Jorge is a chemical engineer professional, currently Director of Corporation Instatec, company dedicated to the design and building of networking telecom systems. Formerly, he served as managing director of a chemi- cal crop protection joint venture with Dupont in Central America.

Rotarian since 1993, Jorge has served as RI Director, Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator, RI Training Leader, Major Gift Advisor, Council of Legislation member, RI President's Representative. As a member of the Board of Trustee of The Rotary Foundation he is serving as a Chair of the RI/USAID Steering Committee,

Vice Chair of the End Polio Now: Countdown to history challenge Committee, Trustee Liaison of the Operation Re- view Committee. He participated in a National Immunization Day in Moradabad, India and has been keynote speaker at the Lisbon Convention and two times at the International Assembly. He was Convener of RI Insti- tutes in Dominican Republic, Bolivia, Colombia, Monterrey and Panama.

Founder -President of the Central American official Rotary Regional Magazine and the Central American Division of the Rotary Leadership Insti- tute. He was Director of WASH Rotary Action Group and member of the Cadre.

He first saw the power of The Rotary Foundation in 1995, when he led a project to bring clean drinking water to an orphanage using matching grants. Today, he is the primary contact for the \$600,000 WASH in Schools competitive grant program in Guatemala, which is bringing water, sanitation, and hygiene to 48 schools in the country.

In 1988 as Club President he succeeded in reaching 100% Paul Harris participation. He is Benefactor, Major Donor and Bequest Society Member. He was named two times Rotarian of the Year and he is recipient of The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. Jorge and his wife Débora have three children, five grand- children and reside in Guatemala.

Ann Marie Jones is a survivor of sex trafficking who helps women recover from the life she once endured. She is the resident coordinator at Dawn's Place, where she earlier recovered from a 13 year ordeal, became a peer recovery specialist and initiated a twelve-step sexual exploitation recovery program. She is a frequent speaker and an advocate for better anti-human trafficking laws. A

character in her play, "Project Dawn", by Karen Hartman, is based on Ann Marie's experience working toward the exoneration of her criminal record. She was the first recipient of a Rotary Action Group Against Slavery "Freedom Award" and was a speaker at the Rotary International Convention in Toronto. Together with Carol Metzker, she coauthored A Shield Against the Monster: Protecting Children from Human Trafficking. Ann Maire is a mother and grandmother.



An unexpected encounter with an 11 year old Indian girl rescued from sex slavery led Carol Metzker on a quest to aid survivors and prevent new victims overseas and at home in the United States. Carol is an ally for survivors of human trafficking modern slavery, educator, TEDx presenter, author of Facing the Monster: How One Person Can Fight Child Slavery, and coauthor of A Shield Against

the Monster: Protecting Children from Human Trafficking with sex-trafficking survivor, Ann Marie Jones. She works in community outreach at the Chester County (PA, USA) Sheriff's Office, consulted to The Salvation Army's New ay to Stop Trafficking Program, and volunteered with survivors at Dawn's Place for ten years. Carol has spoken about the subject in Seoul, Sydney, Toronto, and Kathmandu as well as throughout the United States. She is the recipient of several humanitarian awards include Rotary International's "Service Above Self".

to combat infectious diseases.

Jim is a member of the Phoenix 100 Rotary Club. He is active with Rotarians Against Malaria Global and Malaria Partners International, also part of Rotary International. The Malaria Microscopy Project unites Rotarians with the Global Health Institute to both combat malaria and enhance healthcare delivery in developing countries. The Global Health Institute funds the education of laboratory technologists to better diagnose malaria and other fevers. The Rotary helps by raising funds to purchase needed microscopes. In sub-Saharan Africa, 60,000 children die of malaria every year. Better microscopy education helps early diagnosis. Jim is working with Rotarians globally with ongoing projects in Ghana, Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Kenya, Botswana, Sudan, Mali, Tanzania, Columbia, and Pakistan. WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION'S "WORLD FUND"?

At the end of every contribution year, each Rotary district's contributions to the Annual Fund-SHARE are divided into two funds: 47.5% is credited to the World Fund (WF) and 47.5% is credited to the District Designated Fund (DDF). The remaining 5% covers operational expenses. The World Fund is used by The Rotary Foundation to pay for the worldwide programs available to all Rotary districts, such as Global Grants.

It is this funding formula which truly makes

The Rotary Foundation an integral part of Rotary International.

Rotary Interact Fundraiser Raises Thousands for Ukraine



Close to 200 people packed the Wallenpaupack Brewing Company in Hawley on Monday, April 4th and helped raise \$12,000 for Ukrainian refugees. Many of them also sang! The event, organized by <u>Honesdale</u> <u>High School's Interact Club</u>, was billed as a karaoke contest with all proceeds going to the Rotary International Disaster Response Fund for Ukraine.

"I can't say enough about the response, it was just overwhelmingly positive," said Brian Fulp, an adviser to the Interact club and a co-organizer. "Everyone really wants to help the Ukraine people in some way, in any way they can. This evening was one way – and it was fun!" Fulp noted that the Skier Family Foundation matched a generous amount of the funds raised. "The Skiers couldn't be here in person, but they were here in spirit," said Fulp, adding, "And now they have about 200 more friends!"

For \$10 per person, attendees got a seat, snacks and a chance to belt out their favorite song for an audience. Among those who sang was a young Ukrainian woman, who received more than one round of applause for her rousing Ukrainian tune.

Members of Honesdale's Interact club, a junior Rotary club of more than 40 high school students, were on hand to man the snack and ticket stations.



Since the Russian army, under President Vladimir Putin, invaded Ukraine on February 24, more than 10 million Ukrainians have been driven from their home. Six million have been displaced within the country and four million have fled Ukraine for neighboring Poland, Romania, Hungary, Moldova and Slovakia. Many left with only the clothes on their backs. Aid groups are trying to resettle them with food and clothing and new papers for citizenship.

The Rotary Fund to date has received more than \$7.3 million in contributions and distributed more than \$1 million in grants to help those displaced by the war. NEW MILFORD AREA ROTARY FINDING SUCCESS WITH CORPORATE MEMBERSHIP RECRUITING

In early 2020 the New Milford Area Rotary Club decided to pursue a Corporate Membership category for its membership drive efforts, and then since March 2021 taking advantage of the District's "new membership dues waiver initiative". This waiver carries through June 30th of this year.

Despite being interrupted to some degree by the onset of the COVID pandemic, the club has steadily realized success with this effort. Since March 2020, the club has realized ten (10) new members through this Corporate Membership initiative, and thirteen (13) new individual memberships, although one (1) of those individual members transferred to Rotary in Wisconsin conducive with an employment change. With that, our current membership as of this newsletter stands at 35 active members and 11 Honorary members. Currently four (4) more new Corporate Memberships and four (4) plus individual memberships are under discussion.

In addition to increasing membership and thus our club's ability to conduct service activities in the community, we envision this effort will eventually help us in the establishment of a Rotary Satellite Club in Montrose, Susquehanna County. The Montrose Club unfortunately turned in its charter in 2016 after 100 years.

Starting in 2019, the New Milford Area Rotary began an effort to re-introduce and return Rotary to Montrose. This started with a District Grant that collaborated with many Montrose area businesses to start the United Way's Real Men Read Mentoring Program in the Kindergarten classes of Montrose Area School District. Additional service activities in the Montrose area include dictionary distribution to third graders, Leopold Chocolate Rotary Wheel fundraising sales, Christmas Season bell ringing on behalf of the Salvation Army, solicitation of business donations for the District On-Line Virtual Auction, Volunteer Ambassador with the American Red Cross Blood Drives, District Youth Essay Contest, and volunteering at the food bank distribution at Endless Mountains Health Systems, Montrose- once each month.

Poland has already received 1.9 million refugees in just the last 20 days. Wellsboro Rotary ShelterBox Project

The Wellsboro Club wanted to provide support for the people of Ukraine, especially the millions of refugees who streamed across the Polish border as their country was attacked by Russian forces.

The Subcarpathian Voivodeship is in southeastern Poland, adjoining the Ukraine border, and has absorbed many of the refugees. Jim Tutak suggested to the club that it sponsor a ShelterBox for use in the area. Most Rotarians are familiar with this international project which was started twenty years ago by a group of Rotarians in England.

Jim was familiar with the area, having relatives living there, and having visited it a few years ago. He suggested that the club raise funds to sponsor a ShelterBox to be used in the area for refugee support.

An initial donation of \$250 was made and it was hoped that the necessary \$1,000 for a box would be raised. Rotarians were asked to donate and an article was published in the local paper. The response from the public was far beyond expectations and as of March 28, \$4,000 has been raised and will be sent to ShelterBox USA, designated for Ukrainian refugee relief.

Aside from ShelterBoxes, Rotary International has established funds to assist in the relief of the plight of the Ukrainian refugees, which is immediate and urgent.
