



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

THE ROTARY CLUB OF HAZLETON

The Rotary Club of Hazleton provided a Distracted Driving Simulator experience for seniors at The Hazleton Area Career Center on Thursday, February 12. (Unfortunately, due to a weather related school cancelation on the 9th, the event did not take place at Hazleton Area High School, as planned). This annual Rotary service project was started in 2007 as a pre-Prom event to discourage students from drinking and driving which so often leads to tragedy. The new experience also involved discouraging other distractions, such as texting while driving.

"The simulator was different this year than in the past because we had five simulators instead of the previous one which means more students were able to have the opportunity for a "hands on" experience". explains Rotary Club Project Chair Jason Brenner. "The simulator not only had the ability to induce intoxication effects into the user's driving but also in the cars that are driving around that driver. It forces the student driver to not only worry about how they are driving on the road, but also to be careful and aware of how other motorists are driving. It also tackled the problem of texting while driving which has become a big safety issue for teen drivers."

DEAD END DON'T HOME AND DON'T HOME A

Hazleton Area Career Center students take part in the Distracted Driving Simulator experience sponsored by the Hazleton Rotary Club on February 12th.

"We are very thankful to Lehigh Valley Health Network and Bill McQuilken, Trauma Prevention Coordinator, who provided the five simulators, free

of charge", comments Rotary President Tim Genetti. "We also appreciate the assistance provided to us from Terry Babsak, Hazleton Area School District and Mary Ann Feno, Pathways to Recovery, a Hazleton substance abuse treatment and education center.

Mr. McQuilken said he has seen many of these simulators over the years, but most companies charged for them and his goal was to find a way to do the same thing for free. He found it when he came across Virtual Driver Interactive and together they customized a program that is free and allows for more student participation.

"It took a lot of work and the cooperation of some great people" McQuilken says. "We're really proud of the way it turned out."

Using the simulator, you can drive distracted, such as attempting to text while driving or simulate driving under the influence of alcohol. Along the way you might run a stop sign or commit some other traffic violations. etc.

"Some people think we control the program, but that's not the case," McQuilken says. "It all depends on how you drive.

The simulator is an educational tool that can help shape a safe future for teenagers. Traditionally the only way for new drivers to gain experience was to practice in the family car with a parent, or to incur the cost of a driver's education instructor. This often leaves new drivers with limited time behind the wheel and feeling uncertain about their driving skills. The five simulators have a computer, a mounted steering wheel and some floor pedals and provides a realistic, hands-on experience in a safe environment. Training also helps individuals gain confidence in their ability as a driver and helps them develop an appreciation for safety.

Students rotated through the simulators and while they waited their turn, they had the opportunity to walk-through and ask questions about, a display set up by the local Pathways to Recovery program.

The focus of the Rotary Club of Hazleton was to let students feel, first-hand, how alcohol impairs their ability to steer and brake and how texting while driving can put a driver into a very dangerous situation.

The lessons in safe driving and the effects of impairment learned by a teen's experience with the simulator should have a positive impact upon the student's future decisions and help prevent risky behaviors and hopefully save lives.

A driver's license was not required to be able to participate and adult supervision, provided by Hazleton Rotary Club members was present at all times.



THE ROTARY CLUB OF WEST END

West End Rotary has gone high-tech to keep children of the Poconos snug this winter. In a campaign called Operation Warm, Rotary has given 150 winter coats to the Pleasant Valley Ecumenical Network for distribution to families in need. That's nothing new for a club that donates thousands of dollars each year to ambulance corps, fire companies and other charitable organizations. What is new is the way in which West End Rotary raised the money.

Each year the club holds several fundraiser and designates the proceeds for a specific cause. Last year's Oktoberfest and Car Show in Gilbert would have raised thousands of dollars for Operation Warm, a program that provides new winter coats to children in need in an effort to boost school attendance and self-esteem.

"But despite our best fundraising efforts, it snowed on the day of our car show and we were not able to meet this community need without help," said Karin Susan Breitlauch, the West End Rotarian who spearheaded the project. A veterinarian who with her husband, computer specialist Ed Gallagher, uses advanced technology in her practice, Breitlauch decided to rely on the high-tech version of the kindness of strangers: she crowdsourced the fundraising.

Innovative funding - With a goal of purchasing at least a hundred coats for the ecumenical network, Breitlauch established a page for the project on GoFundMe, a San Diego-based crowdfunding platform that allows people to raise money for causes, events and special needs. In less than two months, the club raised enough money to buy the coats from Operation Warm, an organization that provides garments manufactured from 100% recycled materials in two styles and 12 colors.

But while West End Rotary exceeded its goal, the club realized it had to do more when the ecumenical network said it would like to distribute 400 coats.

West End Rotary President Kevin Noll said he sees the community need every time he drives to work. "More and more families cannot afford to buy a new winter coat for their child. It's sad to see a child on the side of the road waiting to get onto a bus without the bare essentials of a winter coat, something most of us take for granted. It's not a good way to start their day."

Breitlauch said the weather also plays a part in that equation. "The weather experts are suggesting that 2014-15 will exceed 2013-14 in cold and snow. There is a real sense of urgency."

Donors who would like to support Rotary's work can contribute toward future coat purchases—\$20 per coat or \$102 for a case of six—at gofundme.com/hmipbo or by contacting Breitlauch at ksbvet@ptd.net or (610) 390-0351.

History of service—This isn't the first time West End Rotary has spearheaded the program. In 2010, the club purchased 128 new coats and repeated the effort for another relief organization the following year.

Other projects have followed. Over the past three years, the club has donated a stair chair to West End Community Ambulance, water-rescue equipment for the Jackson Township Volunteer Fire Co., thermal imaging software for Blue Ridge Hook & Ladder Co. and dictionaries to every third grade student in the Pleasant Valley School District.

West End Rotary meets for breakfast at 7:30 a.m. on most Thursdays at the Western Pocono Community Library in Brodheadsville. The public is welcome to attend.



Yesterday, Rotarian Holley Keams announced that the club has initiated a new award, the Alexander "Buzz" Bensinger Lifetime Achievement Award, to be celebrated at the Stroudsburgs Rotary Club's upcoming "Not Just Another Auction" gala in March.

The inaugural winner of the Award is John J. Riley (pictured).

"The Alexander Bensinger Lifetime Achievement Award" will recognize Monroe County residents who are successful in their vocation and known for their community service, selflessness, service or philanthropy," Kearns said. "Buzz Bensinger was an active, integral member of our Rotary Club for 62 years, serving

as the club president in 1960-61. He exemplifies the generous spirit of service that is the credo for Rotary." Bensinger, a prominent local attorney who is now retired, has in the past also been honored by the Pennsylvania Bar Association and Monroe County Bar Association.

John Riley will receive the Alexander Bensinger Lifetime Achievement Award at the Stroudsburgs Rotary Club's auction scheduled for March 5 at 5:30 p.m. at Shawnee Inn. The public is invited. Reservations can be made at stroudsburgsrotary.org. The cost is \$50.

Mr. Riley is the founder of the accounting firm Riley and Company, opening his first office in 1969. He has turned over the reins of daily management of the firm, but remains active with community work.

John Riley has served the community in many capacities: treasurer of the Eastern Monroe Public Library and of the Wildlife for Everyone Endowment Fund, Board member for Kettle Creek Endowment Foundation and the Affordable Housing Board. He was honored by the Boy Scouts of America, Minsi Trails Council and is a past citizen of the year of both the Mount Pocono and Monroe County Chambers of Commerce. John Riley was honored in 1990 by the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants with its distinguished public service award.

An expert witness for the Pennsylvania Court of Common Pleas, Riley has lectured all over the country on the subjects of divorce, fraud and business valuation. He has published many professional articles, served on both state and national boards in taxation and financial statement presentation and been the president of both the state Federation of Sportsmen's Club and the Pennsylvania Game Commission.

Dallas Rotary Club Wine and Dine Festival Save the Date - June 27


