

Message from the District Governor Craig Devenport

As I indicated when I visited your clubs, I see the role of the district as supplemental support for our clubs. It has been my goal to assist in that process throughout the year. The challenge with this is that many of the district assistance may not affect the weekly functions of the clubs. Let me provide some upcoming examples and a few past examples. The goal is to help you become stronger clubs.

Who has even heard of the Council on Legislation? Most Rotarians have not, but it is vital to the function of Rotary as a whole. This annual meeting reviews each and every item that comes into a Rotary "suggestion box" of sorts from all over the world. Recent changes in loosening many restrictions have come through this process. Each



district gets to have a volunteer participate in that. We are in the process of balloting each of our clubs to determine who that will be. The candidate will be announced shortly after May 15th.

In the hierarchy of Rotary, above the district there is another level called the zone. We are in zone 32 which is huge. We get to provide a representative to this zone to help vote for leadership positions. This person will be a past district governor and will be named by June 30th. Our zone include: much of the mid-Atlantic states, New England, Canada, Alaska, and Bermuda. One of their additional goals is to assistant on the training of upcoming governors.

Just as the zone helps prepare leadership, our district also help prepare leaders in a couple of ways: the President Elect Training Seminars (PETS), District Assembly, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA coming up in June.) To do this requires volunteers. You can help be a part of numerous committees that give our district the strengths it has. Just take the risk of expanding your level of service beyond a weekly meeting. It can be a lot of fun!.

Membership update: we are in need of 20 more members to reach the magic number of 1100 by June 30th. There are three easy ways to get there: First, encourage stagnant members to get involved so they do not resign from your club. Second: Invite anybody and everybody to service projects and let them see what Rotary is all about. Third: Don't ask directly if someone wants to join Rotary- without a gentle invitation to learn what Rotary is all about, what good it is doing in your community, and why you became a member (and love it!)

- 3. Adam Sebelin of Lehighton High School, submitted by Lehighton Rotary, addressed the issue of business development and growth.

These outstanding essays will be read, and the authors awarded, at the District Banner Exchange on July 1, at Creekside Gardens in Tunkhannock, at 5 PM in the outdoor pavilion.

"There is plenty of summer fun in store for three area students who have been selected as scholarship recipients to attend the Rotary Youth Leadership Award Conference in June. Lydia Chen (MMI) and Silvia Roberto (Hazleton Area Academy of Sciences) were awarded Hazleton Rotary scholarships and Willa Bartholomew (MMI) is the recipient of the Hazleton Rotary Foundation scholarship" announces Kim McNulty, Hazleton Rotary RYLA project chair.

Club Recap

Jim Thorpe Childcare and Early Childhood Center:

After almost one and One-half years of organization and planning, the Jim Thorpe Childcare and Early Childhood Center should be ready to open in Fall of 2023. The center is a cooperative effort of the Jim Thorpe Rotary Club, Lehigh Valley Children's Center, the Immaculate Conception Parish (Allentown Diocese), and the Jim Thorpe Area School District. Housed int the former St. Joseph's Regional Academy, the center will offer Pre-K Counts and pre-school care for approximately 30 – 40 children, initially, and hopes to expand those numbers as dictated by need and space availability.

This endeavor will help with the childcare needs that were identified by over 200 respondents to a "Child Care and Early Education Survey", that was commissioned in mid-2022. Our club has committed \$2,000 to assist with cost of necessary renovations for the childcare center.

Donations: Kids Zone (pre- and post-school childcare) - \$250; Turkey/Syria Disaster Response Fund - \$250; Jim Thorpe Independent Film Festival - \$100; Hippie 5 K Run; (CCEDC Scholarship Fund) - \$50; \$250 for the Friends of the Carbon county Technical Institute.

Student Scholarships: Five students were selected to receive Rotary Scholarships (\$750 each): two from Jim Thorpe Area High School; two from Carbon Career & Technical Institute; and one from Marian Catholic High School. They will receive their awards at the schools' respective award assemblies.

Essay Contest: the top three essays were read at our April 18 meeting. The 1st Place essay was submitted by Justin Fronheiser and it was sent to the District for further judging; the 2nd and 3rd Place winners were Makayla Scott and Jalin Burns, respectively. The club awarded a prize of \$50 for 1st place and \$25 each for 2nd and 3rd place.

RYLA: two students each from CCTI and one from JTAHS were selected to attend the camp.

Summer Recreation: planning is continuing for opening of the camp on June 19. Approximately, 125 children will attend.

The program will offer a daily STEM activity, arts & crafts, games, sports, etc. A free lunch will be provided, courtesy of the SHINE Program, as well as a free breakfast. The camp is provided free of charge to all children.

PETS and Grant Seminar Training: Rotarian Amber Breiner attended the PETS training in March. Also, President Jeanne Miller and Secretary Clem McGinley attended the Grants Training Seminar at Drums.







International Service Project Meeting

District Attorney Joe Peters wrote to Rotary: "You should be proud of the fact that the collective effort resulted in taking 191.4 lbs of prescription drugs out of the homes and off the streets of Wyoming County, thereby keeping them out of the hands of children, teens and adults alike. The lives you saved will never be known, but it is safe to say that it has been done. On behalf of all citizens and as the chief law enforcement officer of the county and a fellow Rotarian, I salute and thank you!"

DA Peters also visited each of the pharmacies to thank the pharmacies, police officers and volunteers who were partners in this endeavor.

Since the DA's office began participating in this program in 2010, 4,234.55 lbs of drugs have been collected, with 3,828.55 lbs collected after Rotary began providing the advertising and community outreach for this program.
