On April 28, 2019, the tiny town of Tunkhannock hosted a big birthday bash celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> birthday of Francis "Fran" Turner. The event was sponsored by the Dennis Strong and Black Walnut American Legion Posts at the Triton Hose Company Hall. In attendance were many veterans, Rotarians, the 2018 Tunkhannock Girl's Little League All Star team and their coaches, and Fran's family and friends.

Fran is a retired US Army Major, who during World War II, fought in Africa and Europe, at Omaha Beach in Normandy, the Battle of the Bulge, and at one of the last tank battles in Germany. He has been a long time member of the American Legion and was Post Commander for the Tunkhannock American Legion Post.

#### **Rotarian for 68 Years**

Fran, a member of Rotary for over 68 years, served as President of the Tunkhannock Club in 1973-74 and as its Secretary for 25 years. At his birthday celebration, current Rotary President Mike Markovitz presented Fran with a plaque recognizing his "Service Above Self" to his country, community and Rotary. He was also given a lifetime paid membership in the Rotary Club of Tunkhannock and a giant birthday card signed by the members of the Tunkhannock Rotary Club.

At the May 9 Tunkhannock Rotary Luncheon at Purkey's Pink Apple, Scott Howell (faculty mentor), Ryan Zalewski (student) and Andrzej Swietek (Rotary exchange student from Poland) gave a presentation on the competition experiences of the 2019 Tunkhannock Area High School (TAHS) Robotics Team.

At their first competition, they were the District Event Winner. At the World Championship in Detroit, they were an Archimedes Subdivision Finalist. This was the second highest ranking in the Club's history. They finished 12th at the Detroit World Championship. They ranked six out of 128 teams in First MidAtlantic District.

Guest Fred Harding was then asked to talk briefly about how the TAHS Robotics Club got started. He recalled it started in 1997. There were only two competition sites back then and now there are over 30 sites in multiple countries. Rotary supported him in helping to get things going in the early years and he ran the Club for 10 years.

### Brazilian Exchange Student Talks about Here and Home

Joao "John" Guilherme Tonet Oldoni, is from Brazil and 17 years old. He is taking classes in graphics, 3D printing, computer and electronic devices. He lives in the south of Brazil and was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Herval D'Oeste in District 4740.

The north region of Brazil is mostly forested with the biggest river in the world. The Northeast has lots of culture. The Midwest has the capital and agriculture. The Southeast has rural, business and city areas. The South region has abundant culture from Europe, including Italy and Germany. He is from the Parana region with lots of waterfalls, gardens and an innovative theater structure.

#### Speaking of Food and Wine

Brazilian foods are good! Most common is barbecue (Joao assured us it was much better than American), candy with peanuts, condensed milk frozen bars, puddings and green herb drinks made with hot water.

Joao lives in the city of Agua Doce (Sweetwater), which is the fifth biggest city in his region. They have windmills for power generation. His city is big on wine production and their vines have won awards worldwide. They do not have snow, but it does freeze there.

In addition to his Mom and Dad, he has a sister. They have a great pool that they spend a lot of time in. He plays bocce ball for his school and state teams.

Joao then described his time since arriving in Tunkhannock. The first 2 weeks were spent at Anne Sehne's house since his English was

not so good and her son helped him. He helped with Rotary's roadside cleanup in the fall. He went to a Taco Festival in NJ and had fun.

The exchange students went on a variety of trips including one to Philly to see the Liberty Bell, Rocky statue and the Eastern State Penitentiary Haunted House. They also went to NYC around Christmas and he saw ducks in Central Park, other landmarks and the Twin Tower Memorial. He also met one of his friends in NYC who was there on business.

The students also went to the Dickens celebration in Wellsboro and to Harrisburg to see the State Capitol and learn how the legislature works. The Washington DC trip was for all the exchange students from our District and, in addition to many historic sites including the White House, they went to the Paul Harris Memorial, which is located in "The Extra Mile – Points of Light Volunteer Pathway, a national monument in Washington D.C. Located adjacent to the White House, the monument is composed of 34 bronze medallions honoring people who "through their caring and personal sacrifice, reached out to others, building their dreams into movements that helped people acrossAmerica and throughout the world".

They also took a photo of the whole group with the Pennsylvania statue.

#### **Recalls Experiences**

Joao then briefly enumerated the various activities he got a chance to experience while in Tunkhannock. At the beginning of his exchange year, he attended a breakfast that Anne Sehne arranged to introduce the two exchange students to the teachers at Tunkhannock Area High School (TAHS). With his first host family, he went to the circus to see the tigers. He attended the Bloomsburg Fair, had his first Thanksgiving Day celebration, attended a hockey game and got to see an actual professional baseball game, not just on TV. At TAHS, he played soccer (did very well) and basketball. Last weekend, he went to TAHS Prom.

For Halloween, he carved fabulous pumpkins. This winter he went skiing and built his first snowman. He also got to see the incredible light displays at Stonehedge Country Club at Xmas.

Joao indicated that he really enjoyed his exchange in Tunkhannock and District 7410 and is looking forward to his graduation from Tunkhannock Area High School next month.
