

District Conference Recap

More than 65 Rotarians attended this year's one day event on June12th at the Deane's Center in Wellsboro- at the farthest end of the district.

The primary theme of the conference was to get an early focus on Rotary's newest arer of focus- the environment. Since Wellsboro is a singing club, the day was started with "God Bless America", the pledge of alliance, and Wellsboro's original singing version of the Four Way Test song.

The entire conference was recorded by the local HOME Page Network and will be available as individual links on our website within the next few weeks. Please look for them to get a full overview of what was presented.

A review of the strategic plan that was recently completed was presented by Marcia Loughman and Jim Pierce. It was helpful to set the tone for the district's next couple of years. This was also a breakout focus group discussion.

Polio Truths and Rotary's Call to Action regarding Vaccine hesitancy was presented by Carol Ferguson via Zoom. Lots of good questions arose and were followed up on a breakout session later in the morning.

Covid treatments worldwide was presented by author, Michael Capuzzo. He shared information not related to the vaccines, but rather oral therapy becoming more popular in many countries of the world.

Mountain Souls video was shown as presented by Jeffrey Swingholm- the author of this documentary about Robert and Dottie Weber- a respected forestry couple who built their own log cabin and lived without running water nor electricity for over 50 years. They both passed away within the past 10 years.

About 20 volunteers walked the pleasant two blocks to the Presbyterian church to participate in a service project called" Goodies for our troops". The organization ships goodie boxes to the military all over the world on a regular basis.



The log cabin from the Mountain Souls video has been relocated - piece by pieceto the Pa. Lumberman's Museum on route 6 past Wellsboro. A review of the the museum, the state of the Pa. wilds, and threats to those wilds was reviewed by director Josh Roth.

One of the current threats is that of the Spotted Lantern Fly that is developing a foothold in Pa. This excellent presentation was given by Carolyn Weathers.

Taking a step back in time, the next video showed what life was like during the late 1880's through the eyes of the author George Washington Sears who wrote under the pen name NESSMUK- said to be one of Pennsylvania's first naturalists. He highlights the deforestation, pollution from tanneries, and political greed at the time.

Wrapping up the conference was a detailed overview of the availability of starting a recycling program - especially for thin plastics- presented by Ardys Boostrom.

DGE (now DG) Mary Ellen Bentler provided an overview of upcoming events and introduced the Rotarians who read the top four essay contest winners essays.

The afternoon ended with a meaningful Memorial Service for those Rotarians who have died over the past year.

The evening was capped off with a BBQ style dinner under a huge tent with great food and live entertainment at the home of a Wellsboro member- Nicole Quesada. Many thanks for the musical offerings of Pat Davis, Jim Tutak, and Dave Driscoll.
