Even though most of the Greater Hazleton Area children are not able to attend school now, Donna Barna, Hazleton Rotary President, was bound and determined that those in need would receive these winter garments.

"The pandemic doesn't change the fact that we still have area youngsters who need warm coats" says Barna. "So, we had to improvise, but I'm happy to say we were able to complete the project this week."

Working with local retailers, primarily Boscov's, brand new coats were purchased for children in need from all elementary/middle schools in the Hazleton Area School District.

Social distancing did not permit the usual grouping of Rotarians to sort and pack the coats, but Donna and her mother, Ethel Dougherty, did that part of the preparation and the following Rotarians, taking Santa's place,

delivered the coats to local schools: Stephen Seach, Kim McNulty, Lani Drobnock, Mary Malone, Tim Genetti and Dave Haupt & Wife Mary Ann.

Because of the economy, the number of children needing warm coats continues annually. Last year, Hazleton Rotary provided over 400 coats for area children, and this winter season more than 400 coats will be given to keep area children warm.

District Designated Grant for PPE for Ambulances

In May 2020 in the spirit of the Rotary motto "Service Above Self", Tunkhannock Rotary applied for a \$5,000 District Grant from the Rotary Foundation to be matched by \$5,000 from the Club to buy personal protection equipment (PPE)/foggers for the 8 non-profit ambulance associations serving Wyoming County, represented by the Wyoming County



EMS Consortium. The Club was notified in July that the grant was funded. The Club's matching \$5,000 was funded from the proceeds of the Oct 2019 Harvest & Wine Festival.

Rotarian Mike Markovitz, President and Chief of Tunkhannock Community Ambulance Association (TCAA) was invited to give a presentation at a Rotary luncheon on the impact of Covid-19 on the protocols and staff of the ambulance organizations.

Rotary Secretary, Carol Ziomek, was so impressed by the needs of the ambulance associations to keep patients and staff safe, that she asked the Wyoming County Community Health Foundation (WCCHF) Board, of which she is also Secretary, to consider a special grant for the bulk purchase of PPE for the EMS Consortium. The WCCHF identifies, selects and invests in programs and organizations that will improve the health and wellness of people in Wyoming County, PA and surrounding communities.

At a Special WCCHF Board Zoom meeting, Mike Markovitz gave his presentation. The Board unanimously approved a grant for \$10,000 for the Wyoming County EMS Consortium to match Rotary's grant.

On Sept 15, Tunkhannock Rotary President Terri Detrick and WCCHF Executive Director Shealynn Shave each presented a check for \$10,000 to the Wyoming County EMS Consortium for the purchase of personal protection equipment (PPE) for the 8 ambulance companies in the Consortium.

The Wyoming County EMS Consortium consists of:
Tunkhannock Community Ambulance Association - Tunkhannock, PA
Meshoppen Ambulance – Meshoppen, PA
Mehoopany Ambulance – Mehoopany, PA
Factoryville Ambulance – Factoryville, PA
Lake Winola Ambulance – Lake Winola and Falls, PA
Noxen Ambulance – Noxen, PA
Kunkle Ambulance – Kunkle / Monroe Twp, PA

Although the Consortium ordered their \$20,000 worth of personal protection equipment (PPE) several months ago, the orders took a long time to arrive with supply shortages and shipping delays due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Franklin Northmoreland Ambulance – Franklin Twp, PA

After a long wait, it now appears that Santa's sleigh arrived a little early bring their PPE order before Christmas. It is hoped that these supplies will help keep our emergency services personnel safe and healthy during the holiday COVID-19 surge.

Howard remarked that for the first time in his 30 years of service, this is the most need (due to the COVID pandemic) that he has ever seen with people struggling to make ends meet and put food on their tables. 

2019-2020 Outbound Exchange Student Jenny Huang

Jenny Huang was Tunkhannock's 2019-2020 outbound

exchange student to Bolivia. She spoke via Zoom at the Dec 10 Tunkhannock Rotary Meeting about her experiences during her exchange. Jenny's exchange was to Santa Cruz de La Seirra, Bolivia to Rotary District 4690. She went to a private School - Colegio de San Lorenzo Class of 2020. There were about 100 kids in her grade.

Although her time was shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic, she had the opportunity to sample some of the native Bolivian cuisine including sonso de yuca, empanadas, llama meat and some exotic fruits.



Their first orientation was in Santa Cruz on Sept 21. They toured the city, the cathedral and learned to take public transportation. They played games including a sack race and learned to fold empanadas.

Every year each grade at her school has a dance competition with the other grades. Her grade's theme was Baywatch.

Their first Rotary trip (Oct 4-8) was to Fuerto de Samaipata, Laguna Volcan and Amboro National Park with the other exchange students.

Jenny went to her 2nd host family after New Year's. They took her to Camacho Velarde park and Santiago just before the quarantine.

She got the opportunity to go to Lomas de Arena, 35 min outside Santa Cruz, which is a desert area with a lagoon where they could swim.

At the end of Jan, they went to the bigger cities in Bolivia. First stop was in Tarija known for its vineyards, then Sucre where they visited the Plaza and a chocolate factory (small town) and where they saw farms with alpacas and llamas.

Then visited Potosi and the mines there. They also went to the Salar de Uyuni (Salt Flats), the largest in Bolivia. They went to the Salt Hotel where they had dinner, which included llama meat and soup.

Then onto La Paz to ride the world's highest cable cars in the world.

They also visited Lake Titicaca and did a boat ride on the Lake and hiked a mountain.

Then their last stop was in Cochabamba where they hiked to a viewing area where you could see the entire city below. The exchange students then signed each other's flags and shirts.

She also traveled with her host families and the other exchange students to various historic/scenic sites in Bolivia, but due to the pandemic they were not able to go to Machu Pichu.

Although she was due to return to the US in June, she needed to leave early due to the pandemic. However, she was unable to get an earlier regular flight home, but the US Embassy arranged for her to catch a flight in April. Jenny was the last of our Rotary District's exchange students to return to the US and everyone was very relieved when she returned.

Each club may only submit one essay from each high school in its service area. It will be up to your club to judge your local entries, and to determine if there will be a local prize. Many clubs invite the winner and his or her family to a Rotary meeting to read their essay and be recognized. It is also up to club membership to determine if a local winner should receive a monetary award.

A local (club) deadline of January 29 is suggested. Given the current pandemic, schools are following diverse models for instruction. One constant, is that no outside personnel are allowed in school buildings. If you have made consistent contact with a teacher, school counselor, or administrator, I would recommend contacting that individual as soon as possible to request their participation.

The theme for this year's essay is derived from our Rotary International President, and one of Rotary's main causes: "How can you personally take the opportunity to protect the environment?" All additional information and details for the contest may be found on ClubRunner under Youth/Essay. Please ascertain if the Student Guidelines and poster may be delivered to the school, or if they should be emailed.

Entries from clubs must be received by the District Chair on or before February 26.
