On October 13, 2019, 3,000 runners from around the world will descend on the borough of Forest City to compete in the 24th Annual Steamtown Marathon. Forest City Rotary will be there volunteering to help serve breakfast to those runners and others, as they have done for years.

This year for the first time, Rotary District 7410 will be there as well, as a Platinum Plus Sponsor. Such a sponsorship is intended to gather attention for Rotary and most importantly for the "End Polio Now" campaign.

If you go to Rotary.org, 'take action' tab you will find a tab called 'end Polio'. Under that tab you will be on endpolio.org and in the middle of the page there is a click button for 'download your world polio day toolkit. I strongly recommend using it! If you download the toolkit, you will find a formatted news release to which you need only fill in the blanks and use it with your most local newspapers and news outlets. There are other pieces of information that may be helpful to structuring information at your event to raise public awareness.

Please use the event announcement form to fill in your information on your event and send it back to me and to Dave.

Now additionally, Please ask at your club if there is a physician, MD medical person who has treated Polio. If you have someone of medical authority who could be available for a public interview on Polio, I need someone who can stand by should we get TV coverage. I would also appreciate knowing who has been on an NID from your club.

Time is of the essence, World Polio Day is coming sooner than we think and we have an opportunity to make a 41 club impact.

ALSO, PLEASE, go out to the District and RI websites and put your event on the website. Rotary is trying to collect all the events for their news releases. Let's give them the best District showing they ever saw!

Dear District Governor and District Rotary Foundation Chair:

Our effort to end polio has been like running a marathon. Right now, we're approaching the finish line. After three years with Nigeria reporting no new cases of polio caused by the wild virus entire WHO African Region could potentially be certified wild poliovirus-free as soon as mid-2020.

But the final part of any journey is often the toughest. So we have to work harder than ever to eliminate the wild poliovirus in Afghanistan and Pakistan — two of the most difficult countries in the world when it comes to delivering health care. That's why, on 23 November, a team of Rotary staff members and I will join Rotary senior leaders and Rotarians from District 5500 in Arizona, USA, and around the world in El Tour de Tucson to raise funds for polio eradication. The ride is one of the top cycling events in the United States, with 9,000 participants. Since Rotary's Miles to End Polio team first participated in El Tour in 2009, Rotary International has raised more than \$53 million, with the generous help of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

This year, our Miles to End Polio fundraising goal is \$10 million. Your district can help us reach this goal by making a special Miles to End Polio District Designated Fund (DDF) donation. The district that contributes the most DDF to Miles to End Polio will receive a visit from President-elect Holger Knaack. In addition, the five districts that give the most DDF to PolioPlus (including any gifts to Miles to End Polio) from 1 July until 30 April 2020 will be announced on stage at the Rotary International Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, USA.

To donate DDF to Miles to End Polio, complete the DDF donation form by 30 November. You can also make a personal contribution to the ride, which would earn you Foundation recognition points. All Miles to End Polio donations will be tripled by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

There are many ways to support the effort, and there's no better way to take up the challenge than by joining us on the ride. If you or your fellow Rotarians would like to be part of the team, you can register to ride with us in Tucson. Or, wherever you are, you can take part in the Indoor Ride to End Polio 16-23 November. Thank you for participating in these great opportunities to support PolioPlus. With your help, we can end polio for good.

Opiod Abuse Forum

At this event, they invited members from throughout their county who work closely with those struggling with addiction to be panelists for the night. These panelists talked to the audience about what they see in their profession and what they think we can do/should do if someone needs help. They had a great turnout and quickly realized that we can do more to help those who are trying to create a sober lifestyle for themselves.

With the help of their District Grant this year, they were able to help Little Creek Lodge. Little Creek Lodge is a drug and alcohol treatment center in Southern Wayne County that is geared towards helping young men live a sober lifestyle. They donated 3 Apple computers and 3 licenses for Microsoft Office 365. This donation will help the young men at Little Creek Lodge to prepare for their lives after treatment. These computers will allow them the opportunity to look for housing, build a resume, obtain their GED/attend online college courses, and search for a job. They will also be able to learn more about their own individual addiction.



Celebrating 100 Years Of Service
