## The Story of the Rotary Pin

***and a few reasons WHY you should always wear yours (see page 2).***

Paul Harris Fellow and Society pins, Rotary Fellowship pins, Rotary International theme pins, Rotary District pins, Rotaract and Interact pins, and the Rotary Wheel... Each of these pins tells a unique Rotary story!

What is the story behind the Rotary wheel pin?

The first lapel pin in the history of the Rotary was designed and made by New York Rotary Club member, John Frick on October 14, 1909 and worn by the club's first president Bradford Bullock from 1909 until his premature death in 1911 (At the time, he was serving as VP of the National Association of Rotary Clubs). The forerunner of the traditional Rotary pin worn today, it features the Rotary wheel as it appeared in its earliest representation with eight spokes, no cogs, and no keyway.

The wheel itself became the symbol of Rotary in 1906, a year after the club's formation in Chicago. Asked to design a symbol for the new club, Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver, drew a simple wagon wheel with a few lines to show dust and motion (14 spokes, no cogs, no keyway). Paul Harris reasoned that the wheel symbolized "Civilization and Movement." One observant Rotarian pointed out that a wheel would not generate clouds of dust in front of it, so Montague removed the offending cloud and that design remained the emblem for Chicago until 1912.

When new clubs formed, they adopted the wheel in symbols of their own. Our club integrated the New York wheel and an oak tree as our symbol. It appears on the top of our first Live Oak newsletter in 1914.

In 1910, the Rotary Club of Philadelphia added cogs to create a working wheel, symbolizing members working together, literally interlocked with one another to achieve the organization's objectives. They used 19 cogs in honor of their club, the 19th in Rotary. They created hundreds of metal pins with this design and successfully pitched it as the new official international wheel in 1912. It didn't hurt that the president of the Philadelphia club [who had designed that club's emblem] became president of the International Association of Rotary Clubs at the 1912 Duluth convention.

In 1918, two Rotarian engineers from the Duluth Club Charles Henry Mackintosh and Oscar Bjorge (formally of Minnesota) petitioned Rotary to amend the design of the wheel. They argued that a cogwheel with 19 cogs would not work. Also, the emblem had square-cornered teeth of disproportionate size, and the cogs were irregularly spaced. Charles called it, "An anachronism to engineers." Oscar called it "an insult to engineering that only the brain of an artist could conceive." Oscar sketched a new wheel, with 6 spokes (symbolizing the 6 Objects of Rotary at that time) and 24 cogs or teeth. This design was presented to the Rotary world in 1920.

However, there remained many versions of the Rotary wheel in use around the world by the different clubs. The Oakland Club was still using its 1914 wheel and oak tree in 1922. It wasn't until 1922 that the Rotary International Association declared that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. But, before the approval of Charles and Oscar's gear wheel, the President of Rotary Club of Los Angeles, Will Forker submitted one change: "The 'hub' design of the new 'wheel' is that of an 'idler' wheel or gear, there being no provision for the reception or transmission of power to or from a shaft," he argued. But, he said, incorporating a keyway would make the new wheel "a real worker [LH1]." Oscar and Charles heartily agreed. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design, which we see on our pins was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.

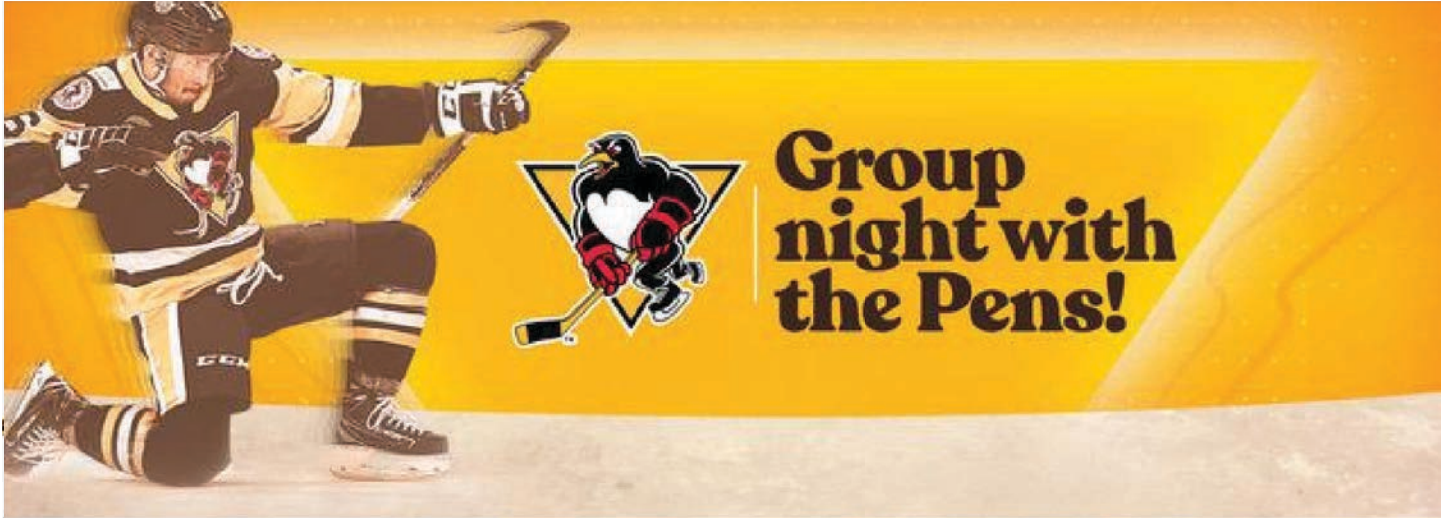

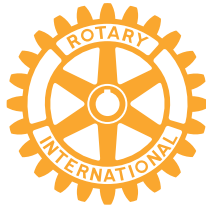

## New Rotary Club at Wayne Highlands Middle School

Close to 30 students at Wayne Highlands Middle School are proving it's never too early in life to put "service above self." That's the motto of Rotary International, to which they now officially belong as members of a new club at school. It's called Early Act, a younger version of the high school's Interact Club which is, in turn, a junior version of Honesdale Rotary. Students, age 11 to 13, "hit the ground running," said Stacey Diehl, Early Act teacher representative.

"On Veteran's Day, they held a breakfast for veterans and an art project honoring the veterans who attended," she said. Mrs. Diehl, Renee Van VanSickle and Barbara Rodda help oversee the new club.

All three Rotary clubs – Honesdale Rotary, Interact and Early Act— are required to have a local and international project as part of their respective charters. "And the Early Act kids have already jumped into the act!" said Honesdale Rotarian Heidi Goyette, who is the Rotary liaison and coordinator for the high school's Interact club. "At the request of Interact, the younger Rotarians are taking on their own version of Interact's popular Purple Pinkie Project to help eradicate polio worldwide," she said. The name stems from Rotary International's End Polio Now campaign, which, along with the World Health Organization and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, has helped reduce the number of polio cases around the globe by 99% since the 1980s. Children who are vaccinated have their pinkies dyed purple.

Starting December 16<sup>th</sup>, during lunch, Early Act members will team up with Interact to offer fellow students a chance to have their pinkies dyed pink for \$1. All monies raised during the multi-day drive will benefit the End Polio Now campaign.

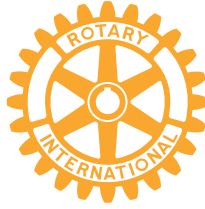
Wayne Highlands Middle School Principal Peter Jordan, ED.D. praised the students' interest in community service. "It hasn't taken much time at all, to see first-hand the impact the Early Act Club is having on our school community," said Dr. Jordan. "I couldn't be more thankful to our teachers who have initiated this club and the students who are exceeding expectations to make it a success. It is obvious that the lessons these students are learning by giving back to our community is something that will stick with them well into adulthood and help guide them to be outstanding members of society." 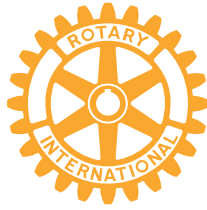

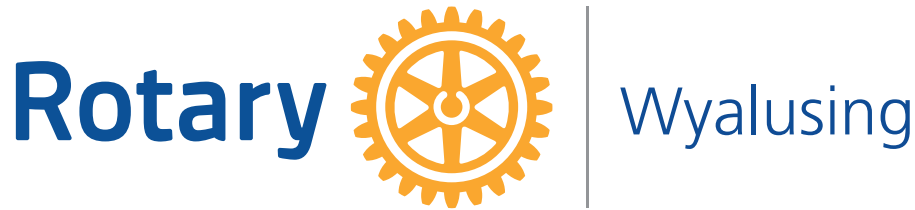

## Wyalusing Rotarians Serving Up Venison

The Wyalusing Area Rotary Club is teaming up with generous area deer hunters and meat processors for its second Venison Dinner Benefit starting at 5 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 25, at the Wyalusing Fire Hall. There will be a variety of venison dishes on the buffet menu, including Swiss venison steak, smoked tenderloin, venison chili, meatloaf with gravy and top round roast, along with an assortment of side dishes.

You can sample as many as you want. Even if you aren't accustomed to dining on venison, you are sure to discover something delicious among this variety of venison dishes. All we ask is a donation when you enter, and you are free to enjoy this amazing cuisine to your heart's (and stomach's) content. The hosting club extends a special invitation to Rotarians throughout the district to come to Wyalusing for this seasonal event.

Ann Burgess, a Past President of the Wyalusing club, organized the venison dinner as a benefit in 2018 in coordination with Pennsylvania's nonprofit Hunters Sharing the Harvest (HSH) program. Ann and husband, Donnie, also a Rotarian, have not only contributed their own deer from a successful hunting season, but they have logged hundreds of miles picking up deer between hunters and processors. Their total haul, at last report, was almost 1,100 pounds of deer meat.

"Our area is known for its great deer hunting and beautiful forested terrain," reported Jon Naugle, President of the Wyalusing Area Rotary. "We support our local food bank, the Helping Hands Food Pantry in Wyalusing, and this program (HSH) works with food banks throughout the state to put food on the table of families who might not otherwise afford nutritious meals."

Donations will go to various club causes, including designated Rotary programs.

Aside from all those venison recipes and other dishes from which to choose, there will be cold beverages and hot coffee available. Side dishes will include, but not be limited to, baked beans, mashed and scalloped potatoes, corn pudding and green bean casserole, with cupcakes as a finishing touch.
