My Fellow Rotarians,

April is Maternal and Child Health Month in the Rotary world and one of the great causes Rotarians are involved with. An estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation — all of which can be prevented. Rotarians globally provide education, immunizations, birth kits, and mobile health clinics. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

This is a complex issue, of course, but I am proud that Rotarians continue to be involved, deeply committed and constant with support to help ease this social travesty. I know that Maternal and Child Health means a great deal to you and that your input, advocacy and actions are further reaching than just this month.

Through The Rotary Foundation, we are reaching mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care. All this information is available for your viewing on the RI website. Read about some of the amazing things Rotarians are making happen, such as what is happening in Haiti, a country with the highest maternal and infant mortality rate in the western hemisphere, where Rotarians provided a fully equipped medical jeep to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

You may want to know more about this and may wish to become more hands-on. I urge you to reach out. There will be fellow Rotarians that you can confer with. The networking is yours for the asking.

And, as you know, this is what we do "Rotary Serving Humanity".

Workshops offer motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, directors and key committee chairs of each club. Some of the most experienced district leaders conduct informative discussions on all phases of Rotary administration and service

projects. The sessions give all participants valuable new ideas to make their club more effective and interesting. Hear from the current District Governor as to what we've achieved in the current year. Hear from the incoming District Governor of the program theme and emphasis of the new RI president for the coming year. With the next year our hosting the International Convention, it's an exciting year. Another important feature of the assembly is a review of the finances, and approval by the Presidents-Elect of the District budget for the next Rotary year. The success of each Rotary club is frequently determined by the club's full representation and participation in this annual meeting. This year, we have sessions and workshops on conflict management, fundraising, Toronto 2018 convention how-tos, public image, Foundation Walk, Conference, youth programs, the environment and more. Rotary International President John Germ's Monthly Message – April 2017



Dear Fellow Rotarians:

Globally, in developed as well as in developing countries, child mortality is on the decline and life expectancy on the rise. In 1960, 182 of every 1,000 children born died before turning five; today, that number is down to 43. A child born in 1960 could expect to live an average of just 52 years; by contrast, a child born this year can expect to live to 71. Then as now, the factors most likely to determine a child's fate are set at birth: where he or she is born, the educational and economic condition of the family, the availability of medical care. Yet one of the most important advances in public health has reached every country and must now reach every child: immunization.

The use of vaccines has, in many parts of the world, nearly eliminated diseases that once were widespread, such as diphtheria, tetanus, and rubella. Thanks to vaccines, 20 million lives have been saved from measles since 2000. Smallpox has been eradicated - and polio

is next.

Thirty years ago, there were an estimated 350,000 cases of polio per year worldwide. As this issue of The Rotarian went to press, only 37 cases of polio had been recorded in 2016 - the lowest number in history. All of the other cases, and the paralysis and death they would have brought, were prevented through the widespread use of a safe, reliable, and inexpensive vaccine.

Overall, the World Health Organization estimates that immunization prevents an estimated 2 million to 3 million deaths every year. It also averts a tremendous burden of disability and economic loss. Yet we could be doing so much better: An additional 1.5 million deaths could be avoided by improving vaccine coverage worldwide.

This month, from April 24-30, wejoin WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in celebrating **World Immunization Week**, raising awareness of the incredible impact that vaccines have had on global health. This year's theme is "Vaccines Work" - and they do. Increased use of vaccines has broader repercussions for public health: controlling viral hepatitis, reducing both the need for antibiotics and the development of antibiotic-resistant microbes, and reaching more children and adolescents with essential health interventions. In every part of the world, routine immunization is as crucial as ever to ensure that all children have the best chance at a healthy future.

In an uncertain world, vaccines offer something remarkable: a way to protect our children throughout their lives. By working together to safeguard all children against polio and other preventable diseases, *Rotary is truly Serving Humanity* -now and for generations to come.

Dear fellow Rotarians,

In communities worldwide, Rotarians are finding creative ways to celebrate The Rotary Foundation centennial and showcase our Foundation's century-long commitment to doing good in the world.

Rotarians have arranged for a commemorative postage stamp to be issued in Pakistan, sponsored a cruise on the Danube River with some proceeds going to our Foundation, and sold bottles of wine with "100 Years Doing Good in the World" printed on the label in Vancouver, B.C. And, of course, there have been scores of centennial dinners. In Arch Klumph's hometown of Cleveland, Rotarians gathered to celebrate the centennial and honor the father of The Rotary Foundation with a banquet and concert by the Cleveland Orchestra. In addition to raising more than \$2.1million for our Foundation, the event paid tribute to

Klumph's virtuosity as a flutist.

Some Rotarians are honoring the Foundation by sponsoring global grant projects. They are fighting dengue fever in Indonesia, providing sanitation facilities in Colombia, and promoting early detection of breast cancer in Turkey. Rotaractors and Interactors have answered the call to perform 100 acts of good this year in honor of the centennial. They are donating blood, visiting the elderly, and volunteering at food pantries, to name just a few of the activities this challenge has inspired.

By celebrating this milestone, we are sharing our success stories with the world. In 2016, cable news channel CNBC named The Rotary Foundation one of the "Top 10 Charities Changing the World;' citing our PolioPlus program as well as our financial health, accountability, and transparency of reporting. In addition, the Association of Fundraising Professionals named The Rotary Foundation the World's Outstanding Foundation for 2016.

Our centennial year is not over yet. You still have time to plan a special event, make a centennial contribution, and add more acts of good. In June, I hope you will join me for the biggest centennial celebration of the year at the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta.

We will actually run two one-hour seminars at the Assembly. One will focus on Global Grant projects, the other on District Grant projects. Attending either will count towards the Club being qualified.

FROM COAST TO COAST:

AFRICA UNITES TO TACKLE THREAT OF POLIO

News From the Global Polio Eradication initiative dated March 23, 2017

More than 190,000 polio vaccinators in 13 countries across west and central Africa will immunize over 116 million children over the next week, to tackle the last remaining stronghold of polio on the continent. The synchronized vaccination campaign, one of the largest of its kind ever implemented in Africa, is part of urgent measures to permanently stop polio on the continent.

All children under five years of age in the 13 countries – Benin, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Côte d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, Guinea, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria and Sierra Leone – will be simultaneously immunized in a coordinated effort to raise childhood immunity to polio across the continent. In August 2016, four children were paralysed by the disease in security-compromised areas in Borno state, north-eastern

Nigeria, widely considered to be the only place on the continent where the virus maintains its grip.

"Twenty years ago, Nelson Mandela launched the pan-African 'Kick Polio Out of Africa' campaign," said Dr Matshidiso Moeti, WHO Regional Director for Africa. "At that time, every single country on the continent was endemic to polio, and every year, more than 75 000 children were paralysed for life by this terrible disease. Thanks to the dedication of governments, communities, parents and health workers, this disease is now beaten back to this final reservoir."

Dr Moeti cautioned, however, that progress was fragile, given the epidemic-prone nature of the virus. Although confined to a comparatively small region of the continent, experts warned that the virus could easily spread to underprotected areas of neighbouring countries. That is why regional public health ministers from five Lake Chad Basin countries – Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Niger and Nigeria – declared the outbreak a regional public health emergency and have committed to multiple synchronized immunization campaigns. UNICEF Regional Director for West and Central Africa, Ms Marie-Pierre Poirier, stated that with the strong commitment of Africa's leaders, there was confidence that this last remaining polio reservoir could be wiped out, hereby protecting all future generations of African children from the crippling effects of this disease once and for all. "Polio eradication will be an unparalleled victory, which will not only save all future generations of children from the grip of a disease that is entirely preventable – but will show the world what Africa can do when it unites behind a common goal."

To stop the potentially dangerous spread of the disease as soon as possible, volunteers will deliver bivalent oral polio vaccine (bOPV) to every house across all cities, towns and villages of the 13 countries. To succeed, this army of volunteers and health workers will work up to 12 hours per day, travelling on foot or bicycle, in often stifling humidity and temperatures in excess of 40°C. Each vaccination team will carry the vaccine in special carrier bags, filled with ice packs to ensure the vaccine remains below the required 8°C.

"This extraordinary coordinated response is precisely what is needed to stop this polio outbreak," said Michael K McGovern, Chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee . "Every aspect of civil society in these African countries is coming together, every community, every parent and every community leader, to achieve one common goal: to protect their children from life-long paralysis caused by this deadly disease."

The full engagement of political and community leaders at every level – right down to the district – is considered critical to the success of the campaign. It is only through the full participation of this leadership that all sectors of civil society are mobilized to ensure every child is reached.

April is Maternal and Child Health Month

What Is your Rotary Club doing to focus on Maternal and Child Health in April 2017?

At least 7 million children under the age of five die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. To help reduce this rate, we provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Your Rotary projects ensure sustainability by empowering the local community to take ownership of health care training programs.

Through grants from The Rotary Foundation, Rotarians improve access to essential medical services for mothers and their children. These efforts are aimed at reducing the number of children under age five who die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation – a figure that is currently estimated at 7 million.

According to another estimate, more than 80 percent of maternal deaths can be prevented with access to reproductive health services and trained health care workers. Rotarians provide education, immunizations, birthing kits, and mobile health clinics to support these causes. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

SHELTERBOX News For April 2017



Disasters don't stop – neither do we.

When it comes to disaster relief, the situation is always changing. ShelterBox is constantly monitoring events around the world and we pride ourselves on the ability to respond to disasters at a moment's notice.

Our work would not be possible without the continued support of Rotarians and Rotary clubs across Canada, and around the world. Thank you for your continued generosity and for helping us to respond instantly to provide families with the tools they need to recover and rebuild after disaster.

Current ShelterBox Deployments:

Madagascar – Cyclone Enawo

ShelterBox teams deployed to Madagascar following the landfall of Cyclone Enawo in early March. The cyclone made landfall as the equivalent of a Category 4 hurricane, packing wind speeds of up to 270 km/hr and bringing heavy rains. Cyclone Enawo is the strongest cyclone to hit the country in 13 years and the Malagasy Red Cross estimated that approximately 720,000 people would be affected directly and indirectly by this intense tropical cyclone.





Somaliland – Drought

A ShelterBox Response Team has been deployed to Somaliland as severe drought drips the region and warnings of famine are declared. Our team is there to assess the suitability of our aid and to get an understanding of the exact numbers of people needing our support. Somaliland has a population of 3 million, half of whom are nomads. Nomad life depends on livestock and the continual search for grazing land. **Already up to 70% of livestock have perished in some areas due to the lack of rainfall.**

ShelterBox Team Lead, James Luxton says, '[...] It is the widely and thinly scattered nomadic population, constantly on the move, that brings the greatest challenges. Simply finding those in greatest need amid this vast open territory will be a task. We are talking to all the relevant players, aid agencies and government, and will then decide what help ShelterBox is able to offer, and where.'

Additional Deployments and Monitoring

In addition, ShelterBox is working in Iraq, the Syrian Region, Niger, Cameroon and Mozambique. Our teams are also monitoring Zimbabwe.

Rotary India WinS signs MoU

Rotary India has set a goal of implementing a WASH in Schools (WinS) program for 5 million children in 23,000 schools in India. Earlier this month Rotary International President John Germ was present at the signing of a significant agreement between the National Mission for Clean Ganga and the Rotary India WASH in Schools Committee.

"Clean Water for Living" is a project of the Rotary Club of Chatham Ontario Sunrise, District 6380 http://www.wasrag.org/search-projects

"Clean Water for Living" is a project of the Rotary Club of Chatham Ontario Sunrise, District 6380. Through this project the club asks everyone to do their part to respect and protect water locally. Rotarians are known for their good work on clean water and sanitation projects in less developed countries. During the 2015-16 Rotary Year, the total number of Rotary International WASH grants was 272, and the total funding for the year was over 19 million. Meanwhile, North American Rotary Clubs expended very little energy and very few dollars on local water issues. "Clean Water for Living" asks Rotarians to step up their water commitment: continue clean water and sanitation projects in underdeveloped countries and lead the way in education and demonstration of good water practices locally.

The project's initial emphasis is on the area around the Great Lakes Region of North America. These lakes represents 21% of the world's surface fresh water by volume and 84% of North America's surface fresh water.

The Great Lakes are threatened by manmade issues such as:

* green algae blooms

Algae blooms caused by excess phosphorus have contaminated the lake water for drinking. In August 2014 Toledo, Ohio, USA which supplies municipal water from Lake Erie was forced to issue a "do not drink" advisory for parts of three days due to the toxic algae.

* chemical pollution

A single drop of oil can contaminates 1 million drops of water.

* pharmaceuticals

Great lakes water samples show presence of hormones and antibiotics.

* micro plastics

Standard water treatment processes cannot remove the micro beads found in cosmetic products. Micro beads and other degraded plastics particles are found in Great Lakes water samples.

It should be noted that many of these issues also affect scores of rivers and smaller bodies of water around the world. There are in fact so many issues regarding clean water and our environment generally that people frequently tune out the discussion. It is for this reason that the Chatham Sunrise Rotary club decided to take the positive approach of identifying and highlighting "Clean Water Champions." "Clean Water Champions" are people and organizations illustrating positive water management practices. In the summer of 2015 the Rotary Club of Chatham Sunrise hired award winning cinematographer Brent Foster of Foster Visuals to create four video vignettes showing successful initiatives in Chatham-Kent to respect and improve the quality of water that ends up in our rivers. These videos along with other information and links to helpful sites are hosted on the "Clean Water for Living" website.

There are many ways in which Rotary Clubs can foster respect for and help protect local water:

- Include a variety of water education and information programs in Rotary meeting schedules each year.
- Partner with local conservation or similar organizations on clean water projects to protect and or remediate local streams, rivers and lakes.
- Identify and celebrate "Clean Water Champions," people and organizations exemplifying positive water management practices.
- Support school water education programs.
- Reduce bottled water use.
- Support elected officials who advocate for responsible water infrastructure investments.

Our rivers and lakes have suffered from our lack of respect and care for many decades. Society thought that our water supplies were infinite and that dilution was the solution for any pollution. DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MEMBERSHIP CHALLENGE

From District 7070 membership Chair Virginia O'Reilly

At the District 7070 Conference this year, District Governor Jim Louttit issued this challenge to all Rotarians and their Rotary Clubs in District 7070. Where does your club stand on meeting this challenge? The CHALLENGE!

A Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- A net gain in membership. Small clubs (up to 50 members) must achieve a net gain of at least one member; Large clubs (51 or more members) must achieve a net gain of at least two members.
- Improve the member retention rate by at least 1 percent from last year, Or, maintain 100 percent retention.
- Induct new members under the age of 40. Clubs with up to 50 members must induct a minimum of 2 new members under age 40; Clubs with 51 or more members must induct four.
- The new members must create profiles on My Rotary.

And, a Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- Hold a visioning session, and Develop a plan based on the session with at least 1st action timeline
- Do a club assessment, and hold an assembly with the entire club to share the findings
- Complete at least 2 changes to improve your club based on findings from a Visioning/Club assessment
- At least 2 members attend a District Membership Seminar.
- Every new member is assigned a mentor who, within 3 months of the new member joining the club, does at least 2 the following 3 things:
 - Meets with the new member to learn about what they are looking for in Rotary and how they can help get them connected and involved;
 - o Accompanies them to at least one make-up meeting;
 - o Joins them in at least one club activity (e.g., committee meeting, hands on project, etc.).

The **PRIZE! \$5000 – Funds to be used towards a Community project. all** clubs who successfully meet the challenge will be entered into a draw for the prize monies (e.g. 3 prizes of \$2500, \$1500, \$1000)

What is the District Training Assembly?

In view of the annual turnover of Rotary leadership each year, special effort is required to provide club leaders with appropriate instruction for the tasks they will assume. The annual district assembly is the major leadership training event in each Rotary district of the world. The workshops offer motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, directors and key committee chairmen of each club.

Some of the most experienced district leaders conduct informative discussions on all phases of Rotary administration and service projects. The sessions give all participants valuable new ideas to make their club more effective and interesting. Normally eight to ten delegates from each club (officers, directors, committee chairs, etc.) are invited to attend the training session.

Another important feature is a review by the incoming district governor of the program theme and emphasis of the new RI president for the coming year. District goals and objectives are also described and plans are developed for their implementation.

The success of your Rotary club is frequently determined by the club's full representation and participation in this annual meeting.

This event provides a continuation of this training for presidents-elect and does not duplicate what you learned at PETS. It also provides you the opportunity to train alongside the rest of your club's leadership team on important and relevant topics.

If you are the **secretary** of your Rotary club, much of the success your club will achieve will depend upon you knowing how to handle the many responsibilities of this important position in a Rotary club. Even for the seasoned secretaries, Rotary is a dynamic organization which is constantly changing to address the needs of Rotary clubs, communities and

society in general. Every three years, Rotary International convenes the Council on Legislation which addresses hundreds of changes to the Rotary Club Constitution, Bylaws and Policies that directly impact your club and the role of all club officers, especially club secretaries. Making sure you are up to date on these changes is an important part of your responsibility as secretary. In addition, attending will give you new energy, great ideas and motivation to better serve your club and community as a member of your club's leadership team.

If you are a **director** in your Club, as a director of your club, you have been elected to make decisions that will impact the future of your club. The sessions will help you better understand the issues faced by your club and your officers that you will be asked to vote on as you serve as a director. Additionally, the sessions will enhance your understanding of Rotary, its objects and mission which will strengthen your club.

If you **chair a committee** in our Rotary club, your participation will enhance any member's experience as a Rotarian. Sessions will address specific functions assigned to club committees. The topicsmay include public relations, membership, service projects, club administration and The Rotary Foundation among others. As a committee chair, you will have the opportunity to share ideas with your peers from clubs across the district which will give you new ideas and motivation for improving your club.

And even if you have served as a **district leader** previously and are assuming a leadership position this year, past district leaders will benefit from updated training as Rotary International continually updates programs and leadership materials. Yearly themes and emphases change, and this meeting provides an opportunity to meet new leaders and develop rapport.

<u>And</u> if you are a **Rotary Club member**, please note that one key to a successful and growing Rotary club is informed and enthusiastic members. Attending Rotary meetings above the club level exposes you to knowledge about Rotary that will motivate you and your club will become stonger and more effective. You will also expand your personal and business network to Rotarians from across the district and you will enhance your personal leadership skills.

What Is The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI)

RLI is a grassroots coalition of Rotary districts implementing a leadership development program for "potential" leaders of Rotary CLUBS. RLI believes that excellent CLUB leadership (all types of club leaders) is essential to the future of Rotary in a complex and fast changing world. Most Rotarians have not been exposed to the great scope of Rotary around the world and have not considered what leadership skills are necessary to move Rotary forward. RLI strongly believes that a good Rotary Club leader must know the evolution of Rotary, its current status and activities in the world and have a vision for what Rotary can be in the future.

RLI provides a three day non-consecutive basic course in both Rotary knowledge and leadership skills, especially for voluntary organizations. RLI follows an adult learning approach with facilitated discussion led by trained Rotary facilitators.

The cost is \$70 per Rotarian per course. This cost covers course materials, coffee breaks and lunch. Usually the Rotary club covers the cost for their members to attend since the club will be the beneficiary of a more knowledgeable membership.

In order to assist Clubs to develop a vision, the District has a team of experienced Rotarians who can facilitate visioning sessions. Since we started the program, five or six years ago, close to 40 Cubs have held sessions. A few Clubs have held two or three session, up-dating their vision on a regular basis.

Why do we need vision?

Visioning facilitation helps a Rotary Club to develop its own vision and then sets out the steps necessary to achieve that vision. It is worth noting that the result is not a vision set out by the District or Rotary International. Instead, the result is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members.
