Letter from the District Governor

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June 1, 2016...

Greetings, District 7410 Rotarians! Well, another year has slid right past us into the history books, and I've found myself engaged in a series of "lasts" this month - - last official club visits, last District-sponsored events, last newsletter. With any tenure, it is always wise to review and then take stock of what needs to be planned for the future. Here's a list of the District-sponsored projects, activities, and events that occurred from July through May of the 2015-16 Rotary year:

- **Change the World project** – Club presidents were given a jar at their PETS training, and asked to collect just small change at their meetings throughout the year, periodically sending it in to The Rotary Foundation. Participating clubs were amazed at how fast this change built up!
- **Rotary Family Picnic** – A great day in August at the Mauch Chunk Lake Park for food, fun, and fellowship
- **Rotary Reads Project** – Clubs were invited to purchase a children's book, and then arrange a date and location where they would read it. Some clubs' members dressed in costumes for the readings; others offered up additional activities, using their own creativity that resulted in a fun time for the children.
- **October Membership Seminar** – Well-attended facilitated workshop, augmented by video presentations in a terrific venue (King's College). This turned out to be an excellent idea-generator, which several clubs put into practice.
- **District Short Story Contest** – This project, focused on 4th – 6th graders, showed off the creativity of students across our district. Ten stories were selected for the 2015-16 District 7410 Short Story Book, presented at our April District Conference.
- **Foundation High Tea** – Along with having celebrated Rotary author, District Governor David Forward, as the keynote speaker, we took the opportunity to recognize our longest-serving Rotarians (50+years) as well as those celebrating milestone membership years (25th, 30th, and 40th), and presented them with their longevity tabs, worn on their Rotary pins.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR CONTINUES....

- **Paul Harris Recognition** – Seven clubs took advantage of PH points being offered by District to reach out to their communities and select individuals who were actively living lives that reflected “service above self”. The selected individuals were honored at our April 29th District Conference.

- **District Short Story Illustration Contest** – After the short story winners were selected, they were made available to high school students who were encouraged to create illustrations of one or more stories. Eleven submissions were selected, one to be used as the cover art for the booklet, and ten others that were interleaved throughout the storybook. Both the authors and the illustrators were recognized at our District Conference.

- **International Service Trip to Honduras** – Partnering with non-profit Operation Honduras, a small team of Rotarians accompanied this annual trip to the San Pedro/Sula area of Honduras and spent six days building school rooms at two sites. Additionally, the Rotarians had the opportunity to assist with OH’s “Gift of Site” glasses distributions and also distributions of dental supplies. The video report, shown at the District Conference, is available to all clubs on request.

- **District Conference** – Forty of our forty-three clubs were represented at our 2-day event where they were engaged, educated, and entertained. Too many highlights to mention - - except who could forget the “**Boar’s Head Boys**”. Way to go, Wyoming!

- **Rotary Day at the Ballpark** – This end-of-year fellowship and service event is scheduled for June 5th, and nearly 100 Rotarians and guests will be there to celebrate our collective good works in our various communities, and also continue to serve by collecting food from that day’s stadium attendees. A Rotary video is scheduled to be shown in the pre-game timeslot as well, highlighting Rotary in Northeastern Pennsylvania to all those present. Some tickets may still be available, so call the Rail-Riders ticket office directly, if you want to join the fun.

While we’re nearly at the end of this Rotary year,

I can report that our membership has risen from 1115 on July 1st, 2015 to 1168 as of this writing. Not only have we gained Rotarians, but we gained new skill sets and people wanting to provide service to their communities. Our members are our real assets, and I leave you with the wish that all our club leaders will take advantage of the human capital wealth that they have at their disposal for the 2016-17 Rotary year.

Membership Changes Start July 1

Rotary’s new club invoice has changed the way that Rotary calculates membership growth. With the new invoice process, clubs must report admissions and terminations within 30 days of the event and no later than 1 July and 1 January for proper invoicing. All admissions and terminations reported to Rotary by end of day 1 July will be included in the calculations for the club’s start figures for the new Rotary year, and also be considered in the calculations for 2015-16 membership achievements.

Rotary clubs that want new members to demonstrate growth in the 2016 - 17 Rotary year should give these new members a start date of 2 July or later. Conversely, terminated members should be given a termination date of 1 July or sooner. **Doing so allows Rotary’s system to accurately record the changes in the year in which it should factor into membership and not inaccurately increase or decrease the club’s starting figure.**

Here is an example of how membership changes are calculated:

1 July 2015— club has 100 members

1 July 2015— club officer adds 9 members (3 have start dates of 15 June, 3 have start dates of 1 July, and 3 have start dates of 2 July)

1 July 2015 – 1 July 2016 Membership Achievement: 106 members and an increase of 6 members (all members added with start dates through 1 July are included. The 3 members that started after 1 July are not included in the start figure but count towards the next Rotary year’s numbers).

It has been just 5 years this month that fire devastated the City of Slave Lake and the memory of the floods in High River and Calgary are fresh. So are the strategies for providing support.

I am sure that you are all on alert trying to figure out how you can best assist our friends in Fort McMurray in their time of need. This afternoon I had a conversation with some of the Rotary leaders from the community. First and foremost they are overwhelmed with the outpouring of support they have received from throughout the Rotary world and wanted me to express their gratitude.

their needs are being taken care of by The Red Cross and similar emergency response organizations. They are aware of the offers of help from throughout the district and have shared that with all of their club members. They will be sure to direct anyone in need of help either to a local Rotary club or the District office where we will make sure their needs are taken care of.

What I heard today is that the biggest need will be in the medium to long term once they are back in their homes and can assess what is needed. That's where Rotary comes in! What we do best is stay in for the long term and help through projects and donations once the needs are determined. I promised all Rotarians from Fort McMurray

that Rotary International will be there to help them as long as it takes to get them going again. That is where we need your support. If you are planning to make a cash donation please do so through the Rotary District 5370 Charitable Foundation "Fort McMurray Fire Relief Fund". Donations are eligible for a Canadian tax-deductible receipt and will be disbursed in accordance with the wishes of an advisory committee made up of Fort McMurray residents (including Rotarians).

The Rotary District 5370 Charitable Foundation has established the "Fort McMurray Fire Relief Fund" to assist in the rebuilding of that city following this tragic fire.
