Hello, District 7410 Rotarians. I hope you are all doing well as we transition into the beginning of the holiday season at the end of this month. November in the Rotary Calendar is Foundation Month. We celebrate our Rotary Foundation year-round, but in November we take a special opportunity to create awareness about the great work of our Rotary Foundation programs and to thank and honor our generous donors for making a difference.

The Rotary Foundation's goal is to build its endowment to \$2.025 billion by 2025. The endowment is a fund that allows individuals to combine their gifts to address global needs for generations to come. We are currently just under \$200 million from reaching our goal. Many events are underway such as legacy dinners and other types of events to encourage

members to contribute to the endowment.

For the 16th consecutive year, The Rotary Foundation has received the highest rating of four stars from Charity Navigator, an independent evaluator of charities in the U.S. This is an accomplishment of which we should be immensely proud. I thank you all for supporting our Rotary Foundation programs, as through The Foundation we are truly "Doing Good in the World" every day.

We are having a foundation event on Saturday, November 16th. All the information is available on the website to register. Learn more about The Foundation and celebrate the good work it does. It may have already happened by the time you read this, but hopefully you were there.

One last topic for this newsletter; Rotary Action Groups or RAGs. RAGs are independent, Rotary-affiliated groups made up of people from around the world who are experts in a particular field, such as economic development, peace, addiction prevention, the environment, or water. Action groups offer their technical expertise and support to help clubs plan and implement projects to increase our impact, one of Rotary's strategic priorities. This support includes helping clubs find partners, funding, and other resources. Action groups can also help clubs and districts prepare grant applications, conduct community assessments, and develop plans to monitor and evaluate their projects.

One of the goals of the September 29, 2024, fund raising dinner collaborated on with the St. Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church (UCC) in Scranton was to raise funds to allow the church to purchase and deliver used ambulances to Ukraine. The first such ambulance was delivered on the evening of November 3, 2024, via a purchase from a used ambulance dealer near Nowy Sacz, Poland. A 2016 Opel Vivaro, fully equipped with all original emergency medical equipment was delivered by the dealer to Lyviv, Ukraine where it was immediately sent to the need identified to the Priest at the UCC. This ambulance is a timely replacement for one recently intentionally targeted and destroyed (a violation of international law) by Russian forces.

The seller of this ambulance was thrilled to hear of its new life/purpose via this Rotary inspired effort and included free winter tires and reduced delivery fees. Stay tuned for ambulance number two, as this humanitarian effort continues.

#### ROTARY RESPONDS TO UKRAINE CRISIS

The Scranton Rotary and the District International Service Committee recently dedicated its efforts to Rotary International's encouragement to "organize local humanitarian response initiatives in Ukraine and the surrounding region, find out how to engage with Rotary clubs and districts, find contacts for hosting refugees, and more local efforts." Planning began in the Spring of 2024 for the September 29th Fundraising Dinner dedicated to raising \$50,000 for the purchase of humanitarian medical supplies and used ambulances by the Saint Vladimir Ukrainian Catholic Church in Scranton, to then transport these to Ukraine. Other community organizations and businesses were invited to participate in this effort. Funds and or in-kind services were donated by such entities as The Polish Connection Restaurant, Central Park Flowers, Rotary Club of Duren Germany, Heerlen Rotary Club of The Netherlands, SOS International of Louisville Kentucky, Gerrity's Groceries, Hometown Finds, Weatherly Rotary, Dunmore Rotary, Jim Thorpe Rotary, Hamlin Rotary, New Milford Area Rotary, Tunkhannock Rotary, Honesdale Rotary, Tall Pines Woodstoves and Fireplaces, Gentex Corporation of Simpson Pennsylvania, Spectacular Fireworks, Nicholson Lumber Company, Endless Mountains Health System, Louisville Kentucky Supporters and many more. A \$25,000 challenge grant was matched with current proceeds exceeding \$50,000.

A significant element of the effort included a Rotary tradition of conducting a silent auction with baskets donated by Rotary Clubs, businesses, and individuals. Thirty-three baskets of donated items with a retail value of \$4,186, netted \$4,836 in bids resulting in a total of \$9,022 towards the \$25,000 matching goal. A unique aspect of the \$25,000 challenge grant was the decision by the donor that the retail value of the baskets would count toward the \$25,000 match. Another feature of the baskets was four were full of medical supplies that were going to Ukraine, rather than home with the successful bidder. And the dollar bid on these baskets were going to the effort to buy more medical supplies. The final count for dinner ticket sales included one-hundred and fifty-two (152) dine in and thirty-nine (39) take out. A native Ukrainian traditional vocalist provided entertainment. The Mayor of Scranton paid a visit to welcome all to the city. Two Ukrainian servicemen undergoing medical treatment in Philadelphia through the Revived Soldiers in Ukraine non-profit www.rsukraine.org were honored guests and provided very emotional witness to the audience regarding their experience and journey.

In his October District Newsletter article, District Governor William Skinner encouraged us all to look for opportunities to engage with the Rotary Action Plan. "One of the four pillars of the Action Plan is Expand Our Reach. Use this month to look to collaborate with other Clubs or organizations to do bigger projects and fundraisers that can benefit our communities and our Foundation." Another of the four pillars of the Action Plan is Increasing Our Ability to Adapt. "By assessing needs and changing to an additional or a different project will help us to adapt to an ever rapidly changing world." And finally, "If we change projects or a fundraiser remember the first pillar of the Action Plan; Increase Our Image." I think this fund-raising effort, NAILED IT.

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In November 2022, our District leadership approved a protocol for clubs and individuals to donate funds directly to our District Treasurer function for international wire transfer to the Warsaw City Poland Rotary Club. These funds support steady state requirements that continue providing long term relief to Ukrainian refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs).

To date this District has realized \$15,000 in contributions (including from non-Rotarians) to send to the Warsaw City Poland RC to support this steady state requirement.

Recently, we received an update from the Warsaw City Poland Rotary. Their efforts continue with education programs, employment training (primarily women), childcare facilities, medical training for EMTs, and psychological counseling services. As winter approaches in war torn Ukraine, the club has also stepped up to provide power generators. These are "necessary for heating antibomb shelters, or for operating STARLINK communications or just for light when aggressors are damaging infrastructure." "Good generators cost \$1,250 USD and they recently collected funds for 8 generators for Krivyi Rog."

The need continues as this war continues. See your club leadership or contact me to entertain donating to this initiative as soon as possible.

#### GLOBAL GRANT IN UKRAINE PROGRESSING

Recently Riccardo Bari, the primary contact for the referenced Rotary Global Grant in Milano Italy provided us the following update in mid-September.

Despite the challenges of trying to proceed in a war-torn country, the five Ukrainian communities; are proceeding with the installation of the water filtration systems.

Mykhailivka community is at the final stage of installment, the head of the community confirmed it this week.

Preobrazhenska community is at the final stage of installation, they asked for a zoom meeting with the manufacturer to set up the final details before the start. The meeting will take place next week (end of September).

Novomykolaivska community (2 equipments) is currently conducting a tender (they allocated community funds coming from their budget) on well drilling for further installation of the systems.

Bilenke community is waiting for the next session of the local council that will be held in this month of September to allocate the funds from their own budget to buy the storage for water. They plan to install it by the end of this month (September).

Shyroke community (two equipments): the first system is in the process of installment. This process is slowed by the lack of specialists in community (50% were mobilized to the army). They plan to install the first system in September and then proceed to the second system.




#### **Dictionary Distribution**
