


Essay Contest Winner

Applicant must reside within the boundaries of the Hazleton Area School District and must be under the age of 30 years."



2024 Hazleton Rotary Memorial Scholarship Awardees are Announced

Since its inception in 1921 Hazleton Rotary has been developing the "ways and means" to provide services for the Greater Hazleton Community. 

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Exchange Students Take Aim at Trap Shoot

As they have over the past decade on an April Saturday, the Wyalusing Area Rotary teamed with the Tri-County Sportsmen Club in Silvara to host an entertaining and learning experience for Rotary Exchange students from regional school districts. The occasion was a trap shoot on the club grounds, with Pat Beebe once again providing instruction on firearms safety and marksmanship as this year's participants took aim at flying clay discs launched by automated machines at the push of a button.

This year's shooters and their countries of origin were: Sebastian Fuentes, Chile; Botond "Boti" Batyky, Hungary, and Tanguy Verrier, France. Sebastian is attending Wilkes-Barre Area High School during the current school year and Tanguy and Boti are both attending Tunkhannock High School. Boti was transported directly by Anne Sehne, District 7410 Rotary Youth Exchange Chair, from a tennis match to take his turn on the firing line Saturday afternoon.

Foreign exchange students from throughout the 10-county Rotary district are invited to the event each spring. Wyalusing, which usually provides a student, is one of the 42 clubs in the district, but there is no exchange student in Wyalusing this year. The call of spring sports and other extra-curricular activities in respective schools, as well as distances some must travel to participate in this event, are among the challenges. Nevertheless, the Rotary Trap Shoot typically brings five or six exchange students to the Tri-County Sportsmen Club.

Although there are students who have some experience with firearms, others like Sebastian have never even handled a firearm until they made the trip to Silvara. After Pat familiarizes each with the shotgun they'll be using and offers tips on how to track and shoot at the clay discs as they are hurled across the field at approximately 40 miles an hour at different altitudes, each shooter takes his place at one of five stations. They take turns in sequence at the shout of "Pull!" You can see them improving in accuracy with each round. At other stations. they take aim at discs launched almost straight up or rolling across the ground.

Even though often intimidated at first, you can count on the students walking away from the event pleased and proud to have faced the challenge. It is always a friendly competition, and this year Boti boasted the top score of the trio, followed closely by Sebastian, the one who had never even handled a firearm until that day.

The Wyalusing Area Rotary Club provided hot dogs, chili, snacks and beverages, not only to the students, but others of all ages, male and female, who took part in the trap shoot throughout the afternoon.
