Ukraine Relief

#### Canada and Pennsylvania Score a Goal in Ice Hockey to Benefit Humanitarian Relief in Ukraine

The Laval Canada Rockets and the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Penguins game together on the afternoon of February 17th at the Casey Plaza of the Mohegan Sun Arena to compete in their American Hockey League rivalry. Little did the teams know that this night would include a fund-raising effort by Rotary District 7410 to raise funds for Ukraine humanitarian relief. The two teams played an exciting hockey game, with the Penguins coming out ahead 6-3 thanks to a number of goals achieved by their defense in response to power-plays by the Rockets.

Rotary District 7410 and its International Service Committee also performed a power-play raising at least \$1,329 to go to the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club steady state effort to aid Ukrainian Refugees in Poland as well as Ukrainian Displaced Persons in Ukraine proper. The Plains Rotary Club first introduced and supported this humanitarian relief effort and since December 2022 District 7410 and its various clubs and non-Rotarians have sent \$13,700 to the Warsaw City Poland Rotary in support of this effort.

Very soon a check will be sent by the District Treasurer via international wire transfer. The needs for this relief are ongoing and necessary every day of the year. If you or any of your fellow Rotarians or non-Rotarians would like to donate to this steady state effort, send your check to the District Treasurer made out to District 7410, in the memo section make note of the Warsaw City Poland Ukrainian relief effort.

Another benefit is potentially two new Rotary members, thanks to the advertising of the event.

#### Dallas Rotary supports Fork Over Love

At a recent meeting of the Dallas Rotary, their guest speaker was Tracey Selingo, founder and CEO of Fork Over Love. The organization began as an emergency response in January 2021 to bridge the gap between two groups of people severely affected by the pandemic: the working poor and small, independent restaurants. The working poor struggled to put food on the table, and restaurants struggled to keep their staff employed and their doors open. Solution: use donations, the restaurants, and volunteers to prepare and make meals available for those of our neighbors in need.

Tracey shared some astounding facts and figures. So far, \$600,000 has been spent on meals, 60,000 dinners have been made and distributed, 83 local restaurants are involved, 348 food distribution events have been held to date, and 250 people volunteer their time to help. All this has taken place since January 2021. The Rotarians congratulated her and thanked her for a job well done by making a generous donation to Fork Over Love.

The Hamlin Lake Ariel Rotary Club has been honored with the prestigious title of ShelterBox Bronze Hero! This recognition is a testament to the dedication and commitment of each member in the club who tirelessly works towards making a positive impact on the world.


Here is a short blurb from ShelterBox about the work they do: "In 2023, we supported more than 325,000 people (approximately 65,000 households). It is our second biggest year, behind the 420,000 supported in 2022, in terms of people reached since ShelterBox began in 2000.

We supported thousands of people in Türkiye and Syria after earthquakes devastated the region. In Morocco, where a powerful earthquake had caused widespread damage in the Atlas Mountains, our teams worked with our partner Association Le Grand Atlas, and Rotary District 9010 to distribute emergency shelter aid to around 20 affected communities. East Africa has been victim to the worst drought in 40 years, causing millions of people to be displaced. We've supported thousands of people in Ethiopia this year providing essential household items, tarpaulins, and ropes for people who have been displaced. We also launched our first project in Somalia since 2011 and have so far been able to provide support for hundreds of people, with additional projects in the pipeline for 2024.

As the conflict in Ukraine approaches its third year, we are delivering our sixth project in the country supporting thousands more people with winter clothing, blankets, and stoves. We are continuing to support people affected by conflict in Syria with winterization projects too, making sure people have thermal clothing, blankets, and tarpaulins to help make temporary shelters waterproof.

In Cameroon, we've supported over 100,000 people who have had to flee their homes due to conflict, the climate crisis, and poverty. Our latest project in the country has supported over 63,000 people with shelter."

ShelterBox is doing remarkable work providing emergency shelter and tools for families robbed of their homes by disaster. As a ShelterBox Hero, this Rotary Club has actively supported their mission, contributing to the global efforts of rebuilding lives and communities.

The District Committee will begin judging essays at the end of the month and will be in touch with the local essay winners as the process unfolds. The three larger prizes will be awarded at the District Conference.

Essay topic was "Create Hope in the World: How can Communities, Schools, Families, and/or Friends support mental health with caring, giving, and compassion?" The contest was open to High School Juniors and Seniors.

Hazleton Rotary President Michele Kushmeder remarks, "We congratulate Ana on winning our local contest and wish her success as her essay proceeds to the District Contest. Hazleton Rotary is very proud of you!" Please take a moment to read Anne's essay below. Creating Hope in the World: How can Communities, Schools, Families, and/or Friends support mental health with caring, giving, and compassion?

In a world where everyone experiences different challenges and obstacles, prioritizing supporting friends and family is essential to the wellbeing of those we love. We all perceive life in diverse ways, and life experiences vary from person to person. Some of us have sad stories that shape who we have grown into and some of us have carried interesting stories that can assist in the growth of others. One thing that most of us have in common, a trait we all carry, is a lack of understanding about one another. A significant component to community is the importance and influence of family and friends. These influences can have a direct positive or negative impact on a person's social community wellbeing and mental health.

Community is the substructure to meaningful relationships and social interaction; places such as school, church, and workplaces are the foundations that expose us to new meaningful relationships. When engaging in community it is important to encourage dialogue about mental health issues. Open conversation unstigmatizes mental health and allows individuals to feel safe, welcomed, and heard. The underlying thing that can help unstigmatize mental health and support those who are struggling is promoting access to support services. This could be done by implementing support services such as counselors, and training our educators and trusted adults to identify, refer, or treat community members who are suffering from distress. By having professionals train our influential community members such as teachers, clergy members, and employers, they will then obtain the ability to hold these sensitive dialogues and conversations to gain trust and guide those suffering with mental illness to seek appropriate help and treatment. Building trust establishes a solid foundation for any of the relationships in the community. For example, people with the same religious affiliation may seek comfort and compassion within their religious community where there would be a stronger sense of understanding by having a trained clergy member the person would receive proper referral, and compassionate care.

Schools are not only a learning environment but a fundamental place for social interaction, and emotional development. Children and adolescents spend an unprecedented amount of time with teachers, school administrators, and peers. Over thirteen years, the school environment becomes one of the most influential environments in one's lifetime. This is why it is crucial for teachers and school administrators to be educated on mental health, accessible mental health services, and semi-annually host speakers or professionals to aid in the destigmatization of mental health and its importance. It is a necessity to have these programs implemented to allow children and adolescents to thrive in a supportive and nurturing environment while breaking the boundaries of stigmas surrounding mental health.

The family unit is an intimate support system; family can provide an infinite amount of love and safety while also holding an extreme number of expectations. Children and adolescents want to appease their parents, but with that comes pressure to hold themselves to a certain standard and a fear of disappointment. For example, a student who holds themselves to a high academic standard due to the pressure of their family is more likely to be in distress and find it difficult to maintain the relationships around them. Children will now associate their failures as their worth and find it difficult to celebrate their accomplishments. Engaging parents in learning about how to have open conversations, regular family activities and the cultivation of a positive environment can strengthen their relationship with their child while also raising their child's self-esteem. While using the already established trust and unconditional love in a family dynamic you can engage parents and caregivers in mental health services and training to provide support in the home.

Friendships are typically developed through the community due to shared interests and experiences and play a vital role in one's growth because they can reflect and determine one's character. Friendships can develop under any circumstance but crucial in influencing one's life experiences and emotional development. Building relationships within a community outside of family and school such extracurricular activities and religious gatherings are important because peers provide a sense of belonging. These relationships, if positive, can provide an abundance of compassion and understanding. While being a solid support system, they can also share knowledge they have learned on mental health services through the community and recognize signs of a loved one struggling. Proper knowledge on mental health can also assist them in navigating difficult conversations, learn how to actively listen, and strengthen their relationship with friends. Friendships are arguably one of our greatest influences and provide a safe and comforting environment to share the experiences one has gone through.

Undeniably, a community is the most fundamental part of a person's wellbeing and mental health. Whether a community reaches a person through religious affiliation, school, family or friendships, the important aspect is that a person has community in their lives to support their wellbeing. By implementing strategic mental health services and training into community resources, better care, compassion, and nurturing can be provided to community members. It crucial to surround oneself with supportive, educated, and respected community members and mentors who can assist in destigmatizing mental health by having conversations with community members and educating them on the topic. Community can help establish healthy relationships and modes of communication between individuals with similar experiences to help relate and comfort people when understanding and compassion is needed the most. The mental health resources will instill a response of sensitivity due to strategic implementation of education. Community members, family, and friends are truly indispensable; they come together to make a unit that provides endless comfort. A saying that I believe can truly directly sum up how critical community benefits a person's wellbeing is, "It takes a village to raise a child".

#### Tunkhannock Rotary Supports Community Organizations

At the February Rotary Meetings, President Elaine Walker presented donations to a variety of community organizations. These donations were funded by the profits from the Oct 2023 Harvest & Wine Festival.

The organizations receiving donations included: HANDS of Wyoming County, Victims Resource Center, Seven Loaves Soup Kitchen and Equines for Freedom. In line with Rotary's Mental Health Initiatives, several of these organizations have mental health and fitness as part of their primary missions.

On Feb 1 Tunkhannock Rotary heard from five team members from HANDS of Wyoming County, led by their Rotarian Executive Director, Cathy Franko. HANDS is a 501(c)3 non-profit that depends on funding from grants and donations. It is located at the former Mehoopany Elementary School. They offer 11 programs serving children from 0-16 years old and their families, including those with issues.

Their Family Skills Program and Personal Health and Wellness Program have now been expanded to include Wyoming County Drug Treatment Court clients to facilitate their sobriety and parenting.

One of their programs is their school garden, which includes a greenhouse. HANDS is now collecting plastics to get a new bench from Trex for their garden/greenhouse area in exchange for 500 lbs of plastics. To aid HANDS efforts, Rotarians have been collecting plastic bags and at the meeting presented the team with over 30 lbs and counting of bags of plastics.
