

Held at Keystone College in LaPlume, PA, the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is a 5-day conference training program that brings together young adults to develop their character and enrich their leadership skills. Throughout the week, RYLA conferees learn about Rotary and how to embrace the 4-way test while working on group assignments, participating in service projects, and listening to motivational speakers. Numerous activities teach the participants how to respect other's opinions, work in teams, and develop their confidence and self-worth.

Rotary members of District 7410 have supported this important experience for northeastern and central Pennsylvania area youth. The RYLA program provides an opportunity for these teenagers to flourish and to unlock their leadership potential, all while having fun!

But, the RYLA program is in danger of being canceled.

Since 2011, Rotarians Karen DeMatteo and Amy Leiser have developed and continued this crucial outreach opportunity to Rotary District 7410. Due to the pandemic, both the 2020 and 2021 RYLA were canceled, and many student and staff members cannot return in 2022. In addition to the loss of student staff, Karen DeMatteo has put her house on the market and plans to relocate out of the area.




Hazleton Rotary Happy Holiday Celebration

Club Updates

Our Holiday Giving (Christmas) Project was another success. The Club, with some assistance from community donors, was able to distribute 148 - \$50 gift cards to needy children in the Jim Thorpe Area School District.

Along with several community partners, we continue to work on the establishment of a Pre-K / Pre-School Program in the Borough.

In February we welcomed our newest Member, Lori Chaplin. Lori is a retired teacher and administrator and currently is the Executive Director of the Eastcentral PA Area Health Education Council. With the addition of Lori, we have 30 members – an increase of 8 members since April 2021.

Four students have been selected to attend this year's RYLA program – two each from the Jim Thorpe area School District and the Carbon Career and Technical Institute.

Seven students from CCTI entered the Essay contest and the winners read their essay to the Club; 1st Place – Victoria Bennick, 2nd Place, Craig Conville; and 3rd Place – Owen Brody. Victoria's essay was submitted to the District and she received a \$50 gift. Craig and Owen received \$25 gifts.

Planning has begun for the Summer Recreation Program for children in 2nd to 6th grade. It will be held at Memorial Park from June 20 to August 11. This will be the 25th year that the Program has been in existence.

Last year's four scholarship recipients Submitted their 1st semester transcripts and all were sent \$500 checks. This year we will raise the scholarships' amounts to \$750.



We have established \$300 Teacher grants each for the LB Morris and Penn-Kidder Elementary Schools. This replaces the Dictionary Project that we had participated in for many years.

Charitable donations this calendar year include: Family Promise (\$300), Carbon County Community Foundation Penny Allison Fund (\$250), St. Peter's Community Resource Center (\$250), Nepal Mushroom Project (\$250 pledged), Turn To Us (\$200), Valor Veteran's Clinic (\$100), and Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (\$100).

CCTI's first IRC meeting for the 2021-22 school was attended by members of the Jim Thorpe Rotary Club, Dr. Clem McGinley and Sharon Alexander. McGinley presented details regarding the Rotary Club's endeavors and their involvement in the community and around the world and the significance of the Motto "Service above Self."

Interact's past accomplishments and future projects were discussed. In previous years, the club supported multiple community projects, including local food banks and needy families, and participated in a water purification project for Honduras and PolioPlus eradication project.

This year, the club has completed collections for the local cat shelter, which will be repeated in the future; and will collect food for CCTI families during the month of November.

Upcoming projects include selling beverages during lunch such as hot apple cider, hot chocolate and root beer floats, all according to season to promote the club; preparing a lunch or dinner and donating it to the Palmerton Veteran Organization to thank them for their service; assisting Dimmick Library with story time - individual students will videotape a reading session (pre-K story book) to be posted on the library's website; have volunteers be present in the library for their upcoming STEM projects starting in January; host a March Madness hat day fundraising event; host the annual egg hunt in the spring; collect needed items for the local pet shelters and food pantry; and design cards and prepare a gift basket for the children in the hospital at Lehigh Valley Health Network during the Christmas season.

NEW MILFORD AREA ROTARY FINDING SUCCESS WITH CORPORATE MEMBERSHIP RECRUITING

In early 2020 the New Milford Area Rotary Club decided to pursue a Corporate Membership category for its membership drive efforts, and then since March 2021 taking advantage of the District's "new membership dues waiver initiative". This waiver carries through June 30th of this year.


Despite being interrupted to some degree by the onset of the COVID pandemic, the club has steadily realized success with this effort. Since March 2020, the club has realized ten (10) new members through this Corporate Membership initiative, and thirteen (13) new individual memberships, although one (1) of those individual members transferred to Rotary in Wisconsin conducive with an employment change. With that, our current membership as of this newsletter stands at 35 active members and 11 Honorary members. Currently four (4) more new Corporate Memberships and four (4) plus individual memberships are under discussion.

In addition to increasing membership and thus our club's ability to conduct service activities in the community, we envision this effort will eventually help us in the establishment of a Rotary Satellite Club in Montrose, Susquehanna County. The Montrose Club unfortunately turned in its charter in 2016 after 100 years.

Starting in 2019, the New Milford Area Rotary began an effort to re-introduce and return Rotary to Montrose. This started with a District Grant that collaborated with many Montrose area businesses to start the United Way's Real Men Read Mentoring Program in the Kindergarten classes of Montrose Area School District. Additional service activities in the Montrose area include dictionary distribution to third graders, Leopold Chocolate Rotary Wheel fundraising sales, Christmas Season bell ringing on behalf of the Salvation Army, solicitation of business donations for the District On-Line Virtual Auction, Volunteer Ambassador with the American Red Cross Blood Drives, District Youth Essay Contest, and volunteering at the food bank distribution at Endless Mountains Health Systems, Montrose- once each month.
