Hello Friends,

Our efforts to obtain the two (2) used ambulances from Pennsylvania Ambulance in Scranton are continuing, though delayed by supply chain challenges that we expect to have cleared-up shortly. Parts for the new ambulances, that will replace the two (2) ambulances which will be donated, are held somewhere along the production line.

In the meantime, District 7410's International Service Committee is busy organizing "Rotary Stands Up for Ukraine", a luncheon fundraiser scheduled for Sunday, September 29th from 2PM to 4PM at St. Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church, 430 N. 7th Avenue in Scranton (see flyer for further details).

This is truly an international service project. The District's International Service Committee is teaming-up with the Rotary Club of Heerlen in the Netherlands and the Scranton Rotary Club to support humanitarian relief efforts in Ukraine. In addition to shipping the ambulances over to Ukraine, our fundraising efforts are also to support the purchase of medical supplies that are in high demand, such as the HyFin Chest Seals that are saving thousands of lives on the battlefields (pictured below).

We have already received commitments of funds donated by the Rotary Club of Heerlen as well as private benefactors - including one for a matching grant of \$25,000.00 from an anonymous source!

Current estimates for shipment of the ambulances vary depending on the manner of shipment- air or maritime but tend to fall in the \$2-4 thousand dollar range each. At that price range, one can imagine we could also include a sizable amount of medical and humanitarian supplies.

So, I am encouraging all, including our Rotary District 7410 International Service Committee members to advocate for monetary donations from their communities and clubs.

Donations can be sent to the address for the church noted on the attached flyer. Make the checks out to the Saint Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church and place "September 29th Fundraiser" in the memo section.

International Service Committe

ROTARY DISTRICT 7410 INTERNATIONAL SERVICE INITIATIVES

One of the missions of the Rotary District 7410 International Service Committee (ISC) as well as all Rotary ISC is to publicize international service initiatives. Indeed, our Rotary District and many of its Clubs are busy in the international arena. This report is intended to publicize many of those to the District members.

MUSHROOM FARMING FOR NEPAL

The original project to develop thirty new mushroom farmers growing either Oyster or Button mushrooms was initiated by our District with a Global Grant number 2128532. Our District 7410 partnered with District 3292, host club, Maharanjgunj of Kathmandu, Nepal. Other Rotary partners in this effort included Kavre Valleu Club in District 3292, Districts 7255 and 7210 in New York, and the Chesterville Rotary of District 7040 in Ontario Canada. The participating clubs of District 7410 included: Hawley Club, Abingtons Club, Scranton Club, Wyalusing Club, Tunkhannock Club, New Milford Club, Pittston Club, Jim Thorpe Club, Wellsboro Club, Mountaintop Club, Hamlin Lake Arial Club, and North Pocono Club. "The project is almost complete now. Some residual funds were approved for use for a dryer so the farmers can dry mushrooms for the 'dried mushroom' market that will extend their profitability and reduce loss through spoilage. The thirty farmers have been highly successful with crops beyond expectations that are saturating the local fresh market. So, the dried market will be the next place to go."

FARM TRACTOR FOR HAITI

"Despite the difficulties in Haiti, the Tunkhannock club has been a major supporter of a tractor purchase in northern Haiti thru Mango Farm. The new John Deere tractor was purchased and delivered last year and currently is plowing fields for fellow farmers near Cap Haitien to enable them to plant and grow more crops. It is a big game changer for the farmers around Lagosette."

MICROSCOPES FOR NIGERIA

"This global grant will supply much needed functional microscopes to the identified health centers, to aid effective and prompt diagnosis of malaria in patients. The microscopes are easy to use, run on batteries, and are easy to transport to villages." Interestingly this Global Grant was influenced by a proof-of-concept activity by conferees at our District RYLA in 2023. Our District is collaborating on this on-going effort with the Rotary Club of Port Harcourt Airport and five other Rotary Districts.

WARSAW CITY POLAND ROTARY ASSISTANCE FOR UKRAINE

This club to club effort began in December 2022 and continues in a steady state to support activities of the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club in providing humanitarian assistance for Ukrainian refugees in Poland and displaced persons in Ukraine proper. To date inidivudal Rotararians and non Rotarians in District 7410 have donated over \$15,000 to this effort through a funds transfer protocol established by the District and Treasurer.

Since the beginning of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the Medical University of Warsaw (MUW) has been training Ukrainian medics. MUW has organized a training center at the emergency medical station in Ivano-Frankivsk, and equipped it with, among other, phantoms and disposable equipment, the purchase of which was made possible by the support of private sponsors. Specialists from the Department of Emergency Medical Sciences trained more than 1,000 Ukrainian doctors and feldshers in providing medical assistance

In Ukraine itself, the effort is focused on humanitarian aid provided to kindergartens in Ukraine in the city of Kryvyi Rih. "Thirty-four Kindergartens and nine children support centers have been provided with children's bedding sets, clothes, socks, toys, towels and oil filled radiators for heat."

The most recent initiative will start new sessions of integrating and oriented professional help for Ukrainian refugee women in Poland, many of which are now single parents.

GLOBAL GRANTS FOR UKRAINE

Rotary District 7410 has participated in two Rotary Global Grants for Ukraine since the start of the conflict in Ukraine in February 2022. The first was a Rotary Disaster Response Grant in collaboration with a number of other Rotary Districts and clubs, including those in Kyiv, Ukraine. This global grant provided aid for the sustainment of numerous hospitals, shelters, and other emergency facilities. The second global grant is providing "Pure Water for Ukraine. Seven industrial size municipal water filtration systems have been built and recently arrived at their destination in Zaporizhzhia Oblast Ukraine, following a year plus long manufacturing effort. Rotary District 7410 is a major player in this effort, along with numerous other Rotary Districts and Clubs. These include Rotarians in Italy, Germany, Poland, Ukraine, Canada, United Kingdom, and the United States. Five Rotary Clubs in our District contributed funds to this effort. They are Hazelton, Stroudsburg, Wyalusing, Dallas, and the New Milford Area. Quoting the Italian Club lead point of contact- "Just got confirmation that the equipment is have left Milano this morning; first destination Lublin in Poland, then forwarded from there to Ukraine. Pictures of the truck with the eight crates leaving is enclosed. The USA contribution to the project has been very significant!"

MEDICAL SUPPLIES FOR UKRAINE

The Scranton Rotary has been collaborating with Saint Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church (UCC) in Scranton since the beginning of the conflict in Ukraine. Through various fund- raising events, such as sailboat races, the club has monetarily supported with thousands pf dollars, the regular shipment of humanitarian and medical supplies to Ukraine. The current activity is planning for a fund- raising dinner on September 29, 2024, at UCC to raise funds for the purchase and shipment of such supplies, including two used ambulances. The ambulances will be donated by the Pennsylvania Ambulance Company here in Northeastern Pennsylvania and or via collaboration to purchase used ambulances in Europe with the Heerlen Rotary Club in The Netherlands. The goal for this dinner is to raise \$50,000, half of which has already been obtained with a matching grant of \$25,000 by an anonymous donor. More information on this effort is in this District Newsletter and ClubRunner.

The Shavertown Fire Department is an all-volunteer fire house and it also lends support and back up to many fire departments in our surrounding area.

Operation Pollination

This year, our Rotary Club proudly participated in Operation Pollination. Operation Pollination is an international collaborative effort that emphasizes the importance of restoring and maintaining pollinator habitats on both public and private lands.

Through collaboration and outreach, Operation Pollination is developing an interconnected mosaic of pollinator habitats. These efforts are crucial to stabilizing and increasing the populations of vital pollinator species.

Here's how they're making a difference:

- Increasing and improving pollinator habitats on public and private lands.
- Developing strategic public-private partnerships to create and improve these habitats while providing educational opportunities.
- Encouraging voluntary, collaborative, and locally-led conservation efforts to maintain and enhance working landscapes.

One of our key initiatives was the Library Preschool Program. Children aged 3 to 5 engaged in weekly read-aloud sessions and STEAM activities, learning about Monarch butterflies. Each child received materials to build their own pollinator garden at home.

JIM THORPE ROTARY CLUB CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF SERVICE

The Jim Thorpe Club celebrated its 100 years at a dinner held on June 20th at Café Arielle in Jim Thorpe. The Jim Thorpe Rotary Club was officially chartered by Rotary International on May 15, 1924. Rotary President, April Brugan, emceed the event, and the primary speaker was attorney Anthony Roberti, a long-time member of the Club who reviewed his decade's long membership.

During the past decades, the Club has financed and overseen the construction of a gazebo at the Josiah White Park in downtown Jim Thorpe, provided an eight week Summer Program for children for 28 years, operated historical "ghost walks" as a fund raiser, sponsored international study and school exchanges, and provided high school students with college scholarships and Rotary Leadership Camp experience. The club has supported local, national and international causes, including contributing to the eradication of polio.

The club regularly supplies financial support for 25 local charities and organizations. Recently, the club played an important role in the opening of a Jim Thorpe Preschool and Child Care Center at the St. Joseph's Regional Academy by the Lehigh Valley Children's Center. The catalyst behind the child care project were the Rotary members. The club conducted a community needs assessment to establish the need for quality and affordable preschool and child care for working families. The result was many people wanted to work but could not find a quality, safe and affordable place for their children. The fall of 2024, it came to fruition with the opening of the St. Josephs Regional Academy. Rotary members along with the Interact Club located in the Carbon Career and Technical School continue to be engaged in the project. Currently, the Jim Thorpe Rotary Club is looking for ways to support a local homeless shelter for families and single women. Two of our members are on the Carbon County Homeless Task Force.

Patrick Ward, Assistant District Governor and Tim Genetti, District Governor Nominee for 7410 attended the celebration. Citations were presented by a representative of Congressman Susan Wild, state Representative Doyle Heffley and County Commissioner Michael Sofranko. The Jim Thorpe Rotary has 29 members and meets virtually the first Tuesday and the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays at noon for lunch at the Jim Thorpe School District. Membership is open to all individuals regardless of sex, race, or creed. More information is available at "jimthorperotary.org." At the conclusion of the celebration, Attorney Roberti was presented a plaque commemorating his 50 years of service to Rotary.


