Another successful RYLA is in the books!

This year marks the 10th anniversary District 7410 hosted RYLA at Keystone College in LaPlume, PA.

After a two-year hiatus, thirty-five teenagers gathered to participate in active learning to better themselves and their communities.

The Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) was held June 19th through the 22nd, 2022, and was led by Executive Chair Amy Leiser of the Rotary Club of the Stroudsburgs and Co-Chair David Palmer of the New Milford Rotary Club. Together, Amy and Dave oversaw twenty staff members in addition to the RYLA conferees.

The 3-day conference featured days packed with activities. From breakfast at 7:45 a.m. each morning to lights out at 11:00 p.m., the conferees and staff stayed busy. Each day, RYLA conferees learned about Rotary and how to embrace the 4-way test.

The staff ran ice-breakers to get help break conferees out of their comfort zones, and numerous activities taught the participants how to respect other's opinions, work in teams, and develop self-confidence. Even the talent show was a milestone for some who had never performed in front of a crowd! Interestingly, all the activities were fun, and the participants might not have realized then that they were learning leadership skills until after the conference was over, and they took time to reflect on their experience at RYLA.

Never in the same group of people, the conferees were strategically divided up with each activity to ensure everyone met someone new each day. Friendships were formed, lessons were learned, and pride in oneself was developed.

As always, thank you to all of the members of District 7410 for supporting this important experience for northeastern Pennsylvania area youth. Special thank you to District Governor Mary Ellen Bentler for offering guidance and encouragement as we worked to bring this vital program back to our district after a 2-year gap. When passion and raw determination are added to the miracle of modern vaccines, great things happen. Over the last 30 years, Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio

Eradication Initiative have seen the reduction of polio cases worldwide, by 99.9 percent. As long as polio and the many other vaccine preventable diseases still circulate anywhere in the world, here in the US, we are still vulnerable and must continue to be vaccinated.

Over the last 2 years, the world has seen unsurpassed death and illness from yet another virus. In reading the Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation Position Statement on Vaccination, we are reminded that we have even more work to do and have been called into action - right here at home.

Summarized as:

- 1. Global vaccination is the path to ending the pandemic, and we strongly encourage vaccination. . . .
- 2. Misinformation hinders the fight against COVID-19, and we are committed to providing our members with science-based information.
- 3. Rotary is engaged in assuring equity in vaccine access to all people.
- 4. Rotary salutes health care workers everywhere as they continue to provide lifesaving services. We encourage clubs to offer recognition and encouragement to these heroes.
- 5. Rotary and Rotaract clubs are encouraged to redouble their efforts to support COVID-19 prevention and vaccination efforts.
- 6. As one of the greatest advances of modern medicine, vaccines are safe, effective and save millions of lives each year. We can continue to apply the lessons we have learned in fighting polio to COVID-19 response efforts.

More than two years into the pandemic, one million+ American have died as a result of COVID-19. As Rotary members, we are particularly aware of the important role vaccines play in halting the spread of disease. We must continue to support polio immunization efforts around the world... but with this call to action statement - Rotary International is asking for more. They are asking us to bring this effort home. Right here into our local communities.

What can we do?

- We can share fact-based vaccination information, easily obtained from our PA Immunization Coalition(s), located throughout our State.
- We can distribute packets of vaccine information that encourage vaccine acceptance, to day care centers, pediatricians, primary care physicians and hospital clinics.
- · We can volunteer at vaccine clinics
- We can encourage our members to donate blood and/or host a blood drive.

There is a lot we can be doing to answer this call, ideas that will allow us to get very creative within our own communities. Two of us accepted the opportunity to speak out for the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, about the realities of life after experiencing the effects of a vaccine preventable disease.

Engage your Rotary Club to get involved as a partner supporting these efforts in your community. We are doing this not only for ourselves, but for future generations.

Once again, this year, the district has paid for a booth for the entire District membership to utilize to spread the word about Rotary, show the flag, raise money for PolioPlus and invite new members. So, next is to line up volunteers to work the booth. Historically, Area (formerly known as Cluster) Two has provided most of the volunteers. This year we would once again like to gather volunteers from throughout the entire District 7410. We already have volunteers from the Trail Club, Abington Club, North Scranton, Wellsboro, and New Milford.

Each day at the fair starts at 10:00 AM and goes till 10 PM, except for Friday and Saturday which end at 11 PM. The Rotary Booth gets 18 free passes, which works out to each free pass working a four (4) hour stint at the booth (5 hrs. for the last shift on Friday and Saturday), so three (3) a day for 6 days. Two per shift would be nice for company and ease of effort, but only one per shift is required.

We also get two (2) commercial parking passes, which allow for easier access in the case of moving heavy stuff into the booth or moving it out on the last day. Any one above the 18 passes/volunteers, will have to acquire their own ticket to get in the fair. Advance sale discount tickets are also available. Contact Dave Palmer (see below) if you would like some of those tickets. Parking is free for all.


