




Craft Beer—A Unique Business Model

Beekeeping & The Honey Bees

Erik Diemer of Blossum & Buzz Beekeeping spoke to us about his experience working with the bees. He's been doing this for 13 years. Honey bees are responsible for one third of all the food we eat today. How they make honey is from 20-30 flowers per flight and the nectar is transferred from bee to bee and then put into the hive. Honey combs are the wax. Summer bees only live 3 weeks until they work themselves to death. Winter bees live the longest....for 4-6 months!
