And internationally, we have Rotarians dedicated to providing desks, supplies and support to grow educational opportunities for underserved or underdeveloped communities.

Polio Strikes in Ukraine

In the summer of 2015, two Ukrainian children were stricken with paralytic polio. Ukraine had only fully vaccinated 50 percent of its children against polio and low immunization rates are a source for an outbreak. To stop the disease from spreading, the country needed to administer more than 50 million vaccines through an emergency program, an impossible task to do quickly.

Large scale vaccinations are an enormous undertaking requiring money as well thousands of volunteers on the ground. The vaccine itself is not the biggest expense in a vaccination campaign. The distribution of the vaccine, transportation and staffing, is the highest cost.

Bicycles Give Girls in Rural India Access to Education

The Rotary Club of Tunkhannock recently donated \$2,500 to buy 50 bicycles for students at the Pardada Pardadi School for girls in rural India. Pardada Pardadi Educational Society is a non-profit organization based in Anoopshahr, Bulandshahr district, Uttar Pradesh, India, dedicated to the academic, economic and social empowerment of girls and women in this poor area of the country.

Unfortunately, in rural areas over 85 percent of the village girls have never been to school. Pardada Pardadi is trying to change that. Some girls have to travel significant distances to the school, which is where the bicycles will make a difference.

The girls have to pay a percentage of the cost of the bikes, allowing them to have ownership and care for them.

Advocate for the School, Mary Cairns, recently shared the following with the club:

"I am so excited for the girls to have their new bikes, thanks very much to your Club. You can note on the photos that the girls tend to keep the plastic wrap on their bikes, as long as they can, to protect them. It's an 'India' thing.

"I love that they were also able to get baskets on the bikes.
