Your "How To" Guide for Entering 2016-17 Rosters of Club Officers...

Club secretaries have until **February 1st** to enter the 2016-17 roster of club positions and officers. For those clubs that have their own local copy of ClubRunner, just go to the administration section, look for "Define Club Officers", and you're off and running.

Need a quick visual? Check out the next page.

For those who enter their club data directly into our District 7410 database, here are the steps to follow:

1. Access our District ClubRunner at : http:// portal.clubrunner.ca/50202

2. Click on "Member Login" and enter your account name and password. (Lost your account name and/or password? Contact Brenda Allen at rotarydistrict7410@gmail.com)

3. Once logged in, click on the "Member Area" link at the top-right of screen.

4. In the "For Club Executives" box on the main administration page, click on "Define Club Executives"

5. Look for the "**Carry over...**" link at the bottom of the screen to copy the already-defined club office **positions** to next year. If you need to add a new position, do that before you click the "Carry over..." action. This "Carry over..." action saves having to define these positions. HOWEVER, the officers' names **must be entered** annually. ClubRunner absolutely *makes no assumption* that this year's officers remain the same for subsequent years!

6. Once that is done, click on the "Next Year" year

link at the top of the screen (to the right of "Current Year").

7. When positioned on the 2016-17 year, click the "**Edit**" link for access to the dropdown list of club members. Select the member's name and click "**Save**" when done. Repeat for all officer positions.

This data entry should be synchronized with RI's database, if your club has authorized the data synchronization between District and RI. However, to be on the safe side, check a day or two later to see if your club officer info was transferred to RI by logging on to www.Rotary.org. If the club officer data is not there, then your club secretary will need to make the updates on the RI website.

For Club Secretaries...

One of the obligations of your position is to enter your club's weekly meeting attendance figures, either through your own local copy of ClubRunner or directly into the District website.

For those who are new to the position or just haven't done this in a while, the following step-by-step directions will be useful to you.

1. Log on to our District Website at http:// portal.clubrunner.ca/50202 The "**Member Login**" link is at the top-right of screen. You'll need your login ID and password for this site, NOT the login info for the Rotary.org, unless you set them up to be the same. If you've lost your District login information, contact District Administrator, Brenda Allen at rotarydistrict7410@gmail.com.

2. Once logged in, at the top-right of the page you'll see the "**Members Area**" link. Click on it to be taken to the Club Administration menu page.

3. Scroll down until you see the "For Club Executives" block, and click on "Club Attendance Report". That will take you to the input page for attendance. Right now, you'll be able to see and input attendance figures for July through December.

Easy as that! By the way, this club administration page is also the place to enter the data on your newlyelected 2016-17 Club Executives (officers) and for adding/terminating club members (under "Active Members List").
