#### CBH, Christ Brings Hope Ministry, Cancer Foundation, **Bringing Hope and Making a Difference**

My father was such a generous man, he would give you the shirt off his back. If you needed a job, he would offer you one. He just loved seeing people enjoying themselves," said Michelle C. Higgins, RN, about her father, the late Joe Cicero. "When I was very young, he was diagnosed with throat cancer but we didn't really talk about it back then. I certainly didn't understand what he was going through to provide meals for us while undergoing treatment."

Joe Cicero survived that earlier bout with cancer but succumbed to colorectal cancer in 2014. He had started Polar Bear Refrigeration and Air Conditioning in Kingston and later moved his business and his family to Cape May, NJ. His daughter Michelle is a Registered Nurse who works in the Oncology Department of a local hospital. She is married to Doug Higgins the Chief of Police in Dallas Township and together they have three

children.

"We were invited to a cancer ministry training program sponsored by the Cancer Institutes of America and we decided to go," said Michelle of the program that aims to help church organizations start their own cancer ministry programs. "It was a very extensive training program and we do provide seminars to church groups but we decided to take it a step further." Doug and Michelle have started their own 501(c)3 nonprofit organization called CBH

(Christ Brings Hope) Ministry and Cancer Foundation. The mission of CBH Ministry is to Make a Difference and to help those who may be struggling from the challenges that a cancer diagnosis may bring. It doesn't matter to the founders of CBH if the struggles are spiritual, emotional, physical, or financial, they are there to offer help and hope.

"One of the things we do is to provide HOPE in either a gift jar or



a bag," said Michelle who provides these gifts to local hospitals, Continued on page 3

doctors' offices, infusion centers, and churches. They are given to patients who are receiving chemotherapy. The Jars and Bags of HOPE contain encourage - mints, an ink pen and word search, tissues, lip balm, and are topped with a beautiful artificial flower. "We fill the bag with little things to help encourage them," said Michelle. "We add encouraging cards to show someone is thinking of you and praying for you."

Michelle has been filling and distributing these gifts with all of the encouraging scripture passages and notes while she gives full credit to Doug for the paperwork involved in creating and operating a 501(c)3. "He is a good guy. Whatever I ask of him he does," said Michelle. "We are blessed and fortunate to have the jobs we have."

The CBH Ministry and Cancer Foundation is nonprofit and depends on the generosity of others to provide help to families. "We may be contacted by a local church asking for financial aid for someone. We can provide a gift card for groceries or a gift card for gas. We try to help in any way that we can," said Michelle, of the organization they started this past July.

"We started with our own funds but we have done some fundraisers to help. The community has been very supportive. I didn't want to ask because everyone is struggling but no one said no. That really means so much to us." One recent fundraiser was the result of a donation of a number of beautiful travel rosaries. CBH was able to find sponsors for all of those rosaries but may be offering them again in the near future.

CBH is holding a Valentine's Day Fundraiser in which three lucky winners will each receive a \$100 gift certificate for dinner, a dozen roses, and assorted Hot Chocolate Bombs. The chocolates were donated by a friend who wishes to remain anonymous but the roses are coming from Evans King Floral of Forty Fort. "One of the aides working in the oncology department brought a Jar of HOPE into the room of an elderly female patient who started crying when she opened it. Then the aide was crying as she told me about

it," said Michelle. "I went in to see the patient, too, and we cried together as she looked at the encouraging notes and scripture passages. When you can just bring hope, even if it's for just one person, it makes a difference. That's what we want to do. That's who my dad was."

# **Boback First Woman Appointed Chair of House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee**

Rep. Karen Boback (R-Lackawanna/Luzerne/Wyoming) has been appointed as the first woman chairman of the House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee by Speaker Bryan Cutler (R-Lancaster) for the 2021-22 session. Boback was recently sworn into her eighth term in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives.

"I am proud to be part of a team of strong legislative leaders who support our Commonwealth," Boback said. "It is my honor to have Speaker Cutler's and my fellow members' continued trust and support with the chairmanship of this important standing committee."

The House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee oversees legislation concerning public safety, emergency planning and preparedness, 911 emergency telephone services, fire and emergency medical services response and training, PA National Guard and military/veterans issues, nuclear power plant safety and response programs, flood response and mitigation programs, hazardous material planning and response, emergency communication systems, and homeland security and safety programs and initiatives.

"In the district, I have made veterans and their needs a priority,"

Boback explained. "I have held veterans' outreach in our offices, as well as organized mobile veterans counseling outreach." Boback has held 13 annual veterans' recognition events and expos. She is also an active member on the Gino J. Merli Veterans' Center Advisory Council. She has hosted several fire and EMS seminars to keep emergency responders in her district up to date on current emergency services laws and programs.

In the upcoming legislative session, Boback is eager to work with her colleagues in the House and Senate, as well as all of the stakeholder organizations and state

Winter Safety Tips to Help Kids and **Families Stay Injury-Free** 

Safe Kids Pennsylvania reminds parents to keep an eye out and avoid preventable injuries during the winter

Winter is a time when there is a risk of injuries in a variety of areas, from winter sports to home fires. Research shows that young children are particularly vulnerable to injuries from winter sports like skiing, snowboarding and sledding. Additionally, parents might unintentionally create unsafe environments for children out of concern for keeping their infants and toddlers warm during the colder weather.

Safe Kids PA recommends the following tips for winter safety. Car Seats and Winter Coats. We know you want your little ones to be warm, but please don't buckle your child into a car seat while they are wearing a bulky coat. The puffiness of the coat creates extra space between the harness and your child, which puts your child at a greater risk of injury in the event of a crash. Instead, use a blanket to keep your child warm, or lay the jacket over your children like a blanket once they're safely secured.

Sleep Safety. Extra blankets can seem so cozy in a baby's crib but soft bedding can block a baby's airway during sleep. A firm mattress covered with a tight-fitting crib sheet is all you need for your baby to sleep well. If you're worried about keeping your baby warm on those cold winter nights, try using a sleep sack (wearable blanket) and save the blankets for when baby is older. Additionally, remember to always have baby sleep alone, on their backs, in a crib (or similar flat item, like a bassinette or pack 'n play).

Winter Sports. Kids love to push the limits when they're skiing or snowboarding. Make sure they wear helmets and other proper gear to keep them safe if they fall. Also, while sledding may seem like a low-risk activity, children can still be seriously injured. Be sure to sled only on hills that are away from roads and clear of objects that could cause harm if struck (like large rocks, trees or stumps), and always have an adult supervising when children are sledding.

Carbon Monoxide. If you are warming up a vehicle before using it, don't forget to remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. It is extremely dangerous to leave a car, SUV or motorcycle engine running inside a garage. Make sure your home has a carbon monoxide alarm on every level, especially near sleeping areas, and keep them at least 15 feet away from fuel-burning appliances.

#### **Five Tips to Prepare For Taxes**

It's that time of year – tax preparation season is here! I'm sure some of you dread this time of year, but I've got five tips that can help you keep on track:

- 4. If you work with a CPA, hopefully they offer advice for your specific tax situation during and after preparing your returns. This can be very important for not only the current year (can a traditional IRA contribution lower your tax bill?) but the following year as well (should you contribute more to 401(k) at work?). Offering suggestions that can increase the amount you get back (or help you pay less than you have in the past) can be very valuable for some.
- 5. Your tax professional should be willing to speak with any other professionals you have hired. There are many reasons why insurance professionals, professional financial advisors, attorneys, etc., should speak to your tax preparer (with your permission of course) to coordinate on issues that may be important and need to be looked at from different perspectives. This way, you get the input of trusted professionals on issues that overlap into several areas of your personal financial/tax situation.

Find an experienced local tax preparer who works for a professional tax preparation firm, earns his/her money from hourly/job fees (NOT charging by the form), believes in helping their clients improve their tax/financial situations, and has the heart & demeanor of a teacher, NOT a salesman, and chances are you've found the right tax preparer to help you with your tax situation.

#### Boback Reminds 100% Service Connected Disabled Veterans of Real Estate Tax Exemption

Rep. Karen Boback (R-Lackawanna/Luzerne/Wyoming), chairman of the House Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee, would like to remind veterans who are 100% permanently disabled due to service that they are eligible for an exemption on their real estate tax.

This program provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) offers real estate tax exemption for any honorably discharged veteran who is 100% disabled, has a financial need and is a resident of the Commonwealth.

Veterans may apply for the exemption by contacting the Veterans Affairs director in their county of residence: Lackawanna County - Director David Eisele - 570-963-6778 – https://www.lackawannacounty.org/index.php/departmentsagencies/human-services/veterans-affairs. Luzerne County - Director Jim Spagnola - 570-706-3960 – https://www.luzernecounty.org/508/Veterans. Wyoming County - Director Jack Hubert - 570-996-2258 – https://wycopa.org/directory/veterans-representative/

Veteran's eligibility criteria: Served in the military honorably. Served during established war service dates as determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs \*\*The following decorations can also be used to establish wartime service: Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal or Navy Expeditionary Medal. Must have a total or 100% permanent service-connected disability rating by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs or as the result of military service the veteran is blind or paraplegic or has sustained the loss of two or more limbs. Must be a resident of the Commonwealth. Must occupy the real estate as his/her principal dwelling. Dwelling is owned solely by the veteran or as an estate in the entirety. Must prove financial need:

Veteran must prove financial need according to the criteria established by the State Veterans Commission if their annual income exceeds \$92,594, effective Jan. 1, 2019. Applicants with an annual income of \$92,594 or less are given a rebuttable presumption to have a need for the exemption

\*\*Upon the death of a qualified veteran, tax exemption may pass on to the unmarried surviving spouse if financial need can be shown.

An exemption for the financial need can be considered when the applicant's allowable expenses exceed the applicant's household income. The applicant's monthly household expenses will be calculated to include a cost of living allowance and dependent's allowance.

After the DMVA certifies the financial need for an exemption and the eligibility criteria is verified, the county board of assessment and revision of taxes will grant the tax exemption. Cases that have been granted tax exemption will be reviewed periodically to determine continued need for exemption from certain real estate property taxes.





#### **Boback Announces Federal Funding** Awarded to Area School Districts

Rep. Karen Boback (R-Lackawanna/Luzerne/Wyoming) has announced additional funding made available to local school districts from the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CCRSA). "Ensuring that our students and teachers are provided for has been a priority during this pandemic," explained Boback. "It is wonderful to see that federal funds were made available to our school districts from this program that plans for and covers those additional expenses sustained due to the COVID-19 pandemic."

In the 117th Legislative District, Dallas, Lackawanna Trail, Lake Lehman, Northwest Area and Tunkhannock School Districts all received funding as a part of the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER).

As part of the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CCRSA), Congress and the Trump Administration established and appropriated a total of \$54.3 billion for the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. Funding is distributed to states based on each state's proportionate share of Title I, Part A (Title I-A) funding. ESSER funds are intended to support COVID-19 response efforts and may be spent on a wide range of allowable activities.

Pennsylvania's share of this funding is approximately \$2.22 billion, which will be distributed to the state's school districts and charter schools based on the Title I-A formula. This funding is on top of the \$471 million that was distributed to school districts last year through the CARES Act.
