



Update on Global Grant, GG 2463507 DOW University, Pakistan

We are happy to report that we received notification recently of the final approval of the referenced Global Grant application from the grant's primary POC in Pakistan- Aziz Memon, Rotary Club Karachi District D3271.

Global Grant (GG#2463507), entitled DOW University Immunization, Nutrition and Contraceptive Health is a project of the Rotary Club of Karachi, Sindh Province (in the southeast region of Pakistan, bordering India) in partnership with Dow University of Health Science's School of Public Health, located in Karachi. Aziz Memon, Pakistan's National PolioPlus Committee Chairperson, and Trustee of The Rotary Foundation 2020-2024 lead the project.

The goal of the project is to develop Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to effectuate sustainable increases in immunization coverage, improve the nutritional status of zero-dose-children and increase the use of family planning services among the parents of zero-dose-children residing in the urban and rural areas of Karachi.

The total project budget is \$290,000 In addition to our district; the Rotary Club of St. Catherine's (South) Canada is also a major supporter of this initiative along with several other Rotary districts throughout the world.

This Global Grant is supported by a \$20,000 DDF contribution from our District 7410 during the year 2024-2025 District Governor (DG). In addition, a District 7410 member contributed \$4,000 to this same effort.

This Global Grant will address immunization needs, child and mother nutrition, and contraceptive health needs in Pakistan by DOW University. The grant takes an integrated approach to an effort we are all familiar with- eliminating the wild polio virus forever.

Membership Growth Starts With Public Image: Let's Make Rotary More Visible!

Rotary District 7410 is doing incredible work, supporting youth, serving communities, funding scholarships responding to local needs, and showing up where it matters most.

But here's the honest truth: if people don't see Rotary, they can't join Rotary.

Membership growth isn't only about recruiting. It's also about visibility, making sure our communities recognize Rotary as a group that is active, welcoming, and relevant. When Rotary becomes more visible, membership growth naturally follows.

Our District Governor has shared that membership is a pressing priority, and without growth, districts can face difficult changes in the future. The good news is: we can strengthen our clubs simply by improving our public image and making it easier for new people to discover us.

10 Public Image Tips That Lead to More Members

1. Share impact regularly

Post what you did, who it helped, and why it mattered.

2. Show people in action

Service photos and candid moments beat "check pics" every time.

3. Use plain language

Keep Rotary terms simple so newcomers instantly understand what you do.

4. Always include an invite

Add: "Guests welcome!" or "Message us to visit a meeting."

5. Host a casual open house

A "Rotary 101" coffee or meet-and-greet lowers the pressure to join.

6. Be visible in the community

Wear Rotary gear and bring a banner/table to local events.

7. Highlight member spotlights

Share why members joined and what Rotary means to them.

8. Partner and get tagged

Work with schools/nonprofits and ask them to tag your club online.

9. Keep your club page active

Update meeting info, post recent photos, and pin a "Visitors Welcome" post.

10. Follow up fast with guests

A quick thank-you and personal invite back makes a big difference.




