading the D9910 Hawkes Bay Recovery Project, Anna Wallace (Westhaven) and Nadia Lehmann (Bay of Islands) have shown great courage and leadership. I should let their words speak for themselves.

1. Anna: (What can we do?):-

Volunteer hours - summary

- The Hawkes Bay Recovery Project has facilitated four volunteer trips with 33 (individual) volunteer participants.
- Three volunteers have attended two volunteer trips including Anna Wallace (Westhaven), Marty Smith (Birkenhead) and Peter Garnett (East Coast Bays)
- Nine 9910 clubs have had volunteer representation on our trips including Bay of Islands (x2), Birkenhead (x1), Browns Bay(x2), Devonport (x13), East Coast Bays (x3), Henderson (x2), Henderson Rotalite (x1), North Harbour (x1) and Westhaven (x6). One 9920 representative from Auckland City Rotaract (x1) has participated in our trips.
- Over the four trips, groups have given 16 volunteer days, equating to approximately 973 volunteer hours.
- The largest trip was Trip 4 attended by 13 volunteers from Devonport who volunteered over 5 days collectively contributing 455 volunteer hours.

The impact:

- Through our volunteer effort we have assisted approximately 10-12 families remove silt from their homes, salvage belongings and materials for re-use, undertake light interior demolition ready for rebuilding, or demolition where rebuilding is not allowed. We have cleared out agricultural sheds, fence lines, stock pens and have spent many hours restoring gardens back to life by strimming, chain sawing out dead trees, pruning, mowing and mulching!
- We have worked on residential homes, small block holdings, a business and a family who owned a brewery and restaurant. Some will rebuild, others are yet to determine their fate. Some were insured, others were not.
- We have made strong connections with 9930, particularly Stortford Lodge and Ahuriri Sunrise.
- Stortford Lodge assisted the project team with homestay accommodation for 7 volunteers over 6-8 nights and partnered with us on our volunteering days.

Next steps:

- Seek to use the remaining \$1,573 of project funding to assist 5 more volunteers committing to 3 volunteer days or more. Once funding is expended, this will conclude the Hawkes Bay Recovery Dragons Den Project as it stands.
- To continue to promote 9910 volunteering effort in the Hawkes Bay.
- To work with 9920 who have expressed an interest in running a similar initiative.
- To work with Stortford Lodge to develop a framework for Rotary Districts and clubs to mobilise quickly in emergency assistance and recovery activities.





2. Nadia: (How can I help? - Nadia arranged vouchers for Christmas for the families where relationships had been formed.)

Overall, we have raised \$3,520 to date for our Hawkes Bay Christmas Voucher Collection! \$1,200 was donated from the District funds through yourself and the District Committee. A further \$2,320 has been generously donated by our fellow district Rotarians.

On Nadia's recent trip to the Hawkes Bay (1-5 December), she took down our printed Christmas cards and purchased 2,400 in vouchers which was the amount of funding we had received at the time. Please find attached copies of three receipts to demonstrate how the 1,200 of district funding was spent. 2 x 100 vouchers (a mix of Pak'n'sav and KMart or the Warehouse) were packaged with a card, ready for gifting to the families. Stortford Lodge contacts are working with Martha from the Clean Up Crew to deliver these packages over this week and next.

We are currently also working with Stortford Lodge to purchase further vouchers and to organise their distribution to ensure the full allocation of the additional \$1,120 of donations received since 1 December.

We will also do a thank you post to the 9910 Facebook page to provide an update of our progress.

Cyclone Gabrielle: Rotary donates radios to Hawke's Bay surf life saving clubs for search and rescue future needs

Hawke's Bay Surf Lifesaving clubs have received a \$20,500 donation towards their communication equipment from Hawke's Bay and Auckland Rotary Clubs.

The surf lifesavers played a key role during the cyclone and were able to jump into action and rescue people from their homes and rooftops and get essential supplies to isolated communities across rivers.

Hawke's Bay Search and Rescue (SAR) coordinator Jess Bennett said the unprecedented weather event and loss of communications at the time highlighted the clubs' need to have more reliable and versatile equipment.
