U-Link Role Model in Your Midst

Dean Barone's Community Involvement - Local and Abroad



Many of you may know **Dean Barone**, Testing Analyst III, in the Information & Technology Management Department. He has worked with TMG Health for the past 8 years. But, what you may not know is Dean has a soft spot for those in need.

Dean has been serving in the Dunmore Rotary Club for the past 12+ years. Over the years, he has helped numerous families, children, firemen, police officers, borough workers and others through his involvement with the Rotary Club. Whether it is providing radios for the fire rescue team, distributing holiday presents to children or giving financially to help a family who has lost it all in a fire, Dean enjoys seeing the look of relief on the faces of those he is helping when they realize someone cares. One of his most memorable experiences was after a devastating fire destroyed a family's home, he went to visit the family, and the look of gratitude on the mom's face remains with him today. "That's when I

knew that what I do matters," said Dean. In the midst of tragic loss, he was able to play a small role in bringing hope to this family.

His social citizenship stretches beyond the local boarders of Northeastern Pennsylvania and reaches internationally to Central America as well. Through his work with the Rotary, he connected with a team of professionals who go yearly to Honduras on mission trips. They group calls themselves *Operation Honduras*. *Operation Honduras* is an opportunity to make a difference in the lives of those living in poverty. During the main trip in February, they pick a village, and build as much as they can of schools and houses in an eight-day time period. Yet, their main objective is to help the local clinics with their hearing impaired patients. They fit the villagers for hearing aid molds, and then part of the team will return to the country later in the year and present the Hondurans with their new hearing aids which are made in US. Also, they have dental professionals on their team who volunteer free services during that week at the clinics. In addition to meeting the villagers' physical needs, they also fill up their suitcases with flip flops and soccer balls to bring smiles to the local children.

This year is the second time Dean has gone on Operation Honduras. Dean is driven to continue to help out the people of Honduras. "It is the sense of being able to help them and knowing that there is a chance that you can help someone possibly make it out of poverty," he said. The work that they do in the Honduras village isn't for the weak. Hard work, long hours and poor conditions, but it is worth it, according to Dean, to know that you are helping kids have a chance to go to school and make something of themselves.
