The New Milford Area Rotary Club held its first in person club meeting at Green Gables Pavilion on Thursday June 4th, after months of virtual meetings, due to the COVID-19 pandemic shutdown. Not only were the members thrilled to see one another once again, but also thrilled in receiving the traditional Rotary Exchange student country brief. Milo Demange of Nancy, France captured the club's attendees with photos and tales of his life in the north-eastern French Department of Meurthe-et-Moselle. Milo has voluntarily spent the past nine months attending Mountain View High School as a matriculating Senior, though upon his return to France he will be required to repeat his Senior year in the French school system.

During these nine months, Milo was hosted by Jamie Galvin of Lathrop Township, along with his son Benjamin. As a Mountain View High School student Milo participated on the cross country and basketball teams, attracting throngs of fans and supporters as he dove into American sports and culture. Volleyball was to be next on Milos sport experience, but the COVID-19 Pandemic brought that to an end. During the next several months of virtual on-line classes at Mountain View, Milo's extra-curricular activities included learning how to draw maple sap and make maple syrup; the mechanics of splitting and stacking firewood; and learning how to embroider.

Milo commented that his biggest surprise upon arriving in the United States was the preponderance of full-size pickup trucks. In France and much of Europe such vehicles are rare. Milo returns to his native France this summer, with an appreciation of American culture, food, and friendship. An appreciation shared by all his American hosts, for his native France. Milo Demange is an exceptional ambassador and leaves a legacy of mutual curiosity and respect, unfortunately cut somewhat short by the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Hawley Rotary Youth Projects



Every year (for decades) Santa and an elf appear to an enthusiastic class asking if each student has been good for the year. Educational presents are distributed to the students.

In addition, Hawley Rotarians buy gifts for one or two Head Start children on the "Angel Tree" allowing the students to have a real Christmas from Santa. For the past four years, we have purchased take-home books every month for each student (34) in Hawley Head Start 1 classes. Parents are encouraged to read with their children as they build a library of books during the year.





Since 2006 The Hawley Rotary Club has held a Spring Easter Egg Hunt which involves a Rotarian reading a story to the children, making a craft to take home to their parents, and finding three eggs on the playground or in the classroom if it's raining. Following the event, each child receives a prize.

For the 2019-2020 school year, Hawley Rotarians made three raised bed gardening boxes for Head Start children to grow their own food and flowers

Ten Students of the Month are chosen by their service to the local community, to the school or their church rather than academics or athletics. The amount and variety of activities of these ten students is truly remarkable and recognition of their achievements is given at a special luncheon and in the local newspaper.



In the past 16 years Hawley Rotary has collected and donated jackets to children ages 3 or 4 (Head Start) through 13 -14 (Middle School) in the Wallenpaupack Area School District. Since the inception of this project over 1,250 jackets have been distributed to students.



Hawley Rotary was proud to present a check for \$4,000 to the new Wallenpaupack School District Food Pantry. The money was made possible through a District 7410 grant . Accepting the check for the District is Rosemary Martinyuk who was the 2018 recipient of Hawley Rotary's Four Way Test Award.



Two awards to graduating seniors are presented at Wallenpaupack Area High School's assembly: a \$1,500 scholarship and a \$500 award for highest scholastic honors in foreign languages.
