7070 District Literacy Committee's Featured Project - The 7070 District Literacy Awards

There are 5 basic requirements. They are outlined below with some suggestions. Each year the district gives awards to those clubs who are active in promoting literacy. A literacy project is one of the fundamental tasks each club is expected to complete. To be awarded a 7070 District Literacy Award

BASIC REQUIREMENTS. (MANDATORY)

- 1. Establish a club literacy committee and supply a contact name to the District Literacy Chair. Pick one member from your club and assign them the responsibility to earn a Literacy Award for the club.
- 2. Identify community needs. This can easily be done in concert with the Special Needs Superintendent of your local school board.
- 3 Develop a literacy plan. Send a copy of the details to of the plan to the Chair Dennis Bayley to dennis.bayley@icloud.com or <a href="mailto:michael@mail
- 4. For literacy month, March, the club's speaker program should include a speaker on a literacy topic. Your local library most likely has a literacy project that they would love to share.
- 5. Report progress on literacy related projects the District literacy chair on a regular basis. That could easily be accomplished by e-mail.

Now that does not sound like a stretch, does it?

Completion of these 5 simple tasks will qualify a club for a District Literacy Award. Completion of one of these tasks will satisfy the literacy responsibility for this year.

For an award at the distinction level an additional 5 items must be completed from the following list.

- 6. Obtain media coverage for a literacy related project. Write a news release and send it to your local paper
 - 7. Participate in an Early Childhood literacy project.
- 8. Report literacy matters on a regular basis to all club members. A quick report from the podium should handle that
- 9. Arrange and promote a fund-raising activity to finance a literacy program. Send a cheque to the Amarok Society; sponsor a student in a CALS project; support the Bookworm project by sponsoring a foster child; donate to Imagination Library. There are lots of options, choose one.
- 10. Participate in a program to meet community literacy needs, especially those involving visible minority groups.
 - 11. Invite club members to participate in a hands-on literacy activity.
- 12. Participate in literacy related workshops, or conference break-out sessions organized by the District.
 - 13. Participate in an International or Canada-wide literacy initiative.
- 14. Inform the general public about the Literacy problem in Canada. Use your Facebook Page as an easy way to do this.
- 15. Actively participate in a local school board literacy initiative such as Class or school-wide Spelling Bee or Readathon. You will have a ton of fun.
