It is with great sadness that I pass on the sad news of the recent death of James C. Barrett. As the President of Road Scholar Transport, James Barrett was pinned by Rotary District 7410 in 2023 as a Rotary International Paul Harris Fellow. Rotary District 7410 nominated Mr. Barrett for this prestigious honor in recognition of his donating the use of one of his company's commercial on the road tractor trailer for the placement of a vehicle wrap highlighting the "End Polio Now" campaign, that Rotary International has pursued for over 40 years. This vehicle is now traveling up and down the east coast of the United States daily, serving a public service as a message to "End Polio Now" and as a part of the Road Scholar Awareness Campaign. The trailer wrap effort represented a three-year effort involving dozens of volunteers from throughout the ten counties of Rotary District 7410. A world of goodwill and better understanding comes closer to reality today because of the compassion of Mr. James Barrett and Road Scholar Transport. Mr. Barrett leaves the legacy of "Service Above Self" to benefit local and international communities.








Donation Thank You


















Tunkhannock Rotary Supports Wyoming County Drug Take Back

Tunkhannock Rotary, in collaboration with the Wyoming County District Attorney's (DA) Office, has been actively involved in community outreach and advertising for the semi-annual Drug Take Back Program since 2014.

The Spring event was Apr 27. Residents who cleaned out their medicine cabinets of expired or unused drugs dropped off 157 pounds of pills that were then collected by law enforcement from 4 local pharmacies and destroyed.

Wyoming County District Attorney Joseph Peters, who is also a Rotarian, stated in an article in the May 15 Wyoming County Press Examiner that "Every pill is a temptation. As such, more than 170,000 tempting opportunities for a young person to experiment with drugs and place themselves on the road to addiction were removed from their grasp".

Tunkhannock Rotary Scholarships

At Tunkhannock Area School District's Senior night on May 15, Rotarian Don Davis presented a \$1,000 academic scholarship to Norah Rickaby who will be attending the University of South Carolina focusing on political science/pre-law.

Don also presented a \$1,000 vocational scholarship to Austin Kimelewski, who will attend the Pa. College of Technology.

There was a mom who lost her daughter and didn't want to lose her other one, a grandmother raising her grandchild, a retired law enforcement officer, teachers, business people, students, parents and senior citizens...on and on, and each with a story. They heard about our event on the radio, the ad, the op-ed and yard signs. Over 80 boxes and info were distributed...that's 160 individual doses, out there and ready. We hope not one ever has to be used."


