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District Governor's Newsletter MAY 1, 2017 Rotary Serving Humanity

My Fellow Rotarians,

May is Youth Service Month in Rotary, when Rotary Clubs around the world focus on youth services, Rotaract, Interact, RYLA, Youth Exchange, Camp Enterprise, Adventures in Citizenship and in our District - Earlyact. Our District is again doing well with Youth Services and I will let our Youth Services Chair, PDG Doug Byers say more about this in a writing that follows.

April was a busy month as I attended several events in the District plus spent a week in Honduras working on a microfinance project. While all the events were great, I would like to speak of two of them.

The first was on Saturday, April 8 when I attended the Rotary Club of Ajax's Kids Against Hunger event. This was their fourth time packing and what a great job this year. They packed 270 boxes which equates to 58,000 meals in short order as they had approximately 220 volunteers (Rotarians and non-Rotarians) that came out to help that day. In the past, the Club donated some of the meals to individual churches or food banks in Durham Region, or in Toronto. This year, Feed the Need in Durham (a centralized food hub) took 1/2 of the boxes, approximately 29,000 meals. Twenty-four boxes (almost 5,200 meals) is heading to Baffin Island for distribution through the auspices of Truth North Aid. The rest of the boxes will be distributed by Kids Against Hunger Canada internationally according to need and the availability of an on-the-ground partner that can store and distribute the food. In the past, they have sent food to Haiti and countries in Central America and South East Asia.

Following the packing, I went to the closing of the Pickering Music Festival hosted by the Rotary Club of Pickering. The mission of the Pickering Rotary Music Festival is to encourage both creative participation in, and the development of, musical excellence for the Durham community by providing a fair and equal environment of music competition. This is achieved by providing each student, 405 entries this year, with invaluable and constructive feedback with qualified third party adjudicators, as well as sponsoring the top performers with the opportunity to participate and progress to Provincial competitions; a \$3,000 investment. In addition to these benefits, the festival awarded \$7,800 in scholarships and prizes with each student placing first in their category receiving a medallion.

This year was a banner year for both the festival, celebrating 30 years, and host, The Rotary Club of Pickering, who is 75 years young this year. The two-week long festival wrapped up with the Stars of the Festival Concert which showcased the top talent and served as an avenue to hand out the awards, medallions and cash prizes. The evening of celebration had Justice David Stone in the role of Master of Ceremonies who not only Co-Founded the festival 30 years ago, is also The Rotary Club of Pickering's longest running member.

A member of the Club wrote to me saying "The Rotary slogan "Service above Self" could not be better demonstrated by the Pickering Rotary Music Festival which provides such an incredible service to the local Durham student music community. It truly takes a village to put on a festival of this size and with the continued support of the Rotary Club of Pickering, local community, sponsors and advertisers, we look forward to providing these incredible opportunities to the local student musical community for many years to come. It is an honour to take such a leadership role in the arts community throughout the Durham Region."

Isn't this what it is all about? Rotarians Making a Difference.

Rotary Foundation Chair, Kaylan Banerjee's Monthly Message -May 2017 - Making the world better for 100 years

Dear fellow Rotarians,



As we near the end of our yearlong celebration of The Rotary Foundation's 100th anniversary, let's stop to think about what the world would be like if Rotarians had never created an endowment fund for doing good in the world.

I think we can say for certain that without Rotary's historic PolioPlus program, the world would not be on the verge of eradicating polio. Although public health officials and governments would have carried out routine vaccination efforts, it was Rotary's leadership and support that provided the impetus to move beyond containment of the virus to global eradication. And let's consider the other diseases our Foundation grant projects have prevented and treated by providing access to health care, clean water, and adequate sanitation. Malaria, cholera, HIV/ AIDS, Guinea worm - the list goes on and on. How many

thousands of people have avoided suffering and even death because Rotarians carried out projects?

Without the Foundation, many more people would have remained illiterate and many others would not have the vocational skills needed to earn a living and provide for their families.

And then there is our quest for peace. In 2002, the first peace fellows started class at the Rotary Peace Centers. Today, hundreds of our graduates are using their skills to prevent and mediate conflict and help those whose lives have been devastated by war.

In villages around the world, you see hundreds of signs identifying Rotary Foundation projects. They stand beside water wells and are affixed to clinics and schools. When I see one of these signs, I feel proud to be a Rotarian and I think, "My contributions helped make this happen". Let's never forget that behind every one of these signs is a story of the people whose lives have been touched and perhaps even saved. It is their stories that demonstrate conclusively how much better the world is because The Rotary Foundation exists.

Clubs interested in applying for District Grants for projects they plan to do in the 2017-18 Rotary year need to complete their applications no later than May 31, 2017. Applications should be made on a special form, available on the District's website (www.rotary7070.oorg)

District Grants can be used for both local and international project. Projects can be of various size, but most are in the \$3 -15,000 range. To encourage cooperation between Clubs, the funding formula will give more funds to projects with several participating Clubs.

Clubs that want to take advantage of the Rotary Foundation's Grants program must be qualified. To be qualified, a Club must do the following

- have at least two of its members attend a Qualification Seminar, organized by the District, and
- sign a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU)

Our Qualification Seminar took place in Oshawa Saturday, February 11, 2017. If your Club didn't send two members to that Seminar, you need to have two members attend the 'Catch-up' Seminar at the District Assembly, Saturday, May 13, 2017. We will actually run two one-hour seminars at the Assembly. One will focus on Global Grant projects, the other on District Grant projects. Attending either will count towards the Club being qualified.

Last year's award winner was the former Chair of the Water & Sanitation Rotary Action Group, Past District Governor Ron Denham.

Submissions for potential recipients of this award will be welcomed from any Rotary Club in District 7070. Submissions should include a bio of the individual or group being proposed, an outline of the specific achievements relating to the award that this individual or group is being considered for, and any supporting documentation deemed appropriate. Submissions will be reviewed by the District 7070 Awards Committee in consultation with the District Governor. **Submission deadline is June 30th, 2017**.

Arch Klumph Society Canada Day at Rotary International

Headquarters - April 12, 2017

The Arch Klumph Society Canada Day is an opportunity for Canadian Rotarians who have the desire to make a significant commitment to the future of The Rotary Foundation to become a member of AKS during The Rotary Foundation Centennial year and the celebration of 150 years of Canadian Confederation. A special event was held on April 12, 2017 at One Rotary Center in Evanston, Illinois for the new Canadian members of the Arch Klumph Society (AKS). This includes an all Canadian induction ceremony attended by senior Rotary leaders, tours of Rotary headquarters and gala dinner for the new society members.

Arch Klumph Society members support The Rotary Foundation for a variety of reasons. With their help, the Foundation is fulfilling Rotary's promise of creating a polio- free world. Children and families are living healthier lives through the Foundation's Global and District grants. Educational programs and scholarships are helping young people build lasting friendships and mutual understanding with their peers around the world. Member support enables tomorrow's leaders to live and study together as Rotary Peace Fellows and provides them the opportunity to begin building a more peaceful world.

Why have a AKS Canada Day? Canadian Rotarians have always been passionate supporters of The Rotary Foundation. Many Canadians have held key leadership position with The Rotary Foundation. The AKS Canada Day continues this tradition of significant Canadian support for the work and goals of our Foundation. The centennial of The Rotary Foundation and the celebration of 150 years of Confederation make 2017 a fitting year to make an inspired gift to The Foundation.

Rotarians had reason to celebrate recently as they were on hand at RI headquarters, on April 12, 2017 for the induction of 14 Canadians, this year, who became members of the Arch Klumph Society, 5 of which are members of District 7070: Past District Governor Bill and Delphine Patchett (RC Cobourg); Past Assistant Governor Michael and Karen Parker (RC Cobourg); District 7070 Treasurer Devon and Linda Biddle (RC Oshawa-Parkwood); Past District Governor Ron Denham (RC Toronto Eglinton), and one anonymous donor.

Arch C. Klumph founded the Rotary Club of Cleveland, Ohio, USA, in 1911 and was the 1916-17 Rotary president. Addressing the 1917 convention in Atlanta, Georgia, he eloquently promoted the idea of "endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." That year, the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, made the first gift, of \$26.50, to the fledgling fund. When the endowment had grown significant enough to require administrators to manage it, The Rotary Foundation was born, and Klumph was selected as one of its first trustees.

The Arch Klumph Society (AKS) was created in 2004, during Rotary International's centennial celebration, as a meaningful way to recognize the Foundation's highest-level donors, those who have made a donation of US \$250,000 or more to the humanitarian programs of the Rotary Foundation.

We have three photos to share with you. As you may recall, it was announced that Ron Denham received his AKS award at the annual District 7070 Rotary Foundation Evening in October 2016.

May is Youth Service Month

What Is your Rotary Club doing to focus on Youth Service in May 2016?

Rotaract:

It's a global movement of young leaders who are developing innovative solutions to the world's most pressing challenges. Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18-30 to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service. In communities worldwide, Rotary and

Rotaract members work side by side to take action through service. From big cities to rural villages, Rotaract is changing communities like yours. Rotaract clubs decide how to organize and run their club, manage their own funds, and plan and carry out activities and service projects aligned with causes that are important to your community. Rotary club sponsors offer guidance and support and work with your club as partners in service. There are 9,522 Rotaract Clubs with 291,000 members in 177 countries.

Can your Rotary club sponsor a Rotaract club? YES

Help young adults in your community develop leadership skills, build lasting friendships, and create positive change through Rotaract. Not only will Rotaract make a difference in their lives, it will also energize and inspire your Rotary club and connect you with enthusiastic and capable partners in service. If your university or community doesn't already have a Rotaract club, you can start one. Here's what you'll need to get started:

- Your Rotary club to provide support and partnership
- A faculty or sponsor club adviser to guide and mentor you

EarlyAct[™] also engages students in character-building activities and prepares them for leadership roles to identify and carry out projects which benefit their school, local and global communities. The Presidential Citation due date for achieving and reporting goals is **30 June**. The citation is an award that clubs can earn by achieving goals for timely payment of semiannual invoices, membership growth, Foundation giving, humanitarian service, and more. Earning the citation is a high honor that only 15 to 20 percent of clubs receive annually.

All members registered on My Rotary can <u>view their club's progress</u> toward achieving the citation. Your members can learn more about citation reporting in this <u>video</u>, and see tips on reaching each goal from the <u>citation achievement</u> guide. Learn more about the Presidential Citation by participating in a <u>discussion group</u>— and achieve one citation goal by doing so. The New membership Flexibility:

Many clubs have been benefiting from the new <u>membership flexibility</u> resulting from the 2016 Council on Legislation decisions. The changes in policy affect when, where, and how clubs meet and the types of memberships they offer. The Rotary Club of Capitol Hill, Washington, D.C., USA, has doubled its membership in six months by creating two new membership types with reduced dues — one for young professionals, and one for spouses or partners. The Rotary Club of Singapore East has changed its meeting structure: Members now meet formally for lunch only twice per month. The other two weeks, the club meets in a less formal environment. The Rotary Club of Deerfield, Illinois, USA, now offers shared membership as an option.

If you have new members you want counted in your membership achievements for the current Rotary year, they must now be reported to RI on or before 30 June.

•Members added with 1 July 2017 effective dates will no longer be included in your annual 1 July 2017 membership start numbernumber, but they will be billed on the1 July 2017 club invoice and counted toward 2017-18 membership growth.

•Members <u>terminated</u> with effective dates on or before 1 July 2017 will reduce your club's 2016-17 membership achievement, reduce your 1 July 2017membership start number, and will not be billed on the 1 July 2017 club invoice.

As a result, it is possible for your club's July 2017 annual membership start number to be lower than your July 2017 invoice if new members were added with a 1 July 2017 effective date.

In summary, beginning immediately with the 2016-17 Rotary year, new members added on or before 30 June will count toward the current Rotary year, while members added with 1 July effective dates will count toward the new Rotary year. We hope this simplifies your reporting and reflects your membership more accurately. If you have any questions, write to membershipdevelopment@rotary.org.

SHELTERBOX News For May 2017



Understanding the Local Situation is Crucial to Promoting Community Recovery - ShelterBox in Peru

At ShelterBox we are impatient to see a world where no family is without shelter after a disaster. While this impatience drives us to move quickly to help families after a disaster, we don't just make quick decisions, we make good decisions. The local communities know their specific issues, people, and local recovery process better than anyone else does. We work with communities and local organizations to make sure we are getting the right support to the right people when they need it.

ShelterBox currently has a team in Peru assessing wide scale flooding caused by El Nino rains. Cyclical El Nino weather patterns usually affect Peru, however, this is the most severe El Nino impact the country has ever experienced. Over 100 people have been killed, roads and bridges have been swept away, houses are flooded, and farmland has been destroyed.



ShelterBox teams are currently working with local Rotary contacts, the Peruvian Civil Defense agency and local communities to visit the worst hit areas and understand what challenges people are facing

Our number one goal is to make sure we provide these communities with the tools they need not only to survive, but to recover from this disaster. We also have a responsibility to the families we serve and those who support us to be as effective as possible. In order to achieve these goals, understanding the local situation and taking time to do proper assessments is crucial.

In Piura (Northern Peru) most buildings remain structurally sound, however,

until flood waters recede residents need to stay elsewhere. Community centers and schools are open for people to stay in but clean water, blankets, solar lights and other essentials are desperately needed. **Some residents are choosing** to sleep in unsafe conditions on the side of the road to try to get help from passing vehicles.

Floodwaters are expected to recede soon in Piura so people will be able to go home. Providing supplies like water filtration and carriers, solar lights, and blankets will get people away from the road, and give them the tools they need for self recovery and to return home when the water has receded.

In other areas of Peru, a full shelter solution is necessary for recovery to help families whose homes were damaged by the floodwaters. By understanding the local situation, our teams have been able to identify who needs aid, and exactly what they need to recover.



ShelterBox teams will continue to work in Peru, Colombia, Mozambique, Somaliland, Cameroon, Niger, Iraq and throughout the Syrian region to ensure we help affected communities receive the tools they need to recover from these devastating events. In late March, HIP Director, Fred Lawlor and Elder Danny Beaton were guests at the Senior Tamil Centre of Ontario and presented on Indigenous customs and talked about HIP. There were about 150 in an attendance and the presentation was well received.

On March 23rd, HIP Director, Kevin Webb proposed a guest speaker at the Rotary Club of Stratford. George Henry (Chippewa's) was well received by the club.

On April 19th, Chris Snyder was guest speaker at the Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton and presented on HIP. Eglinton is providing bursaries for three Indigenous students at Ryerson studying midwifery. They are wanting more involvement.

The Rotary Club of Toronto Foundation Board has agreed to provide the Save the Evidence Project in Brantford with a grant of \$40,200 to assist in the preservation of the Mohawk Institute Residential School. This is great news! and

a wonderful donation by the RCT Foundation. This school is only one of four remaining in Canada and serves as a reminder of a dark part of Canadian history. It was open from 1828 to 1970. It is well worth a visit.

The Rotary Club of Toronto recently had Bob Rae speak on reconciliation. A new podcast with Bob should be available soon. The club also made a donation to the GTA Imagination Library. Books are being sent monthly to about 180 Indigenous children in the GTA between 0 and 5.

The Rotary Club of Norfolk Sunrise has been working with Pikangikum First Nation in supporting their music program and outdoor program. The club has provided guitars, keyboards, clarinet and flute along with equipment and prizes for their annual Battle of the Bands concert. The outdoor program has been developed to build skills of students in adventure and outfitting careers. Snowshoes, fishing gear, canoes and canoe training have been provided to enable students to participate in a five-day canoe trip in June. Great work!

HIP Director, John Andras had an opportunity to visit Kashechewan on the occasion of a joint announcement by the federal, provincial and local governments to relocate the town. He and Dr. Murray Trusler, former chief of staff in Moose Factory and chair of the relocation committee were given a guided tour of the community by some local children. This photo says it all with an inspiring message on the canoe paddle. "*Together we work for hope".* You can see it better in our photo album. The little girl is Gwen Wesley. Our minds are now thinking about the residents as they have had to flee because of flooding. John addressed the audience and was thanked for all of the hockey equipment that HIP and Rotary clubs delivered.



We were also fortunate to receive funding from MIRR of \$107,500 for two canoe trips this summer by the young people (Paddle with the Cree) from Kashechewan to paddle down the old fur trading route on the Albany River.

Nicole Patterson of the East York Club and John Currie, our Director of In-Kind-Gifts and Projects have recently been certified as facilitators for the Kairos Blanket Program. For details go to the link (<u>Homepage - The Blanket Exercise</u>). Please contact either Nicole at nic.patterson@gmail.com or John at john.wayne.currie@outlook.com to book a program.

Gifts-in-Kind. This has been an overwhelming success. Over 180 pallets of goods worth over \$650,000 have been sent to twenty First Nations communities including two in Manitoba. Transportation valued at more than \$120,000 by Trucks for Change and Wasaya Airlines have been provided for no cost. HIP has been the co-ordinator and facilitator of the transportation. This is a partnership between the donor organizations (schools, churches, Rotary clubs), transportation companies and the local First Nations communities. We are working hard to put it on a sustaining basis for the future. There has been some media, most focused on the donors. It is our aim to turn this into the start of engagement and interaction amongst people and the communities north and south. Already a few pen pal exchanges are starting to evolve.

Adventure in Understanding will take place on August 27 - September 1, 2017.

Applications are now open for youth aged 16-18 years of age. Sponsored and in partnership with the Rotary Club of Peterborough Kawartha, Curve Lake First Nation, Camp Kawartha and the Canadian Canoe Museum, this annual canoe trip brings together Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth to be leaders in sharing and experiencing aspects of Indigenous culture leading to greater understanding and reconciliation. Check the application link on our blog.

7. Our HIP reading list and movies on our website, while not a one-on-one discussion, might inspire you to find out more.

8. If travelling through a community with Indigenous Peoples, stop and allocate some time to just having a chat.

The Rotary Club of Montego Bay Sunrise in Jamaica was having problems raising money for a water and sanitation project at 11 schools in their country.

With the encouragement of their District Governor, Paul Brown, they submitted a project to <u>Rotary Ideas</u> where they were able to link up with the Rotary Club of Central Cayman Islands to get a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary District 3450 (comprised of clubs in Hong Kong, Macau, Mongolia, and Guangdong of the People's Republic of China) has partnered with the Australian non-profit organization SkyJuice Foundation. On World Water Day 2017 they announced their plans to bring clean water to half a million Chinese students in the remote villages near Yan'an City. Water Project Unites Lebanon Clubs

In 2011, Rotary members in northern Lebanon, with the assistance of The Rotary Foundation, installed a water filtration system in a few schools.

Now Rotary District 2452 has all 24 Rotary Clubs working together with the goal that "Every student has the right to clean water."

The Rotary organizers of the project know that clean water is the main objective, but they also saw the opportunity to work towards healing Lebanon's long history of sectarian strife.

With the assistance of The Rotary Foundation, this partnership has been able to complete three "Rainwater Harvesting Villages". They are taking the concept to over 30 villages which will impact on over 10,000 people

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MEMBERSHIP CHALLENGE

From District 7070 membership Chair Virginia O'Reilly

At the District 7070 Conference this year, District Governor Jim Louttit issued this challenge to all Rotarians and their Rotary Clubs in District 7070. Where does your club stand on meeting this challenge? The CHALLENGE!

A Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- A net gain in membership. Small clubs (up to 50 members) must achieve a net gain of at least one member; Large clubs (51 or more members) must achieve a net gain of at least two members.
- Improve the member retention rate by at least 1 percent from last year, Or, maintain 100 percent retention.
- Induct new members under the age of 40. Clubs with up to 50 members must induct a minimum of 2 new members under age 40; Clubs with 51 or more members must induct four.
- The new members must create profiles on My Rotary.

And, a Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- Hold a visioning session, and Develop a plan based on the session with at least 1st action timeline
- Do a club assessment, and hold an assembly with the entire club to share the findings
- Complete at least 2 changes to improve your club based on findings from a Visioning/Club assessment
- At least 2 members attend a District Membership Seminar.
- Every new member is assigned a mentor who, within 3 months of the new member joining the club, does at least 2 the following 3 things:
 - Meets with the new member to learn about what they are looking for in Rotary and how they can help get them connected and involved;
 - o Accompanies them to at least one make-up meeting;
 - o Joins them in at least one club activity (e.g., committee meeting, hands on project, etc.).

The **PRIZE! \$5000 – Funds to be used towards a Community project. a**ll clubs who successfully meet the challenge will be entered into a draw for the prize monies (e.g. 3 prizes of \$2500, \$1500, \$1000)

What is the District Training Assembly?

The annual district assembly is the major leadership training event in each Rotary district of the world. The workshops offer motivation, inspiration, Rotary information and new ideas for club officers, directors and key committee chairmen of each club.

Some of the most experienced district leaders conduct informative discussions on all phases of Rotary administration and service projects. The sessions give all participants valuable new ideas to make their club more effective and interesting. Normally eight to ten delegates from each club (officers, directors, committee chairs, etc.) are invited to attend the training session.

Another important feature is a review by the incoming district governor of the program theme and emphasis of the new RI president for the coming year. District goals and objectives are also described and plans are developed for their implementation.

The success of your Rotary club is frequently determined by the club's full representation and participation in this annual meeting.

This event provides a continuation of this training for presidents-elect and does not duplicate what you learned at PETS. It also provides you the opportunity to train alongside the rest of your club's leadership team on important and relevant topics.

If you are the **secretary** of your Rotary club, much of the success your club will achieve will depend upon you knowing how to handle the many responsibilities of this important position in a Rotary club. Even for the seasoned secretaries, Rotary is a dynamic organization which is constantly changing to address the needs of Rotary clubs, communities and society in general. What Is The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI)

RLI is a grassroots coalition of Rotary districts implementing a leadership development program for "potential" leaders of Rotary CLUBS. RLI believes that excellent CLUB leadership (all types of club leaders) is essential to the future of Rotary in a complex and fast changing world. Most Rotarians have not been exposed to the great scope of Rotary around the world and have not considered what leadership skills are necessary to move Rotary forward. RLI strongly believes that a good Rotary Club leader must know the evolution of Rotary, its current status and activities in the world and have a vision for what Rotary can be in the future.

RLI provides a three day non-consecutive basic course in both Rotary knowledge and leadership skills, especially for voluntary organizations. RLI follows an adult learning approach with facilitated discussion led by trained Rotary facilitators.

The cost is \$70 per Rotarian per course. This cost covers course materials, coffee breaks and lunch. Usually the Rotary club covers the cost for their members to attend since the club will be the beneficiary of a more knowledgeable membership.

Part I and Part II and Part III is scheduled to be held in September 2017 at Loyalist College in Belleville, in November 2017 at the Oshawa Golf and Curling Club in Oshawa, and in April 2018 at the New Events Centre at Centennial College, 937 Progress Ave, Toronto, ON M1G 3T8 in Scarborough. Rotary Clubs, like any other organizations, need to have a plan for where they are heading. In order to assist Clubs to develop a vision, the District has a team of experienced Rotarians who can facilitate visioning sessions. Since we started the program, five or six years ago, close to 40 Cubs have held sessions. A few Clubs have held two or three session, up-dating their vision on a regular basis.

Why do we need vision?

Visioning facilitation helps a Rotary Club to develop its own vision and then sets out the steps necessary to achieve that vision. It is worth noting that the result is not a vision set out by the District or Rotary International. Instead, the result is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members. This vision will help to ensure consensus, continuity and consistency in the Club leadership and programming, to set the stage for future progress. **Further contact**
