
Also a few years ago we combined Area 5 into Area 4 and 7. It would be great to get an Assistant Governor for Area 4.

As one of the greatest advances of modern medicine, vaccines are safe, effective, and save millions of lives each year. Our progress in the fight to end polio is proof that vaccines work.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative estimates that the polio vaccine has saved more than 20 million children around the world from paralysis. However, approximately 12.5 million children are totally unvaccinated.

They are known as zero-dose children, and vaccinating them is critical to stopping polio for good.

## **RYLA**

It's that time of year again – time to start thinking about RYLA 2023! This will be the 11th year Rotary District 7410 will host this wonderful leadership program for our area youth.

What is RYLA? RYLA is an acronym for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards and is a highly-curated program that provides leadership training to our area young people. From ice-breakers and team-building activities to motivational speakers and hands-on workshops, RYLA offers the opportunity to connect with peers while learning valuable leadership lessons. The schedule is full of activities that engage the conferees physically, mentally, and emotionally to strengthen their relationship skills, build their confidence, and give them the tools they need to be leaders.

RYLA is open to NEPA students who recently completed 10th grade. A local Rotary Club must sponsor students and there are only 80 spots open each summer. This year, RYLA will be held at Keystone College from Sunday, June 25 through Thursday, June 29, 2023. The cost to send a student is \$375.00 per person. Certainly, a deal for a 5-day leadership camp!

Click on the "What We Do" tab on the homepage to find the application for RYLA 2023. Please download the five documents for the information and the link to the application.

The true strength of the RYLA program is that it's for students, by students. Every RYLA attendee can apply to be a Junior Counselor to help lead the next year's conference. After a successful year as a Junior Counselor, staff can progress in the program to serve in a Senior Counselor role. Beyond that, positions are open for Program Director, Facilities Director, Conference Director, Counselor Director, Conferee Liaison, Media Director, and more. Not only does the program teach leadership skills, it also allows students to grow into leadership positions and apply what they learned when they were a conferee.

Rotarians in northeastern PA have been supportive of RYLA. Thirty-five out of the 42 clubs in District 7410 have sent students to participate in the program over its history.



## You're Invited! First Ever Housewarming Shower for VIP

On Sunday, April 30th at 2pm, the Honesdale Rotary is hosting a first-time-ever housewarming shower for clients of the Victims Intervention Program (VIP) which offers professional and confidential help to victims of domestic abuse. Many of these victims often have to start new lives in new places as they recover from their trauma. They need basic items, such as bed linens and cutlery. The community is invited to bring housewarming gifts and donations to a fun event.

"We'll have games, raffle baskets, light fare and refreshments," says Alycia Schwartz, co-chair of the event, which will take place at Grace Episcopal Parish Hall, 827 Church Street. "This is a very worthy cause," added Schwartz, "Sometimes VIP clients escape abuse with no more than the shirts on their back. And, many of them have children who are also in need." VIP Executive Director Michele Minor Wolf is looking forward to the event. "We are very grateful for this opportunity, which has not been done before," said Wolf. "When victims of domestic violence or human trafficking come to our shelter, we give them a full set of new bedding, including sheets, pillows, towels and a comforter. When they exit the shelter, they can take these with them. We also give a few things to the children that they can call their.

"It's important to us that the people we shelter are treated with respect and dignity. A new set of bedding and towels and a stuffed animal provides some comfort in a very distressful time."

VIP started in 1988 as a non-profit crisis intervention service, but today provides so much more: legal assistance, shelter, advocacy, counseling and education. Emergency services are available 24 hours/day, 365 days/year. Call (570) 253-4401 or (570) 296-HELP.


## Purse Bingo Fundraiser for School Backpack Program


