#### A Message from the District Governor

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

When we go to our schools and give out Dictionaries to the 3rd graders we tell them that the book is theirs to keep forever. The big blue and brown eyes turn bright with excitement when they realize that the book is theirs and no one else's. We all have our own way to explain how the dictionaries work and we all have the same goal to educate and give them a bigger horizon in this world. This is literacy in action.

Most of you know that English is my second language. I would like to relate my experiences with learning English. In those days we didn't have the websites or internet for help. The school system was wonderful and provided special teachers and programs for people with language difficulties. They helped me to learn to read and to speak English. We read first grade books and worked our way up grade by grade. It took over a year when I stared speaking and reading at the level of my fellow my class-mates. When I left the country and returned to my native country I went to school in Poland. I had to start over learning the Polish and they did not provide the support I was given in the United States school systems. It was harder in Poland than in our school systems. Their expectations were low and they really didn't care.

It was a few years later that I returned to this country by myself and lived with my Mother's cousin. I knew English but my vocabulary needed work and my family gave me help by learning words over the dinner table. Every day I needed to pronounce a new word, spell it and use it in a sentence. That method worked very well.

It doesn't matter what country you lived in as a youth, our books and education was very important to all. When you give out the Dictionaries to 3rd graders or reading books to pre-school or kindergarten students; anything that we can do to help the library or our schools and support our young people we will be making a difference in the world. When we teach one person we make a difference. Engage Rotary, change the literacy of the world.

The Rotary Foundation is now accepting applications for the world-competitive Rotary Peace Fellowship. The fellowship provides academic and practical training to prepare scholars for leadership roles in solving conflicts around the world. Up to 110 fellows are selected every year in a globally competitive process based on personal, academic, and professional achievements. Fellows earn a master's-level degree or a professional development certificate in peace and conflict studies at one of six Rotary Peace Centers at leading universities in Australia, England, Sweden, Japan, the United States and Thailand.

#### **Master's Degree Option**

- "Building the leaders of tomorrow"
- 15-24 months of Rotary-funded graduate study toward a master's degree at one of our five Rotary Centers
- Training in the root causes of conflict, theories of international relations, and effective models of cooperation, conflict resolution, and negotiation including course work and applied field experience
- A growing network of committed alumni employed around the world in diplomacy, government, non-governmental organizations and private corporations.

#### **Professional Certificate Option**

- "Strengthening the leaders of today"

#### Georgian Book Drive Forest City Area Rotary Club – District Grant

The Forest City Area Rotary Club has submitted a grant application to perform a book drive and donate American/English literature to a remote public school in the Republic of Georgia. A local resident of Forest City, Merissa Daugherty, a member of the Peace Corp, teaches English as a Second Language to the Georgians. In Georgia, American/English literature is difficult to come by, our grant was to supply enough books to help the class and school. The club performed a book drive by issuing containers to local businesses, the Forest City News and Elegente's Restaurant, and with this drive we collected well over 400 books. In addition, to the literature, the club donated basketballs, kick balls, soccer balls, a football, jump rope, air pump and needles, basketball nets, a picture frame of the club, the project information, and the 2013-2014 Rotary Theme, and a web cam to use in the classroom. We also sent our Banner Flag and copy of the local newspaper and history volume of Forest City, PA. After collecting and organizing the books, our club sent 3 75lb boxes via UPS to Tilbsi, the capital city. Unfortunately, UPS does not deliver to the school, so local arrangements had to be made to transport the books. We shipped the books on December 4<sup>th</sup>, and the packages arrived in the classroom January 27<sup>th</sup>. The students and faculty enjoyed opening the boxes and looking at all of the books. The school also appreciated the sports balls and equipment, which was in desire need. The students and faculty were so happy and excited to have an American Football in the Republic of Georgia. This project helped equip a classroom with materials that will see many years of use, as teachers teach English as a Second Language to their students. Below is am e-mail from Merissa Daugherty:

I got to school this morning and everyone was telling me about how big the boxes are and asking me what's in them. They arrived yesterday afternoon after school let out, so we opened them up this morning. I can't believe how many books there are! We didn't have enough room on our bookshelves for all of them, but the carpenter in town is going to make us 2 or 3 more. Everyone was so excited and couldn't stop saying "Thank you." My fourth grade class was in the room when we opened one of the boxes, so I gave them all a book to look at. I've never seen kids so excited about books! Even the larger, more advanced books that they couldn't understand, they just sat there looking through the pictures; now I know what to do to keep them quiet for a while. All day boys were running into the room, interrupting class, to see the "American football." When I gave the gym teachers the balls, nets and jump ropes they too were very excited to see an American football.



Thanks for sending the picture of the Rotary club, the banners and the historical book of Forest City. We're going to hang the picture and banner on the wall next week. It was really nice to show my counterparts and students some pictures of Forest City.

I don't know how to thank all of you for doing this for us. Today was so exciting and a great way to start my last semester here. We all appreciate everything that you, the other members of the Rotary club and everyone who donated books has done. I know that it was a frustrating process dealing with customs and Peace Corps, so thank you so much for your patience and willingness to tackle this project.

I will send pictures when I get to a better internet connection, hopefully this weekend.



#### Stroudsburg Rotary sends two Shelter boxes to the Phillipines with the help of our community and club.

Members of the Rotary Club of the Stroudsburgs recently donated more than \$1,000 to people in the Philippines whose lives were shattered by Typhoon Haiyan, which the club then matched in order to purchase and send two Shelter Boxes for humanitarian disaster relief. Each box costs \$1,000.

The local Rotary clubs join a worldwide Rotarian effort after the typhoon, one of the strongest storms in history, brought overwhelming destruction to coastal Philippine towns, killing more than 5,200 people and leaving millions of people without shelter, food and other basic necessities.

Soon after the storm, Rotary clubs began rushing relief aid and funds into devastated communities. ShelterBox Response Team members have distributed nearly 600 ShelterBox tents throughout five typhoon-struck islands, benefiting more than 4,000 families.

The key component of the shelter boxes is a disaster relief tent that is designed to withstand extreme temperatures and provide privacy for an extended family. Other shelter box items include a tool kit, thermal blankets, insulated ground sheets, stove, pans, utensils, bowls, mugs and water storage containers. Life-saving water purification equipment can provide up to three years worth of clean and safe water for a typical family. A small kit of crayons, drawing books and other supplies provides pleasant distractions for young disaster victims.

Shelter box contents vary according to the nature and location of the disaster. The cost of the box covers all of the contents, packing, storage and distribution to people in need throughout the world.





#### Kettle Collection \$10,186.00

The generosity of the people of Northeastern Pennsylvania cannot be doubted. In our recent campaign to collect money for the Salvation Army, you found Rotarians standing outside of the Wine and Spirit Store on Northern Boulevard in Chinchilla in all kinds of winter weather and you dropped in \$10,186.00!! The Salvation Army embraces the homeless, uplifts the abused and abandoned, mentors the disadvantaged, and assists the displaced and elderly. Our collection remains in Northeastern Pennsylvania to help the Salvation Army to accomplish those goals. YOU responded to our kettle appeal. YOU made it happen. Thank YOU.

#### The Shelter Box



Three months ago, on a Thursday evening, November 7, 2013, the largest tropical cyclone ever recorded, struck the central Philippines and changed the lives of 25 million people. This Category 5 storm, called Super Typhoon Hiayan, produced winds clocked at 147 miles per hour. More than 6000 people died. Nearly 2000 remain missing. The homes of millions of people were destroyed

or washed away.

Although we live a world away from the Philippines, the appeal for help came to the Rotary Club of the Abingtons from Rotary Clubs in the Philippines. We responded. Individual Rotarians contributed a sum of \$1000. This money was matched by our club with another \$1000. The money was used to provide emergency shelter and warmth in the form of a ShelterBox, to help Philippine families made homeless by the typhoon.

Each ShelterBox contains a tent designed to withstand extreme weather conditions, a water purification kit, blankets, tools, cooking utensils, a stove, children's activity book and

other necessities to help a family survive after a disaster. ShelterBox Response Teams distribute boxon the ground working closely with local organizations and Rotary clubs worldwide.

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
