



Quarterly Regional Bulletin August 2023

The new Rotary year is already underway. Welcome to our first quarterly issue for Rotary year 2023-2024.

Last quarter, we saw the RI Board approving the funding for the Zone 8 Regionalisation Pilot during its April board meeting. Meanwhile, the Trustees of the Rotary Foundation also approved for Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Grants to be piloted in Australia and Brazil, after very positive outcomes from the introduction of the CSR Grant Program in India.

With many projects at play in our area, we have made some changes to the staff structure to ensure strong support, and capacity to adapt to the growing needs in our Zone.

SPPO will now have five (5) departments: Communications & Public Relations, Financial Services, Philanthropy and Programs & Member Experience, and Regionalisation. The big changes here are that Regionalisation is its own department with specialists in Communications and Membership reporting to Trudy Grice. Also, Programs & Member Experience now covers Club & District Support, Membership and Grants to provide a more holistic member experience. Lastly, with Robert Byrne's retirement, there was an opportunity to hire a supervisor for Philanthropy (more commonly known as TRF) to focus primarily on fundraising now that Grants is predominantly handled separately. On 14 August, Anke Timm joined the team as its new Supervisor of Philanthropy.

Here's an updated SPPO Organisation Chart to help visualise this new structure.

As you can imagine, the past few months had been very busy indeed. The Melbourne Convention in May, the typical frenzy in donation and recognition activity in June, the number of Regionalization Establishment Team meetings, the start of a new billing cycle for club invoices, contributing articles for the Membership issue for RDU magazine, the recruitment and hiring of new staff, and audits have all kept us occupied. During the recruitment process, applicants we've interviewed ask us what we like about working for Rotary. Those who join me in the interview panel answer the same thing: we get fulfillment from providing the best possible support to Rotarians who seek to make lasting change. So far, our answer seems to resonate with the ones who have recently joined or will soon join the SPPO team.



Club Invoices for July-December 2023

Officers can view their Club Invoices on MyRotary - Under <u>Manage</u>, click on <u>Club Administration</u>. <u>Club Finances</u> is at the top of the list. Click on <u>Club Invoice</u>.



Officers will then be directed to the Account Overview page. Click on the View Current Invoice hyperlink to view the July 2023 invoice.

Invoices are expressed in local currency. **There is no need to convert.** The amounts on the invoices will be fixed for the whole semester using the exchange rate at the time of invoice issuance in July.

From this same page, Australian and New Zealand Club officers can use their personal credit cards to pay for their club dues AUD and NZD respectively. This is the easiest method of payment. The payment confirmation page can then be printed and used as supporting document for club reimbursement.

This facility is currently not available to Philippine Rotary clubs.

Should this option not be ideal, we've developed helpful guidelines to easily identify the appropriate Rotary International account to remit funds to. Please note that the remittance account is dependent on the currency in which your invoice was issued.

Please provide your clubs with the following link: <u>BPI Payment Guidelines for The Rotary Foundation</u>. This will enable us to process your contributions promptly. There is a huge amount of emails coming through to Catherine Bedona, Financial Accountant for the Philippines. Please DO NOT send duplicate emails or follow ups. This causes more delays in getting through tasks at hand. Rest assured that these will be processed in due course.

For Rotary and Rotaract clubs, your multiple donor contributions are best deposited in one transaction. Once deposited, kindly email the deposit slips and use our <u>excel template</u> to allocate the breakdown of contributions appropriately.

We strongly encourage you to cut and paste the appropriate information provided on the text box above into communications and publications going out to your clubs and members. Widely circulating this information allows greater efficiency in accounting for and reporting your donations on our database.

THANK YOU

The last Rotary year was challenging from a fundraising perspective across the region. That said in Zone 10A and Zone 8 there were some significant achievements. In 10A with membership and ENGAGEMENT with The Rotary Foundation growing, there was the best ever delivering \$6,923,744 up over \$1.8m on the previous year. CONGRATULATIONS to the team in the Philippines.

In Zone 8 with membership in decline and a depreciating dollar for both Australia and New Zealand, the fundraising actually grew nearly 6% to \$5,699,335 against a depreciation of nearly 6%. The IMPACT across the region delivering over US\$12m. As Rotarians, we can be very proud of what this fundraising can deliver in terms of MEASURABLE AND SUSTAINABLE projects.

In 2021-22, donors gave US\$140.2 million to the Annual Fund. These contributions come from members, other people who support Rotary's goals, corporations, and workplace giving programs (some of which can be matched by employers to increase your donation).

GRANTS

NEW CORPORATE GRANTS PROGRAM

In April, the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation approved a new kind of grant for deployment in Australia and Brazil—Corporate Social Responsibility Grants, or **CSR Grants**.

CSR Grants help clubs and districts to deliver large projects, similar in scale to what has previously been possible through Global Grant funding. However, CSR Grants are more flexible and the approval process is simpler—very similar to what's been required for District Grants.



Some key points re CSR Grants:

- the donor must be a for-profit corporation
- the minimum contribution from the corporation is US\$21,000—about A\$35,000
- an entire project can be funded by the corporation but this can be supplemented by cash from individuals, clubs and districts, and from District Grants.

Rollout Plan


Initially, we want to work with a small number of clubs with strong connections to the business community and pilot several CSR Grant projects.

With the greater simplicity of CSR Grants, we anticipate that clubs and districts will find it much easier to attract corporate funding from organizations in their local area.

ALL GRANTS NOW ACCESSIBLE ON THE GRANTS CENTRE

Over the past two months, a lot of work has been going on behind the scenes to boost efficiency, streamline operations, and improve user experience for Programs of Scale and disaster response grants.

Now all four types of Rotary Grants (district grants, global grants, programs of scale grants, and disaster response grants) are accessible via the Grant Centre.



Once you have finalized your plan with all parties involved and contacted your District about the funding your project requires then start the application. Keep answers in the application clear and concise. We collect the banking

information during the application to expedite payment of approved Grants. The reporting timeline for Disaster Response Grants is 6 months from the date payment was received. By gathering all the information on this platform, we are able to streamline and simplify the process for you.

Your Regional Grants Officer will assist you with any changes needed to ensure you meet the criteria. If you are unsure who your Regional Grants Officer is for Disaster Response Grants, please contact our office.

We hope that having all applications in one location will assist all those applying for Grants. The Grants Centre offers you support from application to payment and reporting.

Thank you for all the amazing projects you have completed and will complete with grants accessed via the Grant Centre.

CERTIFICATE OF APPRECIATION FOR DISTRICTS

During their April 2023 meeting, the TRF Trustees took a decision to annually recognize districts that achieve at least 90% compliance with grant reporting requirements during a Rotary year. Section 34.050.3. in the TRF code of policies provides further details on this recognition.

34.050.3. Recognizing Districts for Grant Reporting Compliance

The general secretary will annually present an electronic certificate, bearing the signature of the Trustee chair, to each district that is at least 90 percent compliant with grant reporting requirements and meets the following criteria:

- 1. The district (including its member clubs) must be at least 90 percent compliant with grant reporting requirements in each quarterly analysis performed by the general secretary.
- 2. The district (including its member clubs) must have more than one open grant in each quarterly analysis
- 3. The district must be 100 percent compliant with grant reporting requirements for district grants and all district-sponsored grants in each quarterly analysis and at the time the certificate is presented
- 4. The district must not be suspended from participation in Rotary grants at any point during the Rotary year; and
- 5. The district must not have any outstanding stewardship requirements at the end of the Rotary year

During the 2022-23 Rotary year, 39 districts worldwide (listed below) are recognized for exceptional grant reporting efforts and received a certificate of appreciation signed by the Trustee Chair. District 3810 from the Philippines is one of the distinguished recipients of this award.

Rotary encourages all districts to aim for reporting compliance above 90% in the next four quarterly analyses and 100% compliance with district grants and district-sponsored global grants for Rotary Year 2023-24. Your dedication towards transparent reporting and stewardship is instrumental in driving meaningful impact within your communities. Keep up the great work, and we wish you all the best in your future endeavours.

ROTARY EMERGENCY SERVICES AWARDS

Winners of the annual Rotary Districts of NSW Emergency Services Community Awards (NSW RESCA) were honoured at a ceremony at the Bankstown Sports Club last night, where Minister for Emergency Services Jihad Dib greeted finalists in what was the ninth anniversary of the community awards.

Seven professional emergency service personnel and volunteers from Fire and Rescue NSW, Marine Rescue NSW, Surf Life Saving NSW, NSW Ambulance, NSW Rural Fire Service, NSW State Emergency Service and VRA Rescue NSW were announced as winners on the night, from a pool of 28 finalists.

The Officer of the Year in a Volunteer Capacity was awarded to Morgan Clarke, Woonona Club Captain, Surf Life Saving NSW – Wollongong and the Officer of the Year in a Paid Capacity was awarded to Erin Pogmore, Leading Firefighter, Fire & Rescue NSW - Liverpool.

The two winners will represent NSW at the AUSRESCA (Australian RESCA) ceremony at Government House, Yarralumla, ACT on Friday, 20 October 2023.

The winner of the Dorothy Hennessy OAM Emergency Services Youth Scholarship, for volunteers aged between 18 and 25, was also acknowledged on Saturday night, along with three other finalists. Cate Kyling, Junior Captain with Surf Life Saving NSW based in Coogee, was awarded the \$1000 scholarship for career development and further emergency services response training.


MARKETING OPPORTUNITY

TOWNSVILLE ROTARY CLUB'S PROJECT FOR DIABETES

Diabetes is an illness precipitated by negative changes in the pancreas. The changes prevent the production of Insulin resulting in the dysregulation of blood sugar levels.

Anybody with diabetes, is aware of the complexity of the condition and its impact on all areas of their body and lives. Research leading to better diet modification and modern, technologies enable better management of the condition. These new technologies lead to best practice in diabetes care, empowering patients to live better lives by reducing the risk of life debilitating complications and hypoglycemic events which are life threatening.

In 2017, Townsville Central Rotary Club embarked on a project to enhance one child's life and thanks to help from other Rotary Clubs, Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS), Variety the Childrens Charity and many individual Rotarians and friends of Rotary, they ended up with 14 Insulin Pumps which have significantly change the lives of 13 children with the final young man to get his at the end of August.

Diabetes is extremely traumatic and parents recall how helpless, fearful, and disempowered, they feel. Their empathy and guilt is extremely stressful as they prick their child's fingers and administer injections. Children need to be wakened during the night to ensure that their blood sugar levels don't drop or increase to harmful levels.

Insulin Pumps are not cheap at a cost of approximately \$8,500 each. Endocrinologists believe Insulin Pumps are a game changer when it comes to Diabetic care. 
