Dear Fellow Rotarians,



August is Membership and club Extension month. Facing the reality of our membership situation is an essential first step in addressing the challenges our Rotary District is experiencing. Its commendable that we recognize the need to attract younger and more diverse members to ensure the long-term sustainability and relevance of Rotary. Here are some specific actions to help us grow and maintain Rotarians, especially from younger and diverse groups:

Conduct Membership Surveys: Gather data on the perceptions and needs of current and potential members. Identify the barriers to joining and staying in Rotary, as well as the factors that attract members to the organization.

Develop a Targeted Recruitment Strategy: Based on survey results, tailor your recruitment efforts to address the specific interests and concerns of younger and diverse groups. Highlight the benefits that are most appealing to them.

Create Rotaract Clubs: Sponsor or collaborate with Rotaract clubs, which are designed for young adults aged 18-30. Rotaract provides a stepping stone for potential Rotary members and offers them opportunities to lead and serve.

Utilize social media and Online Platforms: Leverage social media and other online platforms to promote Rotary's activities and values. Engage with younger audiences where they are most active.

Host Youth Programs: Organize events and programs that appeal to young people, such as youth leadership summits, mentorship programs, and career development workshops.

Emphasize Flexibility and Innovation: Make Rotary more attractive to younger professionals by offering flexible meeting schedules, virtual attendance options, and innovative service projects.

Focus on Diversity and Inclusion: Actively promote diversity within your Rotary clubs and district. Encourage clubs to be more inclusive and representative of the community they serve.

Redefine Traditional Meetings: Consider re-imagining traditional meeting formats to make them more appealing to a younger audience. Incorporate interactive elements, guest speakers, and discussions on current issues.

Showcase Impactful Projects: Highlight the meaningful projects Rotary has undertaken locally and globally. Demonstrating the organization's positive impact can resonate with potential members who want to make a difference.

# International Service

#### Pure Water for Ukraine

I am thrilled to report that Global Grant GG2345372 – "Pure water for Ukraine" has been formally approved by the Rotary Foundation and the initial payment has been issued by the Rotary Foundation to the Milano North Italy Rotary Club in the amount of \$100,188.17 USD.

This initial payment will allow the manufacturing process for the seven water filtration systems to begin in Italy. These filtration units will eventually be delivered to Ukraine so that several smaller municipalities can produce clean water for their populations. These filtration units are like those that were briefed to our District Conference in the fall of 2022, by the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club.

The Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club is just one of several Rotary Clubs and Districts that are collaborating in this Global Grant effort, including our own Rotary District 7410 and clubs in Hazelton, Wyalusing, Stroudsburg, Dallas, and New Milford. Additional Rotary Clubs and Districts in Italy, Ukraine, Germany, Scotland, Australia, Oklahoma, and Canada are collaborating in this effort.

In total this Global Grant involves approximately \$183,000 U.S. dollars to fully manufacture and deliver approximately seven water filtration units like those pictured in this article. District 7410 and the five participating clubs contributed \$28,100 toward this effort.

I am very proud of our Districts role in this effort. Soon our District and its clubs will have another opportunity to participate in a Global Disaster Grant effort. Stay tuned.

## VILLAGE SERIES

HIGH RELIABILITY SYSTEMS FOR MEDIUM-LOW FLOWRATE BRACKISH WATER PURIFICATION AND DESALINATION.

The VILLAGE® Series is a family of units that employ the most recent Reverse Osmosis technologies to produce low-salinity water from well or other brackish water source. These units are designed for small and medium-low productions. The units may be installed locally or truck-loaded to provide drinking water (<200ppm) to communities. They can also be optionally tuned for use in industrial applications to deliver low-salinity water. Low power is required while offering high reliability and the advantage of their easy use by non-specialized operators.

#### Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club

In December 2022, our District leadership approved a protocol for clubs and individuals to donate funds directly to our District Treasurer function for international wire transfer to the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club. This effort continues to support steady state requirements to continue providing long term relief to Ukrainian refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs).

To date we have now realized \$13,720 in contributions (including from non-Rotarians) to send to the Warsaw City Poland RC to support this steady state requirement. Since the last update in June 2023, my own New Milford Area Rotary recently sent \$2,920 in donations from a variety of sources to our District Treasurer for this effort.

Bluntly, more is needed. See your club leadership and consider donating to this initiative as soon as possible.

#### Rotary Peace Fellowship Foundation

The Rotary Foundation's Peace Fellowship provides fully funded Master's Degree or Professional Cert in peace and conflict resolution to eligible candidates to study at Rotary Peace Centers around the warm our District's Rotary Peace Fellowship Subcommittee Chair and have been educating our Rotarians on this awesome program for the past three years in the hope of finding a candidate in our area. While that has not happened ... yet ... this year I did take training to be able to interview prospective candidates whose eligibility has been approved by the Rotary Foundation.

On June 23 I had the honor and pleasure of conducting an interview of a woman from Ethiopia, Tibeb Abate Asfaw. Sitting in on the interview was Mary Ellen Bentler, District RF Chair, Lyle Harding, Towanda Rotary and Subcommittee member as well as Michael Little, Richmond Rotary whose club sponsored Tibeb. Tibeb applied for the Master's Degree program at the Rotary Peace Center at Duke University and the University of NC. Reading her application prior to the interview I immediately recognized that she was a special person who would make a great Rotary Peace Fellow. Through the interview we learned that she has worked for the United States Aid for International Development (USAID) for the past 16 years in various roles to provide humanitarian aid to people in Ethiopia suffering from disease, drought, famine, floods, conflict, just to name a few. Without knowing anything about Rotary, she has been living our moto of Service above Self. In addition, the work she has been doing represents many of Rotary's Areas of Focus. But she wants to accomplish so much more than she has already. She stated that every 5 years her country announces an "initiative" to help their people but at the end of 5 years not only has nothing changed but conditions are worse. Her idea is to change the way Ethiopia does this by going to the communities to find out what they need, want, and can sustain. Now, doesn't that sound familiar – it is exactly what our Rotary Foundation requires of our projects. She's hopeful that she will be able to use the knowledge she gains at the Rotary Peace Center to help not only her own country but others around the world.

It goes without saying that our District wholeheartedly endorsed Tibeb in her desire to become a Rotary Peace Fellow and we wish her all the best. She has agreed to keep in touch with me so we all can follow her progress and maybe she can bring some peace to Ethiopia and to our world in general.

I will be in touch with all of you after the first of 2024 to start the search for candidates. It is my hope that together we will be able to find a qualified candidate in or around our District. Meanwhile, keep on the look out for people you may think would make a good Rotary Peace Fellow.

#### Congressman Matt Cartwright


