Letter from the District Governor

Greetings to All

This letter comes to you the day after our weekend 2016-2017 District Conference. I'll reflect on the month of April and on our Conference.

First, the month of April:

The month of April was the month I had emphasized as critical to getting all the year's loose ends tied up: POLIO giving, so critical to seeing the end come; Annual Funds to the Foundation; getting the next Grant Proposals ready for submission; assuring you are getting ready with goals for next year to support 2017-2018 with Karin.


I have taken a look at the District report for the Foundation Giving both the Annual Fund and the Polio Funds.

In the Annual Fund, while there are still some clubs and individuals who may yet contribute, we are currently down \$34,000 from last year. Our average per member contribution across all 1130 members is \$49.10. Now, I quote this knowing that there are a few very generous individuals who have pulled this average up to the \$49.10. Thank you to those individuals who are supporting the Rotary legacy and future resources for Rotarians who are doing good in the world. I am hoping that the data will improve and that some clubs have just not made their contribution to the Annual Fund yet.

On the Polio Fund side: our contributions did increase \$15,000, as we near the end of Polio and need surveillance labs and support in the last few difficult countries and areas. This year and next are THE most critical years yet, when success hangs in the balance. Yes, we improved our Polio giving. However, taking into consideration one very significant gift from a very generous Rotarian, the remainder of us, 1129 Rotarians averaged \$8.85 per Rotarian. If vaccines are still about \$1.00 per dose, the rest of us provided vaccine for 8-9 children and minimal dollars for surveillance. That \$8.85 is less than some spend on coffee in a week. Again, I am very hopeful that there are May and June funds to be sent in for Polio.

Please know that I am aware there are some very generous individuals in our District who give with their heart and soul and are passionate on service. We

Meet Max and Her Partner in Training

Tunkhannock Rotarians had the opportunity to meet Max, a beautiful 16-month-old female German shepherd, at their April 13 luncheon. Max was accompanied by her owner, Rotarian Rich Seaberg. Max and Rich are being trained by Alan Finn of Designing Dogs in Old Forge, who also trains medical alert dogs. (See article, page 19)

Max and Rich will eventually be fully trained for drug detection, explosive detection, and search and rescue for lost people. Max is not associated in any way with law enforcement, they are currently a private team.

Rich works for the school district as Security Officer. Max, his personal dog, is very protective of Rich and a wonderful family pet. She began obedience training at six months and the first word she learned was "no." She will on command stay down for 15 minutes with a goal of 30 minutes. Dogs need to socialize with other dogs, so she went to bite-and-bark class. This training has calmed her down, although she can still display a puppy's exuberance.

Max knows three languages. English is for everyday use, German is her "working" language and French is her favorite since it is used for treats. Rich works with her for at least an hour a day. They train four days per week with Finn. This training can be a single-dog session or with 12-15 dogs. So that she can be used as a community resource, Tunkhannock Rotary provided a donation of \$5,000 toward the training of Max and Rich-- \$2,500 from a Rotary District Grant with the club matching this amount.

A German shepherd's sense of smell is 20,000 times better than that of humans. Training continues throughout the dog's life. Currently, Max can detect explosives, guns, and a single bullet in a big room. She is now working on drug detection and when done, she will be certified for drug detection. Search and rescue interests Rich, too, especially to find elderly and special needs children who go missing.




Waverly Wins Back Shoe in Alley Rumble

The Rotary Club of Tunkhannock D.A.R.E.: Teaching Kids to Make Good Decisions in Life

At the April 13 Rotary Club Luncheon at Purkey's Pink Apple, Tunkhannock Area School District Community Resource Officer Rich Seaberg spoke to the club about the D.A.R.E (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program that he provides to fifth graders in the Tunkhannock Area School District. The D.A.R.E. program is a police-based course meant as a class-room experience to teach students good decision making, helps them define problems and make responsible/good choices at a young age. The course provides practice responding to good and bad pressure, including peer pressure, and teaches them how to be a positive peer pressure for their families and friends. They also talk about communication styles and how overwhelming electronic communication can be for them, including cell phones.

It can be hard for kids to get up in class and discuss things, but the DARE class provides a safe place and they learn that they need to respect each other if someone else is talking.

They also learn to avoid risky situations and to never put themselves in a situation from which they cannot escape such as a creepy alleyway.

Then they talk about drugs, alcohol and their abuse. One topic discussed is advertising for tobacco, drugs and alcohol. Rich showed a video about the advertising for beer, wine & liquor near schools and fast food restaurants, including beverage advertisements for the holidays. Some of the ads are clearly meant for kids, since some of the ads are on toys and even baby



Service Dogs Trained to Alert, Protect Owners

Recently, the Tunkhannock Club was privileged to hear about the capabilities of trained medical alert dogs. Jean Crawford and her medical alert dog, Mississippi, were our guests at our March 23 Rotary Luncheon at Purkey's Pink Apple. Jean was also accompanied by her husband and his hearing alert dog Montana Jean, who will alert him to certain noises and alarms.

Jean talked about the extensive training and amazing capabilities of Mississippi, who was trained by Allen Finn, who is also training Rich Seaberg and Max the drug/search dog. Mississippi was trained in a year. Service dogs must have a rabies tag, a collar and a leash, but Jean likes to keep his service vest on as well. They can go in public places.

Mississippi is trained to alert her 15-60 minutes before she is going to fall. She tends to fall to the right and he leans against her on that side. He wakes her up when she stops breathing in her sleep and will pick things up when she drops them. He will also take things to her, including bringing her meds to her. He will then put them back where they should be stored. If she says the word 'free', the dog

knows he can move away from her. Otherwise he is on duty.

If you see a service dog in a store, talk to their person before you talk to or interact with the dog. Do not ask what the dog is for, since that is a privacy matter as to what may be wrong with the dog's owner.

All Rotarians, family and friends are invited to come out and cheer on their Junior High teams. Teams will be coming


