District Governor's Newsletter APRIL 1, 2016 Be A Gift To The World

April is Maternal and Child Health Month In Rotary

My Fellow Rotarians,

Maternal & Child Health is one of the six areas of focus established by the Trustees of the Rotary Foundation. These six areas of focus reflect critical humanitarian issues and needs that Rotarians are addressing worldwide.

Under the focus on Maternal & Child Health, Rotarians are improving the lives of mothers and children by, reducing the mortality rate for children under five years of age, reducing the maternal mortality rate, improving access to essential medical services and trained health care providers for mothers and their children, and supporting studies related to maternal and child health.

According to the World Bank, 310 women die in Uganda for every 100,000 live births, compared with just 21 in the Untied States and 12 in the United Kingdom. Infants fare even worse in Uganda with 45 out of every 1,000 infants never reaching the age of 1 as compared to 6 in the United States and just 4 in the United Kingdom. In rural Haiti Rotarians are improving access to essential medical services for mothers and children aimed at reducing the number of children who die under the age of 5 each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care and poor sanitation. This number is currently estimated to be 7 million per year.

Just as Rotarians are committed to the eradication of Polio worldwide, we are also dedicated to improving the lives of our fellow human beings by providing a hand up to those in need.

My thanks to the Rotarians in District 7070 for all of their hard work and efforts on behalf of Maternal & Child Health issues

Rotary International President Ravi Ravindran's Monthly Message – April 2016

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

Many years ago, in Kolkata, India, I had the chance to meet Mother Teresa. She was an incredible woman with an incredible force of personality. When she walked down the street, the crowd parted in front of her like the Red Sea. Yet when you talked to her, if you mentioned the tremendous things she had done, she almost did not engage in this topic at all. By many reports, if you asked her what her greatest achievement was, she would answer,"I am an expert in cleaning toilets."

The answer was both humorous and absolutely serious. Her business was caring for others. Toilets had to be cleaned, so she cleaned them. There was no question of a job being beneath her. Helping people who needed help was her work, and there was nothing higher, nothing in the world more important than that.

So one day, when an elegantly dressed man came to Kolkata looking for Mother Teresa, the nuns who answered the door informed him that she was at the back of the house, cleaning the toilets. They pointed the way, and indeed he found Mother Teresa scrubbing the toilets. She said hello, assumed he was there to volunteer, and began explaining to him how to hold the toilet brush correctly and how not to waste water. Then she put the brush in his hand and left him standing there, in his expensive suit, alone in the lavatory.

Later, the man came out, found Mother Teresa again, and said,"I have finished; may I speak with you now?""Yes, certainly," she said. He took an envelope out of his pocket and said,"Mother Teresa, I am the director of the airline, and here are your tickets. I just wanted to bring them to you personally."

That airline director told that story again and again for the rest of his life. He said those 20 minutes spent cleaning toilets had filled him with the greatest joy he had ever known -because by putting his hands to Mother Teresa's work, he became part of that work. For chose 20 minutes, he cared for the sick just as she did: with his own hands, his own sweat.

That is exactly the opportunity that Rotary gives us. We might not do what Mother Teresa did – give up our lives, our homes, our families. But for 20 minutes, 20 hours, 20 days of the year, we can be like her.

We can do the work that others will not with our hands, and our hearts, and our sweat, and our devotion – knowing that what we do is the most important work in the world.

Rotary Foundation Chair, Ray Klinginsmith's Monthly Message - April 2016 - Rotary is big - but still accessible to individual Rotarians

Dear fellow Rotarians,

The numbers are impressive: Rotary comprises more than 35,000 clubs with 1.2 million members in 200 countries and geographic regions. tr's big enough to be a major partner in the eradication of polio, the largest health initiative ever undertaken!

Despite its size and reach, Rotary is accesible to members through their individual clubs, which provide outstanding opportunities for friendship, fellowship, and networking at the local level. As a result, most Rotarians think of their involvement as primarily local, with ideas for service projects limited to their communities. They should recognize that, with the assistance of The Rotary Foundation, the sky is the limit!

Every great idea in Rotary has started in the mind of an individual. Even the success of End Polio Now can be traced to a few notable Rotarians around the world: Clem Renouf of Australia, for example, proposed a large corporate project to increase Rotary's visibility, while U.S. Rotarian John Sever identified polio as a worthwhile target. Each had an idea that was accepted and supported by other Rotarians, and polio will soon be eliminated from the world as a result.

When Rotarians begin to think of service projects beyond the size and scope of their clubs, they have access to district and global grants from The Rotary Foundation. They also have access to a team of Rotary volunteers at the district level, starting with their district governors and district Rotary Foundation chairs, to help them along the way. They also have the support of regional leaders, including the regional Rotary Foundation coordinators, and the entire Rotary staff in Evanston, III., and in the international offices.

Who knows where the next great ideas for Rotary will come from? Since Rotary is a grassroots organization, they are likely to come from individual Rotarians. It behooves all of us to encourage good ideas within the six areas of focus and direct local Rotarians with good ideas to The Rotary Foundation's resources. After all, it is the mission of the Foundation "to enable Rotarians" to **do good in the world**!!

April is Maternal and Child Health Month

What Is your Rotary Club doing to focus on Maternal and Child Health in April 2016?

At least 7 million children under the age of five die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. To help reduce this rate, we provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Your Rotary projects ensure sustainability by empowering the local community to take ownership of health care training programs.

Watch how Rotary helps bring health care to mothers and newborns in rural Haiti

Through grants from The Rotary Foundation, Rotarians improve access to essential medical services for mothers and their children. These efforts are aimed at reducing the number of children under age five who die each year because of

malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation – a figure that is currently estimated at 7 million.

According to another estimate, more than 80 percent of maternal deaths can be prevented with access to reproductive health services and trained health care workers. Rotarians provide education, immunizations, birthing kits, and mobile health clinics to support these causes. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

Desperate need for shelter in Fiji after Cyclone Winston

Cyclone Winston hit the islands of Fiji on February 20th and was the most powerful storm ever recorded in the South Pacific, with winds over 285 km/hr, torrential rain and 12m waves. The cyclone left 42 dead, buildings flattened and crops destroyed. Hundreds of thousands were affected, and 97 schools were damaged or destroyed. A state of natural disaster was declared by the Fiji Government, and they put a call out for international aid.

The United Nations estimates that as many as 350,000 people may have been affected, over a third of the Fijian population. The United Nations

Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) also says that access to fresh water remains a particular concern. 67,000 Fijians had been suffering drought conditions in January due to El Nino, and most of them live in the corridor affected by the cyclone.

ShelterBox has been responding since the Cyclone hit, utilizing prepositioned stock in Fiji as well as New Zealand and Australia. Our ShelterBox Response teams have already been able to deliver tents and ShelterBoxes to families on six remote islands. Canadian SRT, Ron Noseworthy (Member and Past President of The Rotary Club of Kenora) was recently deployed to deliver aid to families after the storm.

More aid is on the way, including 2,000 solar lights that will provide light and safety to communities without power, and 2000 complete ShelterBoxes, but it's not enough. There are still many tiny islands too remote to have received help. We need your support to send more aid to assist families who have lost everything after the storm.

Will you be a ShelterBox Canada Hero Next Year?

The ShelterBox Canada Hero program recognizes the commitments and generous support of Rotary Clubs across the country. Rotary Clubs can become a ShelterBox Hero in one of two ways:

- Donate/fundraise \$1,200 every Rotary year for three consecutive years OR
- Donate/fundraise \$3,600 in one Rotary year

ShelterBox Heroes will be recognized at their District Conference and be presented with a certificate of achievement. While the 2014-2015 Heroes have already been set, it's not too late to get a donation in to be a 2015-2016 hero!

Message from HIP Chair, Chris Snyder

The federal government has released the first budget of its mandate, committing a total of \$8.4 B over five years for Indigenous peoples. In addition to investments in child and family services, the inquiry into murdered and missing Indigenous women and on-reserve infrastructure, the budget has earmarked \$2.6 B over five years for K-12 First Nations education. In the first year, \$96 M will go towards school infrastructure on reserves and \$287.5 M will go towards core K-12 education at First Nation schools, including \$115 M for special needs education, \$55 M for language and cultural teaching, and \$20 M for literacy and numeracy. Of the total investment, \$824 M over five years is for "implementing transformation" of the on-reserve education system, with \$46 M of that to be spent this year. The budget also removes the 2% overall spending cap that has previously affected funding for Indigenous peoples". While details are not known, the general reaction from the Indigenous community is positive. A large part of this is a result of increased discussions amongst various groups. In this case, between National Chief and Gerald Butts, Mr. Trudeau's principal secretary. According to Mr. Bellegarde, "THEY LISTENED".

A report in the Globe said there were no strings attached. This is what largely defeated the past initiative from the previous government.

An interesting part is the \$55 million for language and cultural training. The importance of this component often escapes non-Indigenous peoples, however, there is a lot of evidence to show cultural training and language education has much to do with keeping young people in school.

At the Thunderchild First Nation in Saskatchewan, they use traditional activities in ice fishing and hide tanning etc. to learn more about biology and anatomy. This has led to a 20% increase in enrolment over the past four years.

There is also plenty of evidence that this training lowers alcohol and drug problems.

While many say it is not enough and does not close the gap to equality, it is a start. Going forward, HIP will be a very key player in helping close this gap through programs which will enhance existing and new Indigenous driven programs.

The Rotary Club of Oshawa is currently in the process of establishing a new library in a community which can also be reached by road. The objectives of the program draw support from all sectors. Another wonderful aspect is that everything is donated. This is Rotary at its best bringing wide spread benefits provided by volunteers with no budget.

In economic terms we have a surplus of books here and a scarcity up north. They badly need volunteers to move the product to the distribution points.

Important change! April 15, 2016 dead-line for 2016-17 District Grant applications

My Fellow Rotarians,

The Rotary Foundation provides Rotarians and Rotary Clubs with some wonderful tools to 'do good in the world'. This can be in the local community as well as half-way around the world. It can be everything from small focused projects to large bold projects with life-changing impact. There are two types of grants offered by The Rotary Foundation; Global Grants and District Grants.

Global Grants

Global Grants are designed for bigger, bolder long-term projects. These projects have a Host Club/District, where the project takes place, and an International Club/District. The Host and International partners must be in two different countries. The Clubs and Districts involved in a Global Grant application must also be qualified.

Clubs in D7070 are in most cases the International partner, but we could also be a Host partner for a project in our District. We would then have to find Districts and Clubs outside Canada that would be interested in becoming the International partner.

Areas of Focus

In addition to the Host-International partner relationship, Global Grant projects must be in one of the six areas of focus

- Peace and Conflict Resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and Sanitation
- Maternal and Child Health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and Community Development

Budget requirements

In order to make Global Grant projects bigger and bolder, the Rotary Foundation realized that these projects must be of a certain magnitude to have the desired impact. Therefore, the budget for Global Grant projects must be minimum USD30,000. Furthermore, the amount of funding requested from the Rotary Foundation must be at least USD15,000.

Funding

Global Grant projects can receive funding from the following sources

- Club cash
- District Designated Funds (DDF), funds from the District to match your Club cash contributions. D7070 may match cash contributions from Clubs in D7070 dollar for dollar up to USD5,000 per Club and project. Other Districts most likely have other matching formulas. Always ask Clubs from other Districts that support your project to find out if their District may also provide DDF for your project.
- The Rotary Foundation Award, funds from the Rotary Foundation (min. USD15,000) TRF matches Club cash 50% and DDF 100%.

Other non-Rotarian funds. These funds are matched 50% by TRF.

Application

Applications for a Global Grant are made on-line on Rotary;s website www.rotary.org. The actual application form can be found at https://grants.rotary.org/s_main.jsp?lang=1# Applications can be made throughout the Rotary year. Please, make sure you contact the District's Foundation Grants Sub-Committee before you start your application in order to discuss the availability of DDF (District Designated Funds) to match the Club cash contributions for your project. .

Sustainability

One of the most important requirements for a Global Grant application to be approved is that the project is sustainable. The Rotary Foundation has the following definition for sustainability

Providing solutions to community needs in such a way that the benefiting community can maintain the activities after grant funding ends

In short, the project must be able to live on successfully once the Rotary Foundation funds are used up.

Global Grant project mentors

As one of the 100 pilot Districts for the Future Vision in 2010, we are fortunate in D7070 to have a cadre of Rotarians with experience from applying, implementing and reporting Global Grant projects. These individuals are offering to share their knowledge with others interested in applying for a Global Grant. Again, please contact the Grants Sub-Committee for further information and contacts.

District Grants

District Grants are used for short- and medium-term projects. The projects can take place in your local community or far away overseas. There is no requirement for a Rotary connection at the other end. (Still, it may be beneficial to have such a connection.). There is no minimum budget amount for the project.

New Application dead-line for District Grants for Rotary year 2016-17

Applications for District Grants for the 2016-17 Rotary year are made to District 7070 on a special form no later than April 15, 2016. This is a change from last year. The reason for moving up the dead-line for applications is to align our District with the Rotary Foundation's preferred time-plan.

The application form for District Grants can be downloaded from the D7070 website, www.rotary7070.org The matching formula set up by D7070 encourages cooperation between Clubs; however, a Club can still apply for a District Grant for a project where they are the only Club involved. The matching formula is presented in the application form. It is possible to include Clubs from other Districts than D7070 in the project; however, only contributions from Clubs in D7070 will be matched.

Global Grants vs. District Grants

At a first glance, it may be difficult and confusing to decide which type of grant to apply for. However, three simple questions will guide you. In order to have a potential Global Grant project, you must get Yes to all the following three questions.

- 1. Is the project between Rotary Clubs/Districts in two different countries?
- 2. Is the project in one of the six areas of focus? and

3. Is the projects budget >USD30,000 and the TRF Award you are asking for >USD15,000?

If you get Yes to all three questions, you may want to pursue a Global Grant application. If you get No to one or more of the questions, your project doesn't meet the requirements for receiving a Global Grant. However, you may still consider applying for a District Grant.

Government of Canada Funds – the new kid on the block

Last year, the Rotary Foundation Canada and the Government of Canada reached an agreement for a 5-year program, where the Government of Canada makes CAD1,2 million available each year to Canadian Rotary Clubs and Districts for Global Grant projects.

There are a number of restrictions around the availability of the GOC-funds, such as areas of focus, countries and type of activities the funds can be used for. However, so long one can't determine from the guidelines that the project is ineligible for the GOC-funds, it makes sense to apply. The GOC-funds match Canadian Club and DDF contributions. The approved amount of GOC-funds is to be included in the Global Grant application and will be matched 50% by the Rotary Foundation, so the windfall if one's GOC-application is successful, can be quite dramatic. .

Conclusion

The Rotary Foundation offers a number of marvelous opportunities for Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to 'do good in the world'. Funds, the result of our Foundation fund-raising, are available for projects of various sizes and formats in the local community or around the world. Please, get involved. If your Club has not been involved previously, a start could be to support a project initiated by another Club.

There are examples in our District where Clubs have started by spending a few hundred dollars, maybe a thousand, as a small partner. A couple of years later, the experience they have gained have made them decide to lead their own project. It is also our experience that Clubs that are involved in Grants projects are more likely to raise funds for the Rotary Foundation.

What is the District Training Assembly?

In view of the annual turnover of Rotary leadership each year, special effort is required to provide club leaders with appropriate instruction for the tasks they will assume. The annual district assembly is the major leadership training event in each Rotary district of the world. The workshops offer motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, directors and key committee chairmen of each club.

Some of the most experienced district leaders conduct informative discussions on all phases of Rotary administration

and service projects. The sessions give all participants valuable new ideas to make their club more effective and interesting. Normally eight to ten delegates from each club (officers, directors, committee chairs, etc.) are invited to attend the training session.

Another important feature is a review by the incoming district governor of the program theme and emphasis of the new RI president for the coming year. District goals and objectives are also described and plans are developed for their implementation.

The success of your Rotary club is frequently determined by the club's full representation and participation in this annual meeting.

This event provides a continuation of this training for presidents-elect and does not duplicate what you learned at PETS. It also provides you the opportunity to train alongside the rest of your club's leadership team on important and relevant topics.

If you are the **secretary** of your Rotary club, much of the success your club will achieve will depend upon you knowing how to handle the many responsibilities of this important position in a Rotary club. Even for the seasoned secfretaries, Rotary is a dynamic organization which is constantly changing to address the needs of Rotary clubs, communities and society in general. Every three years, Rotary International convenes the Council on Legislation which addresses hundreds of changes to the Rotary Club Constitution, Bylaws and Policies that directly impact your club and the role of all club officers, especially club secretaries. Making sure you are up to date on these changes is an important part of your responsibility as secretary. In addition, attending will give you new energy, great ideas and motivation to better serve your club and community as a member of your club's leadership team.

If you are a **director** in your Club, as a director of your club, you have been elected to make decisions that will impact the future of your club. The sessions will help you better understand the issues faced by your club and your officers that you will be asked to vote on as you serve as a director. Additionally, the sessions will enhance your understanding of Rotary, its objects and mission which will strengthen your club.

If you **chair a committee** in our Rotary club, your participation will enhance any member's experience as a Rotarian. Sessions will address specific functions assigned to club committees. What is RYLA?

The Rotary Youth Leadership Awards ("RYLA") is a program for young people that was officially adopted by Rotary International in 1971. Conducted on a district level, RYLA offers Rotarians a special opportunity to take part in developing qualities of leadership and good citizenship among the young people of their communities.

District 7070, which comprises Rotary clubs from Belleville to Toronto, has conducted RYLA programs continuously for many years. RYLA is a life-changing experience for young people aged 19 - 25. Each club may sponsor qualified individuals to attend a one-week leadership training program, all expenses paid.

The District 7070 RYLA program, "Leadership Begins With Me", provides an opportunity for the participants to get to know themselves better and to cultivate the respect and trust of others. They are able to identify their own leadership skills and determine ways to make more effective use of their resources. Their enthusiasm and technique is brought back to the community from which the participants were sponsored, and thus impacts on the young people being influenced by these youthful leaders.

RYLA introduces a large number of young people and their families to the Rotary ideals of service each year. It helps bridge the communication gap between the generations and helps improve relationships among youth groups, families and the community. RYLA also has been instrumental in the formation of Rotaract clubs and complements all other Rotary youth activities.

The recent 2013 Council of Legislation concluded that the Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs form would be replaced by Rotary Club Central (RCC), an online goal setting tool for clubs that is accessed by signing in at www.rotary.org

So how does Rotary Club Central assist us with our clubs and our districts? Rotary Club Central gives the club and district leaders the ability to monitor club progress and achievements in three key performance areas which are as follows:

- Membership initiatives,
- Service activities,
- · Rotary Foundation giving.

From a District Level, all district leaders, including the Governor, Governor-Elect, Assistant District Governors, and Committee Chairs can view a summary of goals and achievements for all clubs in their district by clicking on "District View". By tracking the progress of proposed targets, District leaders can quickly identify areas of concern and offer

assistance or prescribe corrective action to achieve the targets.

At the Club level, only the President, Secretary, Treasurer, Foundation Chair, and Membership Chair can edit goals and achievements for the year they are in office. However, all club members can view club goals and achievements for all years. The ability of members to view the club's progress adds a new dimension; the reporting is in real time, clearly defines the achievements and assists the club's leadership in its planning.

In addition to the benefits to Districts and Clubs, the data collected through the RCC progress tool will give Rotary a better way to measure the impact Rotarians are making worldwide.

An added benefit to Rotary Club Central is that trends can be established over the past five years. It includes charts that track membership retention and Annual Fund giving.

Club leaders are encouraged to log in to Member Access and enter their data in Rotary Club Central so that their Club members, the District Governor, and Assistant District Governors can see it. If a club is unable to enter goals, any district leader can input data on behalf of the club. The Club President will be notified by email when any changes are made to their goals.

Rotary Club Central gives us the opportunity to record, monitor and evaluate our clubs, districts and the health of our organization. We are able to discover trends easily without having to set up the database; if corrective action is required, the need for it will be recognized earlier. We will get the opportunity to learn from each other's successes as the successes are realized in Clubs, Districts and Zones.

Rotary Club Central is the dash board – we need only read it for a healthier Rotary.
