One Day. One Focus: Ending Polio

October 24th, 2021

Those of us that are veteran to Rotary know very well of the decades long battle to rid the world of the wild polio virus. We are nearly there, with just two nations experiencing wild polio cases so far this year- Afghanistan and Pakistan. We all know the challenges presenting these eradication efforts caused by insecurity, and the COVID pandemic. That has not and can not stop us. It certainly didn't stop us last year, when our Rotary District realized \$28,455 in donations to the PolioPlus Fund according to the Rotary International Fundraising Analysis. This effort nearly equaled our efforts in FY 2019-20, (\$30,398) despite the COVID pandemic.

It is time to focus on this effort again. So far this Rotary Year, our district has realized \$1,166 in donations to the PolioPlus Foundation. Congratulations! That is much more than the \$455 we had realized at this date last year.

BUT, the data tells us that we have a total of 32 clubs "not giving" this year! The District has 42 clubs. Lots to do and October 24th is the one day to focus on that.

WHAT IS A ROTARY FOUNDATION BENEFACTOR?

A Rotary Foundation Benefactor is a person who has notified The Rotary Foundation that they have made provisions in their final estate plans to Rotary for US\$1,000 or more, or who has made an outright gift of US\$1,000 or more to The Rotary Foundation's Endowment. Benefactors receive a certificate and insignia to wear with a Rotary or Paul Harris Fellow pin. They are listed in the Benefactor Report and identified in the Club Recognition Summary.

Clubs with 100% member support of Rotary's Endowment are eligible to request a Rotary's Promise Club electronic certificate. Qualifying support may be a commitment for a future gift to The Rotary Foundation in an estate plan or an outright gift of \$1,000 or more to the Endowment.

A US\$1,000 gift to The Rotary Foundation creates a legacy of helping people live better lives around the world. Today there are over 100,000 Benefactors worldwide.

Food Banks

For the last 2 years, on the second Tuesday of the month, members of the Jim Thorpe Rotary bring non-perishable foods to the meeting, which are distributed to the local food pantries on a rotating basis (St. Joseph's Church, Jim Thorpe; Christ Lutheran and Grace Methodist Churches, both in Penn Forest Township). The value of the donations varies between \$125 to \$150 per month. In addition, we participated in the Breakfast with Champions Food Drive and on September 17th and delivered \$302 worth of food to the St. Joseph's Food Pantry. Included in this amount was a \$168 grant from District 7410. In fiscal year 2020-2021 our club contributed \$2,400 in cash to the pantries.

Also, the JT Rotary supports the Friends of Animals Shelter and on the fourth Tuesday of the month we bring food, kitty litter, cleaning supplies, etc., to distribute to the Shelter: the monthly value of our donations varies between \$75 - \$100.



Dictionary Project

After extensive consultation with the Jim Thorpe Area School District Administration and Teachers, we will not be participating in the Dictionary Project this year. In lieu thereof, we will be offering two \$300 grants to each elementary school for teachers in grades 1 through 4. A grant request must be submitted and the winners will be selected according to criteria TBD.

Rotarian Francis Turner Knighted into French Legion of Honor

On Sept 2, 2021, Rotarian Francis Turner was knighted by French Consul General of Washington, DC, Francois Penguilly with the French Medal of Honor at the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall and Museum in Pittsburgh, PA.

France's Highest Honor, the Legion d'honneur, was established in 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte. According to Wikipedia "American and British veterans who served in either World War on French soil, or during the 1944 campaigns to liberate France, may be eligible for appointment as Chevalier (Knight) of the Legion of Honour, provided they were still living when the honour was approved."

Fran was among 3 World War II Veterans honored at this ceremony with gratitude from the French for their contribution to the liberation of France.



According to an article in the Meadville Tribune “Turner, who enlisted prior to the war and completed Officers Candidate School in mid-1942, participated in the North African Campaign and later landed in Normandy three days after D-Day, according to a brief biography prepared by Eric P. Montgomery, a friend of Turner’s who helped to coordinate the Legion of Honor ceremony. As the Allied Forces battled their way across France, the 17th Armored Engineers Battalion cleared the way for advancing infantry by sweeping for and disabling mines left behind by enemy forces.

The unit continued through northern France, entering Belgium after the liberation of Paris, and later taking part in the Battle of the Bulge. Turner was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for actions during his unit’s entry into Germany, according to Montgomery’s biography. The citation that accompanied the medal describes Turner’s efforts in leading a mine-sweeping party prior to a tank attack “while enemy patrols were active in the area.” When additional efforts were needed shortly after dawn, the citation states, “Turner and one mine detector operator cleared the additional gaps in full view of the enemy.”

All three honorees also received Letters of Achievement and Appreciation from U.S. Senator Pat Toomey and Certificates of Commendation from the PA House of Representatives. The ceremony is available for viewing at French Legion of Honor Ceremony - 3 WWII Veterans, King, Prestia, Turner - Pittsburgh Pa Sept 2 2021 - YouTube with the presentation to Fran at 47:45.

Fran is 102 years young and served as the President of Tunkhannock Rotary from 1973-1974 and was Club Secretary for a record 27 years (1982-2009). Although Fran has moved from Tunkhannock to Saegertown, PA to be near his daughter Susan, for his 100th birthday celebration he was made a lifetime member of the Tunkhannock Rotary for his dedication to Rotary.

Breakfast of Champions Food Drive

On Sept 18, Pres. Mary Tempest organized a Breakfast with Champions Food Drive at the outside pavilion at the Tunkhannock Public Library to benefit HANDS of Wyoming County and the Wyoming County Food Bank. 47 boxes of nonperishable and canned foods were collected plus \$250 worth of gift cards and a \$50 check. The recipients were overjoyed with the donations.


