10 Public Image Tips That Lead to More Members

1. Share impact regularly

2. Show people in action

Service photos and candid moments beat "check pics" every time.

3. Use plain language

Keep Rotary terms simple so newcomers instantly understand what you do.

4. Always include an invite

Add: "Guests welcome!" or "Message us to visit a meeting."

5. Host a casual open house

A "Rotary 101" coffee or meet-and-greet lowers the pressure to join.

6. Be visible in the community

Wear Rotary gear and bring a banner/table to local events.

7. Highlight member spotlights

Share why members joined and what Rotary means to them.

8. Partner and get tagged

Work with schools/nonprofits and ask them to tag your club online.

9. Keep your club page active

Update meeting info, post recent photos, and pin a "Visitors Welcome" post.

10. Follow up fast with guests

A quick thank-you and personal invite back makes a big difference.

Rotary Club of The Greater Poconos Deliver Real Community Impact



For the second year, Rotary Club of The Greater Poconos (RCGP) has partnered with Rotary Foundation of The Greater Poconos (RFGP) to provide **FREE Tax Preparation** services for veterans, disabled residents, and low-to-moderate-income families and **FREE Tax Counseling** services to elderly persons in Monroe and Pike Counties, PA.

Operating within IRS' Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) framework, the Rotary-GP VITA/TCE program uses trained and IRS certified volunteers to provide accurate and secure

tax prep services. This community service project helps residents obtain refunds, credits, and rebates they are entitled to while avoiding expensive tax preparation fees.

The impact is significant. During the prior tax filing season, Rotary-GP VITA/TCE volunteers prepared hundreds of tax returns and PA Property Tax/Rent Rebate applications that **generated more than \$375,000 in refunds and benefits** for seniors and disabled residents and working families in Monroe and Pike Counties.

Through the Rotary-GP VITA/TCE partnership model, RFGP provides the operational framework needed for Rotary Clubs to host a successful site, including volunteer training, back-office administration, secured laptops, supplies, and marketing materials. Rotary Clubs can host a site with as few as five volunteers, including one Rotarian, and operate one to three days per week during the tax filing season (late January through April 15).

The RFGP's program offers District 7410 Rotary Clubs a meaningful opportunity to add a **high-impact community service project** tailored to their community while delivering measurable economic benefits to residents who need financial assistance the most.

Rotary Clubs interested in establishing a Rotary-GP VITA/TCE service site in their community are encouraged to sign up now for the **2027 income tax filing season**. RFGP works with participating Clubs during the summer and fall months to recruit volunteers, complete IRS certification training, and prepare site logistics. Clubs may also choose to operate limited **off-season tax preparation events** to assist taxpayers who need help filing prior year returns or accessing available tax credits and rebate programs. Clubs interested in hosting a Rotary-GP VITA/TCE site can obtain additional info by sending a brief statement of interest to **President@Rotary-GP-org**.

UNITE FOR GOOD!

Rotary Club of The Greater Poconos and RFGP have also partnered to deploy 55 new laptop computers, **FREE OF CHARGE**, to PA based nonprofit organizations through a grant from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Digital Connectivity Technology Program, administered by the Pennsylvania Broadband Development Authority and funded via the American Rescue Plan Act Capital Projects Fund. These devices can be used to support community-serving activities that expand digital access, enable education, workforce development, telehealth access, financial literacy education, and youth leadership programs such as RYLA. District 7410 Rotary Clubs that need laptops to support a community service project or know of a nonprofit organization that could benefit from one or more devices should submit a request by email to **President@Rotary-GP-org**.



Hazleton Rotary Makes Donation

The Hazleton Rotary made a donation of Pet O2 Masks at their weekly meeting on Wednesday, March 11th at Booty's Café Italiano.

The club purchased 25 kits to be divided among the Hazleton City Fire Department and the Lehigh Valley Health Network Emergency Medical Services. Each kit contains three separate items. Items range from feline to canine-that means from a small cat to a large dog.

Pet oxygen masks and respirators are specialized devices designed to deliver supplemental oxygen to pets, especially during emergencies or when they are unable to breathe adequately on their own.

They are essential for pets rescued from fires, during transport, or in veterinary care to support recovery from illnesses or chronic conditions.

Oxygen therapy can significantly improve a pet's quality of life by enhancing oxygen delivery to tissues and organs, supporting respiratory function and reducing symptoms of hypoxia

"Many of our club members have pets and were more than happy to know this donation will help these two community organizations with emergencies and transportation issues when dealing with cats and dogs. We are always working to help the Greater Hazleton Community and its needs," observes Hazleton Rotary President Joan Buffington.
