



power during any outage was the winning idea. This generator will not only provide uninterrupted power to the station for the apparatus and communications during these outages in the event of an emergency call, it will also serve as a resource for Benton Township residents to come to during these outages to meet their needs.

The joint project between The Fire Company, The Trail Rotary Club and the Benton Twp. Lions Club will split the costs of the unit and installation, contributing roughly \$2,500 each towards the project. Additionally, installation, labor and expenses is being donated and set up by Jack Curtis of Curtis Plumbing, Heating & Electrical in Peckville.

"It is wonderful to see local, civic-minded organizations come together for such a deserving item for the Fleetville Volunteer Fire Company and the residents on Benton Township." noted a Trail Rotary spokesperson.

The guest speaker at the Tunkhannock Rotary Luncheon on Feb 14 was Kevin Kitchnefsky, who is the founder of the Kevin Kitchnefsky Foundation for Spinal Cord Research (https:// www.themiamiproject.org/).

His inspiring presentation started with a heart wrenching 10-minute video on the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, which showed not only some of the rehabilitation work and research they are doing, but the ways that some people became paralyzed, including gymnastic accidents and car crashes.

Kevin has been paralyzed from the chest down since a work accident in 1996 in New Jersey. Twenty-seven improperly stacked pieces of chain link fencing (weighing 2,700 lbs), which slid off a truck pinning him against the tractor-trailer, resulting in his sustaining half a dozen broken vertebrae and damaging his spinal cord.

The doctors at the hospital told him there was only a one percent chance of his ever walking again. However, he is determined to get out of his wheelchair one day. Kevin is a quadriplegic, so he does not have full use of either his arms or legs. His legs are completely paralyzed, and he has only limited use of his arms.

After leaving the hospital, he came home to Tunkhannock to recover. Instead of just feeling sorry for himself, in 2000 he started a Foundation, the Kevin Kitchnefsky Foundation for Spinal Cord Research. They raise funds for research into a cure for paralysis brought on by spinal cord injury. Between 70 and 80

percent of the money they raise is used to fund research grants (Research K Grants) to leading research organizations such as the Miami Project. Between 20 and 30 percent of the money is passed on to NEPA residents (Individual K Grants), who need financial assistance due to spinal cord injuries or to organizations dedicated to helping serve these individuals. The Foundation has raised over \$600K to date.

Their two major annual fundraiser events are their Golf Tournament Fundraiser that is held at the Stonehedge Golf Course and the October HarvestFest Fundraiser for families and children at Tunkhannock's Triton Fire House. They are currently looking for business & corporate sponsors for this summer's Golf Tournament and, of course, teams to participate.

Every Day's a Challenge

In response to a question from President Mike Markovitz, Kevin briefly described some of the daily challenges with being paralyzed and living in a wheel chair all day.

He needs assistance doing many things able bodied individuals take for granted like dressing themselves, cooking their meals, etc. Bathroom functions are a challenge.

He does physical therapy every day. He has family and a professional aide to help him meet many of the challenges of daily living, but he admits that he does have his bad days.

He makes it through those days by realizing "there are people worse off than him".

Interact Club Using Grant to Help Homeless and Seniors

A \$1,000 Hazleton Rotary Community Service Grant was awarded to the MMI Interact Club to use towards buying materials needed in completing their project that will help protect those in the area who could use an extra layer of warmth.

Interact club is a service club for youth ages 12 to 18 and is part of Rotary International, the world's first service club organization. Individual Rotary clubs sponsor the youth component, Interact clubs, by providing guidance and support. The first Interact club was founded in 1962.

Interact involves as many as 200,000 youth through more than 10,000 clubs in 109 countries and geographical areas. Each club varies according to its membership makeup. An Interact club may derive its membership from a single school or combine students from more than one school in a particular community. The size of Interact club memberships varies, as well. Members are known as Interactors.

The MMI Interact club has been in existence since 2002 and is sponsored by Hazleton Rotary and Freeland Rotary Clubs. It currently



Delivering Dictionaries to Local Third Graders Since 2001



Third graders at all of the Hazleton Area Elementary Schools (Freeland is covered by Freeland Rotary) are the student recipients, as well as, 3rd graders from Holy Family Academy and Immanuel Christian School.

This is a yearly event done as a way for the club to introduce young people to the "wonder of words". Many local children lack internet access, and these dictionaries give them all a common starting point, while making classroom dictionary exercises possible.

Project Chairman Joe Lettiere says, "People think today's youngsters only use computers and wouldn't have a use for dictionaries, but we are finding that a lot of students enjoy the dictionaries and appreciate the ability to physically open a book and look up a word. Ex-Fulbright Scholar Talks Turkey

At a February meeting of the Rotary Club of the Abingtons last week Dr. Gus Vlassis, shown at leftdisplaying one of his photos, presented a program on his three trips to Turkey. He was the first member of the Keystone College faculty to receive a Fulbright award. Under that program he spent the 1965-1966 school year in Samsun, Turkey, studying the educational system of Turkey and teaching at a private school. In 1995 he spent four weeks leading a Rotary Group Study Exchange team to Western Turkey, traveling to a number of cities and living with Turkish families. In 1997 he spent three months as a Rotary volunteer professor at the Uludag University in Bursa, Turkey. His last trip to Turkey was in 2014 when he and other Rotarians traveled to a number of cities talking with families, educators and business owners. Dr. Vlassis became interested in the changes that took place over those years and discussed those infrastructure differences and the cultural changes that have occurred since 1965.
