Hello fellow District 7410 Rotarians. Now that we are into February, I hope you all made it through the cold of January. Spring hopefully is not too far away. This is written before Ground Hog Day so I do not know whether we will have or not have another 6 weeks of winter, and I am not going to predict.

Besides Ground Hog Day, President's Day, Super Bowl Sunday, and Valentine's Day. February 23rd is the 120th anniversary of Rotary.

It was on that day in Chicago in 1905 that Paul Harris held the first Rotary Club meeting with three other colleagues, a special anniversary for Rotary International. We know Paul Harris was an attorney, Gustavus Loehr was a mining engineer, Sylvester Schiele, a coal dealer, and Hiram E. Shorey was a tailor. By October, the Club had grown to 21 members and look where we are today.

February is the month of Peace Building and Conflict Prevention in our Rotary Calendar and is one of our Areas of Focus. Today millions of people are displaced because of conflict, violence, persecution, and human rights violations. Half of them are children. Rotary creates environments of peace throughout the world. We have 7 Peace centers around the world with the eighth to open this month at Bahcesehir University in Istanbul Türkiye, which will host the Rotary Presidential Peace Conference February 20-22nd.

Each year Rotary awards, up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers. Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers' program develops the capacity of peace, and develops professionals to become effective catalysts for peace. The other Peace Centers are Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Duke University/UNC in NC, University of Bradford in England, International Christian University in Tokyo, University of Queensland in Australia, Makerere University in Uganda, and Uppsala University in Sweden.

As a humanitarian organization, peace is a cornerstone of our mission. We believe when people work to create peace in their communities, that change can have a global effect. Our service projects and peace fellows address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of education and healthcare, and unequal distribution of resources.

If you want to do a local peace project, consider putting a peace pole in your community. A Peace Pole is a monument that displays the message May Peace Prevail On Earth in the language of the country where it is placed. It usually displays 3 to 7 additional languages meaningful to the host site. The message is referred to as an affirmation of peace and its placement furthers Rotary's goal of building a culture of peace throughout the world. To learn more here is the link:

# District Essay Contest



December 11, 2024

Dear Club Presidents, Secretaries, and Youth Activities Coordinators

The time for the Rotary District 7410 District Essay Contest for 2024-2025 is upon us. The contest is open to students who are high school juniors or seniors. The goal of the contest is to gain visibility for Rotary in your community, and to foster student creativity and positive outlook.

The district winner will receive \$1,000.00. There will be a second place prize of \$500.00 and a third place prize of \$250.00. Each club may only submit one essay from each high school in its service area. It will be up to your club to judge your local entries, and to determine if there will be a local prize. Many clubs invite the local winner and his or her family to a Rotary meeting to read their essay and be recognized. It is also up to club membership to determine if a local winner should receive a monetary award.

A club deadline of February 7th, 2025 suggested. This year's theme is Rotary's Four Way Test, which guides all Rotary projects, including these questions:

-Is it fair to all concerned?

-It asks, "that we use empathy to see other points of view, in the context of problems to be solved."

**-How can we use teamwork, inclusion, empathy, acceptance, belonging, and accountability to solve problems or achieve the goals we set?**

The length of the essay should be 1,000 words. In addition, student names must only appear on a title page. Essays must be completed and saved as a PDF. Google Docs cannot be used for this contest.

If your club has made consistent contact with a teacher, school counselor, or administrator, I would recommend contacting that individual as soon as possible to request their participation. Essays may be submitted by the club chair as an attachment to my personal email, but only with Essay/Club name/Club Chair name/Student name in the subject line. Essays may not be embedded in the email.

**Entries must be received by me on or before March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2025.**

Please ascertain if the Student Guidelines and poster may be delivered to the school, or if they should be emailed. Those materials will be updated on the district website.

# Global Grant Opportunity

I recently received communication from Bob Pruitt of the Cupertino, California Rotary. He and his colleague, Marcia Elmer are seeking support for two projects “that have the potential to transform lives in Ecuador.”

- Marcia’s project is to fund a mobile operating room truck that travels throughout the rural areas of Ecuador providing surgery for people in need. This mobile operating room truck has helped almost 10,000 Ecuadorians over the last 30 years. The equipment in the mobile surgery truck is now at the end of its useful life and needs to be updated. This project speaks to Marcia as she appreciates the difference that life-saving surgeries can make in remote areas.
- Bob’s project champions providing equipment for a medical nonprofit in Cuenca, Ecuador that works with a local hospital) to provide end of life hospice care for patients in need. Hospice care in Ecuador is in its infancy and this project will provide assistance to 1200 patients and 4000 families in the first five years. This project is very near and dear to my heart. Recently we lost my brother-in-law to a long fight with cancer. This project helps those facing this difficult time to spend the end of their days in dignity.

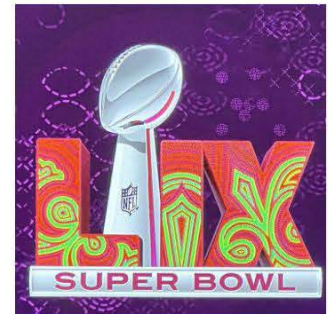
