Yoga for a Cause

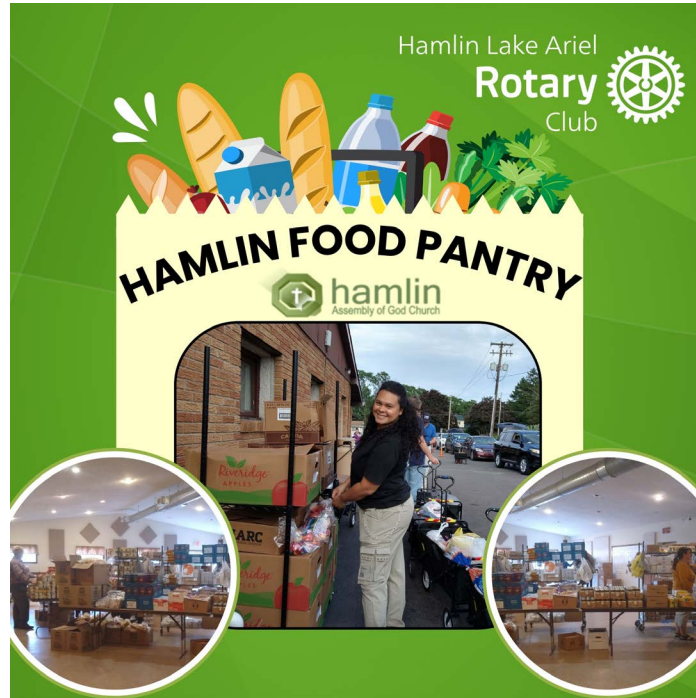

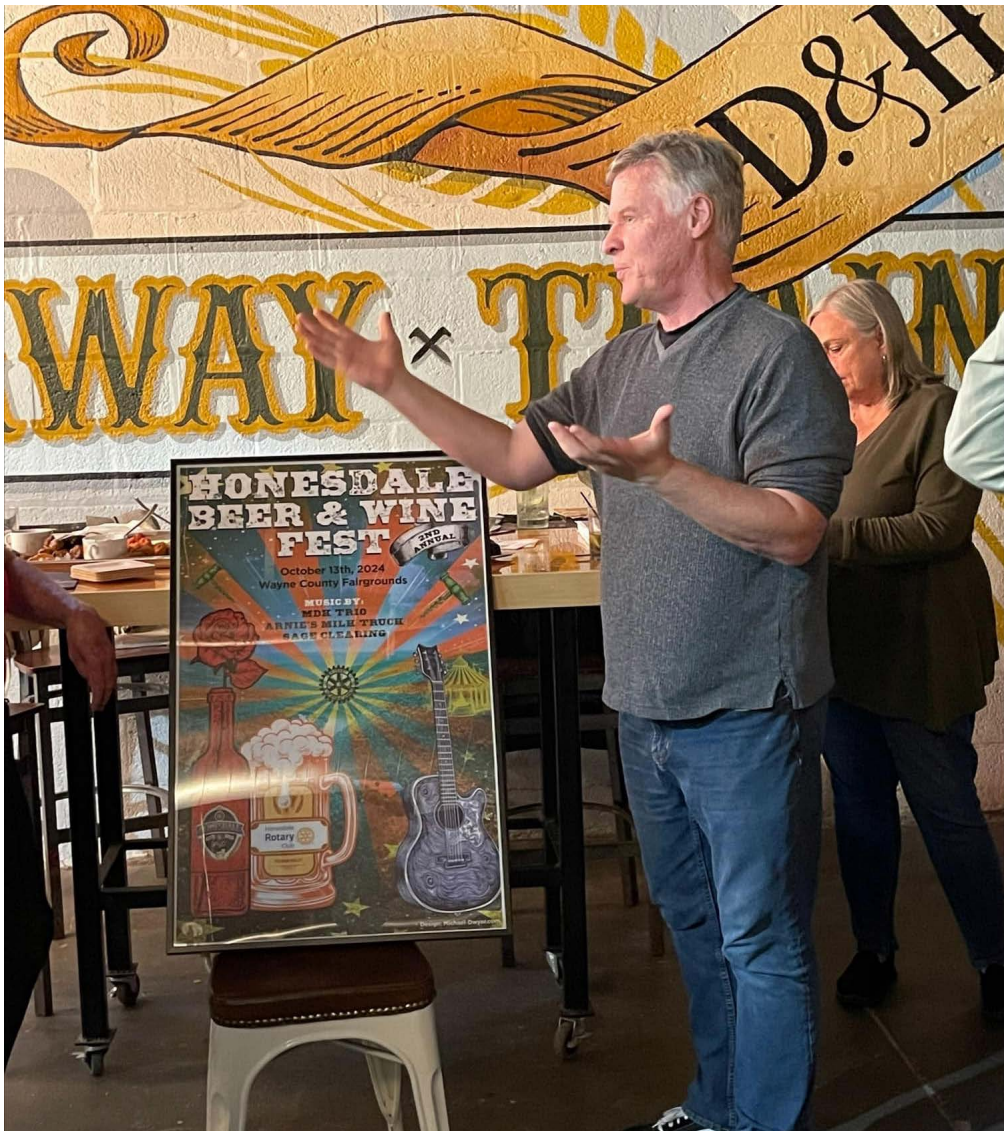

The one mile trip starts at the Inn at Jim Thorpe, past the Treasure Shop, Millionaires Row, Mauch Chunk Opera House, continues to the Old Jail Museum with stops at the Parsonage, St. Marks and finally down West Broadway to Race Street and ends at Josiah White Park where stories of the Asa Packer and Harry Packer mansion are told. Join Milford on World Polio Day

Come join Milford-Matamoras Rotary Club on October 24th at the Dimmick Inn from 4PM to 8PM to help eradicate Polio.

With a \$20.00 purchase of a polio wristband, beer and pizza will be provided throughout the night. Polio, or poliomyelitis, is a paralyzing and potentially deadly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5. The virus spreads from person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can then attack the nervous system. Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years.

Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979. Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease.

Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort. Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free.

If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

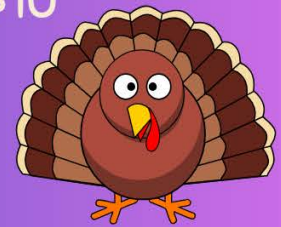

PSU Fall Mum Fundraiser

Wellsboro Rotary's District grant for the 2023-2024 year was to provide toolkits to graduating seniors: Levi Marmara, Will Brooks, Sarah Seeling and Nathan Plunkett that were involved in the Carpentry and Construction class. The toolkits are outfitted with all the necessary tools to be able to jump right into their careers in the construction trade after graduation. Carpentry and Construction teacher Drew Seeling had a vision of being able to offer Wellsboro high school students a hands-on program that taught them skills and set them up with experience to pursue a career in the trades. It started with 10 kids that built he and his wife a shed at their house, to a complete house project in Wellsboro a few blocks from the high school.

They broke ground in 2019 and the goal is to finish and sell the house by next June. It consists of a 3 bedroom main home with an apartment on the second floor as well as a studio apartment above the garage.
